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## Sidewalk Program Underway

*Long-term program replacing squares*

Contracted crews began replacing sidewalk squares included in the 2014 Sidewalk Replacement Program the week of May 19. This is the third year in a long-term program to replace squares deemed "highly defective" according to the City's survey of more than 265 miles of sidewalks in Wheaton.

This year's program will focus on the north section of Wheaton, bounded by Harrison Avenue to the south. A contractor will be removing the existing sidewalk, framing and pouring the new sidewalk, and completing

## Please Keep Signs Out of the Parkways

As the weather warms up, garage sale signs start popping up around the city. For the safety of drivers and to avoid a ticket, please note where signs can and can't be placed.

According to Wheaton City Code Section 42-17, **signs** can't be placed in any publicly owned right-of-way,

sidewalk, crosswalk, curb, curbstone, parkway, lamp-post, hydrant, tree, shrub, tree stake or guard, or attached to any public utility, street sign or traffic sign. Violators can be ticketed for this offense.

In addition to cluttering the parkways, garage sale signs and other signs in the parkway can block sight lines

for drivers and bicyclists, creating blind spots that could create dangerous conditions.

Garage sale signs can be placed on private property, such as your own yard, or you can ask a neighbor to allow you to post a sign in their yard. Please remove the sign when the event is done.

# Garbage Sticker Price Change Effective July 1

*Current stickers still valid after July 1*

As set by the City's contract with Advanced Disposal Services, the price of garbage/yard waste and leaf stickers will increase on July 1, 2014. Garbage and yard waste, which both use the same blue stickers, will increase from \$3.48 per sticker to \$3.55. Green leaf stickers will increase from \$2.86 per sticker to \$2.92.

Stickers are available at City Hall; a number of gro-

cery, hardware and convenience stores; and by calling Advanced Disposal Services at 630-587-8282.

Please remember that each container must be no larger than 33 gallons and must weigh no more than 50 pounds in weight.

You may place your garbage, recycling and yard waste at the curb between 7 p.m. the night before your collection day and 6 a.m. on the



day of collection.

Please remove contain-

ers from the curb by 7 p.m. on your collection day.

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with even-numbered street addresses are limited to even-numbered days. However, watering is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day for all addresses. Residents who have new sod or seed can contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for a 10-day variance from this requirement.

Lawn watering restrictions are used to minimize evaporation during the hottest time of the day, which aids in water conservation.

## Aerial Spraying for Gypsy Moth

According to the Illinois Department of Agriculture, parts of Wheaton are scheduled in June for an aerial application to eliminate European Gypsy Moth.

This invasive species is one of the most damaging forest and tree pests in the U.S. Treatment is part of a statewide program to prevent the species from establishing itself outside the northeast corner of Illinois. The European Gypsy moth can strip multiple species of trees with its huge numbers of caterpillars associated with an infestation, causing trees to die in 1-3 years. The caterpillars create a substantial nuisance, making residential yards nearly unusable from mid-June to early July.

During the aerial application, a yellow fixed-wing aircraft will apply 6 grams (about 1/8 cup) per acre of the biological product Disrupt II. Application could occur any day of the week. This product, which is the chemically copied female pheromone of the European Gypsy Moth, does not pose a risk to humans, animals, non-target organisms or the environment. When an area is saturated with Disrupt II, males are not able to find the females, preventing mating.

Gypsy Moth Specialists with the Illinois Department of Agriculture will be in the field on the spray team during the program. If you have questions, contact the Illinois Department of Agriculture at 815-787-5476.

## Latex Paint Recycling Available through DuPage County Program

DuPage County residents can get rid of latex paint or pick up some re-blended paint through an annual recycling program returning to Woodridge Greene Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility.

In order to be accepted, paint must not have been frozen at any time, must be less than 10 years old and must not have been mixed with other products. You can drop off latex paint June

9 through July 3, 2014 free of charge at the Woodridge Greene Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility, 7900 S. Route 53, Woodridge. Hours are 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8 a.m.-2 p.m. on two Saturdays: June 14 and June 28.

Starting June 16, residents can pick up paint that has been filtered and re-blended into a variety of colors, types and finish-

es. Paint is offered free of charge to any resident, business or nonprofit in 5-gallon containers. Recycled paint will be distributed to residents for free during same hours and location.

### Bike Safety Tips

- Always lock your home, garage or office.

### General Safety

- Do not leave valuables in your car.
- If you must leave items

in your car, put the items in the trunk.

- When driving, always lock your doors.
- When transporting small children, use rear door child safety locks. (Your owner's manual will give you the specifics.)
- Always let loved ones know where you're going and how to reach you. It could be as simple as a note on the refrigerator, or leaving a voicemail/text message.
