Garbage Sticker Rates Increase July 1

The rates for Wheaton's garbage/yard waste and leaf stickers will increase starting July 1, 2012, as set by Wheaton's four-year contract with Veolia, the City's waste hauler. From July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013, garbage/yard waste stickers will cost \$3.48 each, and leaf stickers will cost \$2.86 each. During the May 21 Wheaton City Council meeting, the commission presented its annual awards in three categories: student, volunteer and senior.

In the student category, the honorees are:

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Mosquito Prevention Efforts Under Way

Starting in May, the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District began placing larvicide tablets into storm water catch basins to prevent mosquito larvae from developing into biting adults. Mosquitoes have a four-stage life cycle:

egg, larva, pupa and adult. The first three stages occur in water, and the design of catch basins makes them a perfect site for mosquitoes to begin their development. It is easier to locate and

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food drives that have collected more than 13,000 pounds of food for local families, an ongoing "Food Pantry Fridays" service project and teaching others how to give back.

• **Adam Erickson**, Wheaton Warrenville South, for his work as president of Key Club, which has supported the People's Resource Center, PTA, VFW, Taste of Wheaton, school Fun Fairs, and the homeless. He also led an effort to raise nearly \$100,000 for cancer research.

• **Jonny Behrens**, Wheaton Warrenville South, for helping form an environmental group and leading recycling programs for things such as old gym shoes and lunch scraps. He also helps with a student organization that assists local homeless individuals.

In the volunteer category, the honoree is:

• **Nancy Carlson**, a member of the Give Back Club who contributes her time as a math and reading placement volunteer in local schools, as a volunteer in local resale shops and working with groups that

provide living arrangements for adults with developmental disabilities.

In the senior category, the honorees are:

• **James Whitlock** and **Fred Wayland**, for the Common Ground, a 6,600-square-foot garden that grows truck-loads of fresh produce for the People's Resource Center. They secured grants to devise an irrigation system to keep the large garden watered, and it yielded more than 1,200 pounds of produce last year for local people in need of food.

This year the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District anticipates treating 6,500 catch basins located throughout the district using contractor Clarke Mosquito Control (www.clarke.com). Residents might notice their bicycle and truck crews conducting these treatments this month.

Now is a good time for you to begin checking your yard for standing water that will attract egg-laying mosquitoes. Removing containers that hold water or simply dumping the water out can significantly reduce the number of adult mosquitoes that both annoy us and pose a risk to our health.

Rate Lowered for Energy Program

Program offers significant savings on the cost of energy

There's good news for anyone who is participating in the Clean Air Counts Energy Savings Program – and anyone who is interested in enrolling. The rate for the cost of energy has dropped again, just in time for summer energy costs to start adding up.

The rate offered through the Clean Air County Energy Savings Program has been lowered from 6.1 cents per kWh to 5.95 cents per kWh. Participants now save 15.4 percent on the cost of energy, compared with ComEd's current rate of 7.033 cents per kWh.

Enrolling in the Energy Savings Program does not change who delivers energy to your home; you continue

to receive the same familiar bill through ComEd, and in case of a power disruption, you should continue to call ComEd. The only difference is that energy is being purchased from Integrys Energy Services instead of ComEd.

This program is a result of an amendment to the Illinois Power Agency Act allowing municipalities to jointly purchase electricity for aggregated customers. The contract set through the Energy Savings Program will charge a lower rate for electricity or match ComEd's rate should it go below 5.95 cents per kWh.

Learn When to Replace Your Carbon Monoxide Alarm

Did you know that your carbon monoxide (CO) detector may have more than one kind of beep? All devices produced after Aug. 1, 2009, have an end-of-life signal that activates once the device reaches its projected end of life, meaning it is time to replace it with a new CO detector.

A carbon monoxide detector will have three signals: alarm, trouble and end-of-life. When a CO alarm detects the presence of carbon monoxide, it would give a series of four rapid beeps followed by

a five-second pause and then repeating. A trouble signal, indicating some type of fault with the detector or low battery, is a half-second beep every 30-60 seconds – just like a low battery alert on a smoke alarm. The end-of-life signal may be a distinct signal, or the same as a trouble alarm, providing that there is a visual indicator on the CO alarm to indicate that this is an end-of-life alarm.

Depending on the manufacturer, some end-of-life signals can be silenced for up to 30 days; others cannot. What

is important is that when an end-of-life signal is sounded, the CO alarm must be replaced. This is true if the unit is a standalone CO alarm, or in a combination unit with a smoke alarm.

Since January 2007, Illinois law has required a working CO alarm to be in all living units. Many CO alarms now in service were made prior to the incorporation of the new requirements and will not have an end-of-life signal. As a result, many of these alarms may not function now, as designed. If your alarm does not

have the end-of-life feature, was manufactured prior to August 2009, or you cannot find a manufactured date (located on the back of the alarm) consult any paperwork that came with the unit or research the company's website for information. If none can be found, then serious consideration should be given to replacing the CO alarm.

Illinois law requires that CO alarms must be battery powered as a primary or secondary power supply. They cannot be solely electric-powered.
