### No Garbage Pickup on May 27

There will be no garbage, recycling and yard waste pickup on Monday, May 27, 2013 in observance of the Memorial Day holiday. Pickup for the week of May 27-31 will be delayed by one day.

### City Offices Closed

City of Wheaton offices will be closed on Monday, May 27. They will reopen on May 28.

### Lawn Watering Restrictions Begin

To minimize evaporation during the hottest time of day and promote water conservation, annual lawn watering restrictions go into effect from May 15 to Sept. 15. Residents with odd-numbered street addresses can water their lawns on odd-numbered days and those with even-numbered addresses are limited to even-numbered days. All sprinkling is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day. Contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for a 10-day new sod/seed variance.

## Portion of North Main Street Closed during Flood Control Construction

*Southbound traffic will be rerouted around work area*

The City of Wheaton is scheduled to begin work on the North Main Street Flood Control Project in early May with an anticipated completion in late October 2013. The purpose of this project is to reduce the frequency of flooding on North Main Street during storm events.

The scope of this project includes replacing the existing culvert pipes with a bridge, widening the channel and stabilizing the stream bank to reduce erosion. These enhancements will help convey storm water downstream to Northside Park.

There will be two detour routes (see map). North Main Street at the bridge will remain open only to northbound traffic throughout construction.

### Two Detour Routes:

**1. For southbound Main Street traffic wanting to continue beyond the construction zone,** a detour will route traffic west on Geneva Road, south on Gary Avenue, east on Harrison Avenue and back to Main Street.

**2. To access local businesses/homes located in the North Main Street construction zone** (between Parkway Drive and Cole Avenue): use the local business route posted at Cole Avenue

## Northside Interceptor Sewer Open House

The Wheaton Sanitary District will be holding an open house from 6 p.m.-8:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 22 at Wheaton City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St., for residents to find out more about the results of a study to replace the Northside Interceptor Sewer. This is a large-diameter sewer that transports waste from areas in southern Carol Stream and western Wheaton to the Wheaton Sanitary District Wastewater Treatment Plant. Its route includes the Marionjoy facility, residential areas west of downtown Wheaton, Northside Park and Carol Stream.

Representatives from the Wheaton Sanitary District and Baxter & Woodman Consulting Engineers, the firm conducting the study, will provide information at the open house.

# Help in the Fight Against West Nile Virus

Since it was first diagnosed in 1999, West Nile Virus has become a well-established annual mosquito-borne disease threat nationwide. Last year saw a dramatic resurgence, with 5,387 human cases reported nationally, including 289 Illinois cases and 12 fatalities. DuPage County accounted for 56 of the West Nile Virus cases in the state, 5 of which were fatal.

Symptoms of the disease are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some individuals, West Nile Virus can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or death. The disease is most serious in those with compromised immune systems and the elderly.

The City of Wheaton is within the boundary of the 22-square mile Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District. The objectives of the district are to control nuisance mosquitoes,

reduce the potential of mosquito-borne disease transmission, and provide a comfortable and healthy atmosphere for district residents. The program primarily targets the floodwater mosquito – the dominant nuisance species, and the northern house mosquito – the potential disease carrier.

Environmentally sensitive and effective mosquito control is accomplished utilizing Integrated Pest Management, an approach that includes larval site monitoring, biological control, and the careful, strategic use of EPA-labeled and registered pesticide products. The key is to concentrate on larval control within the district boundary, scientifically assess the adult population, and perform adulticiding only on an as needed basis.

## What Can You Do?

You can take the following steps to protect yourself against infection and assist in the fight against West Nile Virus:

- If outdoors when mos-

quitoes are active, dress in light-colored, long-sleeved clothing, long pants and socks when outdoors during prime mosquito hours. Apply mosquito repellent with DEET to clothing and exposed skin.

- Report neglected pools to the mosquito hotline at 1-800-942-2555. Technicians are dispatched to inspect and treat the pool, as necessary to eliminate the risk.

- Discard any outdoor container that might hold water or empty water from wading pools and birdbaths once a week.

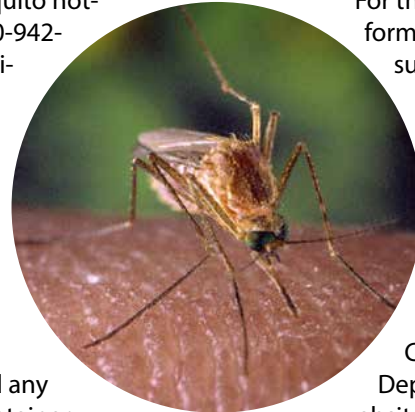
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there.

- Do not dump grass clippings into low lying areas that collect water after rain falls to

prevent mosquito larvae development.

- Report dead birds on your property to the DuPage County Health Department. Dead birds can be the first indicators of the presence of West Nile Virus.

# Preservation Week Celebrates Wheaton History

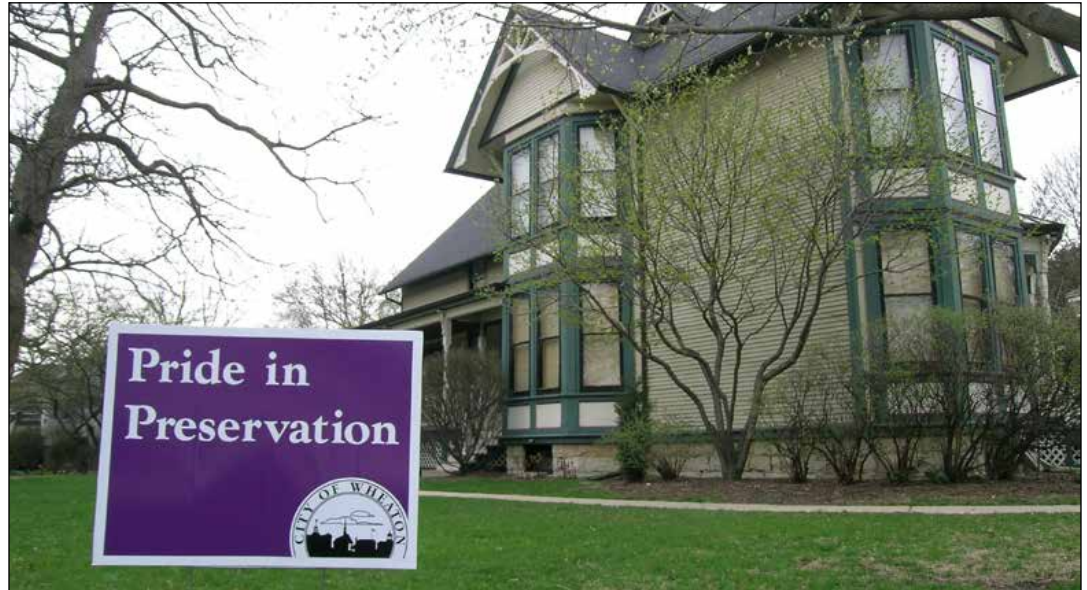

# Rebates Extended for Energy Efficiency Improvements

**E**nergy Impact Illinois, a program partnership of local government, utility companies like ComEd, Nicor Gas, and other non-profit groups, has extended rebates and loans available to homeowners who complete energy efficiency home improvements by August 2013. Interested homeowners are encouraged to sign up for the program soon to allow for time to complete improvements before the August deadline.

The extension will allow more area homeowners an opportunity to get a low-cost energy assessment and complete home energy improvements that will result in

immediate improved comfort and cost savings.

Rebates of up to \$1,750 – or up to 70 percent off the cost of home energy upgrades like sealing air leaks and improving insulation – are available to homeowners who complete improvements by

Aug. 26, 2013 or when funds are expended. Energy assessments, which typically cost hundreds of dollars, are also available for \$99. In addition, Energy Impact Illinois is offering a free home assessment



for homeowners who host a house party where family, friends and neighbors learn about energy efficiency from a program expert and a certified contractor by using your home to illustrate building

science concepts. Sealing air leaks and insulat-

ing a home are two of the most cost-effective and permanent improvements that homeowners can make. More than half of total energy costs come from heating and cooling a home,

and almost all homes let too much air escape or penetrate. Most homes also have incorrectly installed or insufficient amounts of attic insulation. Energy Impact Illinois connects homeowners with certified and vetted contractors who take a whole-home approach to maximize savings.

Energy Impact Illinois is run by the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning through a grant from the U.S. Department of Energy.

# Final Chance for Downtown Plan Input is May 29



**T**he City will be hosting a final opportunity for input on the Downtown Wheaton Streetscape and Strategic Plan at a public meeting at 7 p.m. May 29 at the DuPage County Historical Museum Auditorium, 102 E. Wesley St.

The Design Workshop team will be presenting the ideas to be included in the

downtown strategic and streetscape plans and seeking final public input. In particular, the consultants will be focusing on how to promote redevelopment south of the tracks, how to prioritize the various ideas and improvements outlined in the plan, and the initial moves the City and local businesses can make to move the Down-

town forward over the next few years.

The session will include a short series of survey questions, and the consultant team will incorporate information received from the public at the meeting into the final product from the study, which will be presented to City Council this summer.

# Be Ready for Tornadoes this Spring

*Know the difference between a tornado watch or warning and what you should do*

**T**ornadoes are violent, rotating storms with winds that can exceed 300 miles per hour. Nearly 1,000 tornadoes touchdown in the United States every year.

## Know what to do to prepare for a tornado:

- Be alert to weather conditions
  - Designate a shelter area in your home, such as the basement, storm cellar or the lowest building level available and go to center of an interior room, away from walls
- Know the danger signs of a tornado:
  - Dark, often greenish sky
  - Large hail
  - Large, dark, low-lying clouds (particularly if rotating)
  - Large roar, similar to that of a freight train

**Tornado Watch:** Severe thunderstorms or tornadoes are possible in the area. Stay tuned to radio or TV and watch the sky.

**Tornado Warning:** Severe weather has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar. Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property to those in the path of the storm.

## What to do during a tornado watch

- Stay tuned to radio or TV for updates
- Watch for danger signs of a tornado
- If you see approaching storms or any danger signs, be prepared to take shelter at any time; some tornadoes advance so quickly that advance warning is not possible.
- Stay out of large, flat buildings with wide-open areas such as supermarkets or shopping malls

- Stock your home shelter area with a flashlight, a battery-powered radio, extra batteries, water and a first aid kit

## What to do during a tornado warning

If you are under a tornado WARNING, seek shelter immediately!

- Go to your designated shelter area
- If in any structure, head to the basement. If there is no basement head to the lowest building level, go to the center of the room away from windows, corners walls, and outside walls
  - Get under a sturdy table and use your arms to protect head and neck.
  - Do not open windows
  - If you are in a vehicle, trailer, or mobile home, get out immediately and seek shelter in a nearby building
  - If outside with no shelter, lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression and cover your head and neck with your hands. Do not get under and overpass or bridge
- Watch out for flying debris



## When are tornado sirens activated in Wheaton?

1. When requested by an official
2. Observed by trained weather spotters and confirmed by Police Officer
3. Tornado warning or damaging storm heading toward City based on National Weather Service reports

There is no all clear signal given.

In the event that the tornado sirens have been activated, please stay tuned to your TV or radio for severe weather information and updates.

**Note:** Tornado sirens are tested the first Tuesday of every month at 10 a.m.
