Student Good Citizen Award recipients:

- Kathleen Kleeve**, St. Francis, helped residents with special needs participate in holiday activities through the Wheaton Park District and Western DuPage Special Recreation Association. She also helped with St. Francis High School's Christ-

DuPage County Offers Latex Paint Recycling Program This Summer

Those cans of latex paint in your garage or basement can be recycled and turned into new paint this summer through the DuPage County Latex Paint Recycling Program, located at the Woodridge Greene Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility, 7900 S. Route 53, Woodridge.

You can drop off paint for recycling from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. weekdays, June 6-July 29 or from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. on

select Saturdays (June 18, 25 and July 9, 16, 23).

In order to be recycled, the paint you drop off:

- must not have been frozen
- must be less than 10 years old, and
- must not have been mixed with other products.

The paint will be filtered and re-blended into a variety of colors, types and finishes. Residents, businesses and nonprofit organizations can

pick up 5-gallon containers of the recycled paint free of charge beginning June 13.

Since the program began in 2001, the County has collected more than 82,000 gallons of paint and distributed more than 41,000 gallons of recycled paint.

The annual summer festival Taste of Wheaton will bring live entertainment, food, carnival rides and more to downtown Wheaton Thursday, June 2 through Sun-


day, June 5, 2016. The Wheaton Park District and Wheaton Chamber of Commerce sponsor the Taste of Wheaton.

 - Hale Street, between Front Street and Union Avenue: Friday, June 3 and Saturday, June 4
 - Karlskoga Avenue, between Wheaton Avenue and Hale Street: Thursday, June 2 through Saturday, June 4
 - Wheaton Avenue, between Seminary and Union Avenue: Thursday, June 2 through Sunday, June 5
 - Reber Street, between Liberty Drive and Willow Avenue: 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, June 4 for the relocated French Market

Uniformed Police Officers will be posted during most of these events to assist and direct with traffic control. Motorists may experience temporary traffic delays and choose to alter their travel route to avoid these areas.

Bike Valet Available on June 4

You can skip searching for a parking spot at the Taste of Wheaton June 4 by using two wheels instead of four. The Wheaton Bicycle Advisory Committee encourages you to take advantage of free valet bike parking between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. Saturday, June 4.

Detour route signs will help direct traffic


Union Pacific Railroad will be temporarily closing the railroad crossing at Wheaton Avenue June 8-16, 2016, to vehicles and pedestrians for construction work on this crossing.

Due to one-way streets in this area, signs will be posted with a detour route

for southbound traffic on Wheaton Avenue:

- From Wheaton Avenue, turn east on Front Street
- South on Main Street
- West on Liberty Drive, and
- South on Wheaton Avenue.

Please use caution near the construction zone.

Public Hearing to Address Proposed Wireless Technology Ordinance

Ordinance is designed to protect City's existing infrastructure

As cellular technology advances, wireless telecommunications companies are introducing new types of infrastructure in order to meet the demand of customers. Some technologies look to place equipment on public property, such as on utility poles or other locations in the parkway.

The City Council will be considering an ordinance establishing rules for where companies can place this equipment and the minimum distance between devices. The purpose of the proposed ordinance is to protect the City's existing infrastructure systems and prevent residential areas from becoming oversaturated with equipment from competing wireless providers.

Unlike cell towers, equipment for new technologies such as Small Cell and Distributed Antenna Systems (DAS) provide coverage for

1/10 mile or less to allow providers to increase the capacity of their overall network. This means the provider would need to install equipment in many locations throughout an area in order to provide coverage.

The proposed ordinance would require equipment:

- to be placed only on an existing structure or utility pole in the public right-of-way,

- to be at least 500 feet away from a similar device.

The City does not have the authority to regulate equipment based on EMF (electromagnetic fields) emissions. Federal regulations control the level of EMF emissions that wireless devices can emit.
