Paper Shredding Results

The April 9 paper shredding event organized by Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission resulted in 29,200 pounds of paper shredded in just four hours. This amount was 16,140 pounds more than the previous year's event.

Lawn Watering Restrictions

Annual lawn watering restrictions go into effect from May 15 to September 15. Residents with odd-numbered street addresses can water their lawns on odd-numbered days and those with even-numbered addresses are limited to even-numbered days. Lawn watering is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day.

Input will help select City's next garbage contract

Thanks to 2,172 Wheaton residents who completed the City's survey on garbage, recycling and yard waste service, the City received useful feedback on the type of service residents want in Wheaton's next waste hauler contract.

Some findings from the survey results include:

- Approximately 85% of survey respondents felt satisfied or very satisfied with garbage collection, while 95% felt satisfied or very sat-



isfied with recycling collection.

- 59% of respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with purchasing stickers for garbage and yard waste, while 27% were dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with the process.

- Survey takers expressed strong support for "pay-as-you-throw" pricing for gar-

80% of survey takers agreed that garbage collection costs should be based on how much garbage they generate.

bage (where you pay for the volume of garbage you produce); 80% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the cost of garbage collection should be distributed to households based on how much garbage they generate. 16% said they agree or strongly agree that the cost should be distributed evenly among households.

You will need to bring your own bicycle and helmet to the class and wear comfortable clothing for riding.

Survey

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- 49% agreed or strongly agreed that the cost of recycling should be distributed evenly among households, while 35% said they agree or strongly agree that cost for recycling should be based on how much recyclable material they generate.
- When asked if they would prefer a monthly fee-based cart service over the current sticker system, 32% would favor or strongly favor a monthly fee; 56% disfavor or strongly disfavor a monthly fee-based cart service.
- 47% would favor or

strongly favor a program where they were charged automatically only when they set their garbage cart at the curb; 34% would disfavor or strongly disfavor this alternative.

- 61% of respondents said they would like a standardized wheeled cart of a size of their choice supplied for garbage collection. 41% said they would like a similar cart for yard waste.

- 26% said they would like the option of having food waste collected in the same cart as their yard waste for composting; 25% said they didn't know if they would like the food scrap composting option.

West Nile and Zika Virus Update

To inform Wheaton residents about West Nile virus and Zika virus, the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District provides the following update on these mosquito-transmitted viruses.

West Nile Virus

Since 1999, West Nile virus (WNV) has rapidly spread across the United States causing over 43,739 human cases, including 1,867 fatalities, during the past 17 years. Intensive mosquito population surveillance is performed by the State of Illinois Department of Health, DuPage County Health Department, the Forest Preserve District of DuPage County and Clarke Mosquito Control.

WNV symptoms are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some individuals, WNV can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or death.

Take the following steps to help protect yourself against infection and assist in the fight against West Nile Virus:

- If outdoors when mosquitoes are active, dress in light-colored, long-sleeved clothing, long pants and socks. Apply mosquito repellent with DEET to clothing and exposed skin.

- Neglected swimming pools can be ideal sources for larval development to the mosquito species that transmits West Nile virus. Report neglected pools to the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District's Mosquito Hotline at 800-942-2555. Techni-



cians will be dispatched to inspect and treat the pool, if necessary.

- Discard any outdoor container that might hold water or empty water from wading pools and birdbaths once a week.

- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there.

- Do not dump grass clippings into low-lying areas that collect water after rain falls to prevent mosquito larvae development.

- Report dead birds on your property to the DuPage County Health Department. Dead birds (crows, blue jays and raptors) can be the first indicators of the presence of WNV in the area.

- To be notified by phone when mosquito spraying will take place, Call 1-800-942-2555.

Zika Virus Update

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, local transmission of Zika virus in Illinois is unlikely.

To date, the reported U.S. cases have been from vaca-

tioners returning from South America and Caribbean islands.

Zika virus is primarily transmitted from person to person by the bite of an infected mosquito, *Aedes aegypti* (the yellow fever mosquito), a species native to tropical areas, including the deep south of the United States. *Aedes aegypti* is rare to absent in most of Illinois because it cannot survive freezing temperatures.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 20% of people infected with Zika virus will manifest clinical symptoms of fever, rash, and joint pain. The other 80% of the population will not exhibit any symptoms or ever know they have the disease.

The highest risk population is pregnant women and women of child-bearing age. The CDC has stated Zika virus can be transmitted to the fetus and also through breast milk. Therefore, pregnant women are recommended to avoid travel to areas of active Zika virus transmission.

There have been recent reports of sexual transmission of Zika virus, but further research is necessary to fully understand the role and impact of sexual transmission in the spread of this virus.

Reminder on Garage Sale Rules

City ordinance sets number of sales and signs allowed

To help maintain the character of residential neighborhoods, the City of Wheaton has an ordinance placing limits on garage sales in Wheaton. The ordinance defines "garage sales" to include sales, bartering, trading or giveaways conducted outdoors or partially outdoors.

The rules prohibit you from operating any of the above at a single address:

- Before 8 a.m. or after 5 p.m.

- More than two consecutive days

- More than two times in any calendar year

- On the public right-of-way (the parkway).

In addition, there are rules for the number and type of signs allowed.

- You may display one sign, sized 3 square feet or less, on your lawn.

- You can also use no more than two directional signs, each a size of 3 square feet or less, at other locations, as long as you receive permission from the property owners.

- All signs must be on private property, not in the public right-of-way (such as the parkway or sidewalk).

- You can put out garage sale signs no more than two days before the sale, and you must remove all signs on the final day of the sale.

Violating any terms of this ordinance can result in a minimum fine of \$100.



Learn Why a Creek near You Might Look Green

Wheaton's Sewer Division occasionally performs dye testing in sanitary sewers. This method uses a safe, non-toxic dye to check for places where rain water can enter the sanitary sewers, overwhelming the sanitary sewer system and potentially causing backups in basements.

First, crews use water and a non-toxic green dye to saturate the ground, or crews will temporarily plug storm sewers near the testing area and fill them using a fire hydrant and dye. Then, they use video cameras in the sanitary sewers to see where the dye is



entering the sanitary sewer. This shows crews the exact locations that need repairing and what repairs need to be made.

If you happen to see a local creek looking green, it is likely from dye testing in the area. This dye begins to dissipate when exposed to sunlight and normal dilution.

The 2016 Lowell School 5K Run/Walk will be held on Saturday, May 7, 2016, beginning at 9 a.m. The following streets will be closed for this event:


