Daylight Saving Time Reminder

Daylight Saving Time begins at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 10. When you set your clocks ahead, the Wheaton Fire Department suggests that you replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, too. Replacing the batteries about every 6 months helps ensure they are functioning properly, and daylight saving time is a good way to remind yourself when you last replaced the batteries.

Adopted Battalion Thanks Wheaton for Support

Community Relations Commission project provides care packages for entire battalion

More than 800 soldiers at Fort Riley, Kansas, recently paired their camouflage with a bit of Wheaton-wear. As a way to thank Wheaton for care packages sent through the Community Relations Commission, soldiers in the 1st Battalion, 18th Infantry Regiment of the First Division lined up in formation to share the above photo with Wheaton residents.

Back in October, Wheaton's Community Relations Commission began collecting card games, iTunes gift cards, candy and other treats for care packages as its Make a Difference Day project. The commission wanted each of the more than 800 soldiers in the battalion to receive a care package – including a specially made T-shirt with Wheaton's City seal on it – in time for the holidays. Soldiers with children also received a holiday stocking filled with additional gift items and a gift card.

"Our goal was to be able to reach out to our adopted battalion to show them a small token of how much we

truly appreciate them and to let them know that the City of Wheaton cares for them," said Desiray Young, a member of the Community Relations Commission.

Several Wheaton schools – including Lowell, Johnson and Sandburg elementary schools – set up school-wide collections to help with the project. Local businesses assisted with some of the costs for the T-shirts and shipping, and volunteers from the commission, Wheaton-Warrenville South

High School Key Club, and others helped assemble the care packages. The end result was a token of appreciation for each soldier.

"The contributions from the community far exceeded our expectations," Young said. "Together, we brightened the day of a soldier, and that's what really counts."

The soldiers asked the commission to let the residents of Wheaton know how deeply grateful they are for the community's generosity and thoughtfulness, especially during the holidays.

In response, Community Relations Commission Chairperson Renée Webb said, "The commission believes that we and the people of Wheaton received much more than we gave."

Wheaton's special relationship with this battalion began in 2006, when the community pulled together to provide special needs housing to a local resident and 18th Infantry soldier who was severely injured in Operation Iraqi Freedom. In 2008, the City of Wheaton formally adopted the soldiers as honorary citizens.

Online Forum for Downtown Plan is Back

The City continues to make progress in forming a long-term plan for Downtown Wheaton with another opportunity for the community to help guide the plan.

During the summer and fall of 2012, the Design Workshop consultant team solicited initial input from the community regarding the future vision for Downtown

Wheaton and some general ideas for its improvement over the next 20 years. The project team analyzed a number of factors – including traffic, infrastructure and the local market – to assist the City Council in reaching a consensus “vision” for Downtown’s future.

The consulting team once again is using the Mind-Mixer online forum to solicit

input from the community. The online forum previously solicited feedback from the community, and it is being used again as a way for the community to continue the discussion.

Fluorescent Tube Disposal Added to Monthly Electronic Collections

Bulb Eater safely captures mercury vapor; prevents it from being released into air

A new machine with a fierce-sounding name has the potential to reduce mercury in Wheaton. At last month's electronic recycling drop-off event, the City's Environmental Improvement Commission began using its new Bulb Eater Lamp Crusher, a machine that safely disposes of mercury found in certain types of fluorescent bulbs. Residents can drop off fluorescent tubes in addition to recycling nearly any type of electronic from 9 a.m. to noon on the second Saturday of each month at the Wheaton Public Works Storage Yard, 820 W. Liberty Drive. Please note that compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) cannot be accepted.

The Environmental Improvement Commission purchased a Bulb Eater Lamp Crusher in order to help reduce the amount of harmful mercury that ends up in our local environment. When fluorescent tubes break, they release mercury vapor into the atmosphere, a highly toxic substance that can affect the human nervous system and harm the brain, heart, kidneys, lungs and immune system.

Previously, the closest location for residents to safely dispose of fluorescent tubes – such as the long tubes found in utility rooms and basements – was at the regional hazardous waste drop-off site in Naperville. By adding fluorescent tube disposal to the City's monthly collections, the Environmental Improvement Commission hopes that resi-

dents will choose this safe and convenient option rather than tossing bulbs in the trash.

"I see these types of tubes in people's trash all the time," said Kay McKeen, a member of the Environmental Improvement Commission. "We hope that residents will take advantage of this program so that we can reduce the amount of mercury in and around Wheaton."

This program is currently limited to Wheaton residents, and not businesses. The types of bulbs accepted include T-12, T-8 and T-5 fluorescent tubes, aquarium tubes and under-counter fluorescent tubes. The machine works using vacuum force to draw

in the tube into an air-tight container that simultaneously crushes the bulb and captures the mercury vapor.
