Find Out if Your Street will be Under Construction This Year

Some road projects require different levels of work

Each year, the City develops a plan for which streets will be improved during the construction season. In the spring and summer months, construction crews will be working on streets throughout the community.

Some of these projects require more work than others.

- **Street reconstruction**, the most extensive type of project, involves removing the pavement, the base below it and sometimes the curb, too.

- **Street rehabilitation** includes replacing the curb and resurfacing the entire pavement surface (but not removing the entire pavement and base below it).

- **Street resurfacing** involves grinding the existing pavement and placing a new pavement layer.



• **Road maintenance**, the least extensive type of project, can include patching, partial resurfacing, filling potholes and fixing other surface defects.

Additionally, some projects require underground water main work, which extends construction time.

All of the streets in this year's road construction program are listed on the City's website at www.wheaton.il.us/roads, and you can also see a map of these projects on the City's website. You can see the street segments planned for

construction and the current status of each project.

Based on the type of project, construction will be completed either by crews contracted by the City (R.W. Duntzman Co), state of Illinois (K-Five Construction) or the City's Public Works Department.

Lawn Watering restrictions

Annual lawn watering restrictions go into effect from May 15 to Sept. 15. Residents with odd-numbered street addresses can water their lawns on odd-numbered days and those with even-numbered addresses are limited to even-numbered days. Sprinkling is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day. Contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for a 10-day new sod/seed variance.

Council Passes Annual Budget

At its April 17 meeting, the City Council voted to approve the 2017-18 annual City budget. For all funds, revenues are projected at \$96,301,809, with expenditures at \$96,797,941. The budget includes planned deficit spending to draw down fund balances and invest those funds into capital projects. These capital projects include implementing the Downtown Strategic Plan and Streetscape Plan, roadway improvements, sidewalk improvements and other infrastructure improvements.

City staff prepared a draft budget for the Council's consideration, and the City Council and City staff held three public Budget Workshop Sessions to discuss the proposed budget. The [annual budget is available on the City's website](#).

New Option Available for Paying Your Garbage & Recycling Bill

Lakeshore Recycling Systems now offers a prepaid auto-replenishing option for paying for your garbage/recycling service in Wheaton, as well as secure access to more information about your account.

Auto-Replenishing Billing Option

Similar to the Illinois Tollway Authority's iPass method of payment, you can now keep a running credit on your Lakeshore Recycling Systems account. You choose the dollar amount by which you would like to auto-replenish your account. Each time your LRS account balance falls below \$5, your account will automatically replenish with the amount you have chosen (\$15 is the



recommended balance).

If you do not want to use the auto-replenishing prepaid option, you will still have the option of on-demand payment. If you choose to pay your invoice this way, you will set the dollar amount that Lakeshore Recycling Systems is authorized to draw from either a credit card or checking account. Each monthly invoice will draw the balance due up to the authorized amount, and nothing more (balances beyond this amount roll over into your next invoice).

Detailed Service Information

Also, Lakeshore Recycling Systems has added the option for residents to securely review the details of their account in a calendar format. This allows each resident a protected way to verify when their home was serviced and the charge for each service.

Hydrant Flushing Process Under Way

The City's Water Division began its 2017 Hydrant Flushing Program on April 30 and will continue for approximately two weeks. To minimize inconvenience to residents, hydrant flushing will be done between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday.

The purpose of this program is to flush out particles that accumulate in water lines.

During or immediately following the hydrant flushing, water discoloration



may occur. It is best not to draw large amounts of water if you experience


Pride in Preservation Signs

Put an End to Distracted Driving

During the week of April 24-28, the Wheaton Police Department participated in the first-ever Illinois Distracted Driving Awareness Week to bring attention to the dangers associated with driving distracted.

A few facts about distracted driving:

- 3,477 people were killed in auto accidents involving distracted drivers in 2015. This increased 9% from the previous year.

- 10% of fatal crashes and 15% of injury crashes in 2015 were attributed to distracted driving.

- While 8 in 10 drivers believe it is unacceptable for



a motorist to text or e-mail behind the wheel, more than a third of these respondents admit to reading text messages while driving.

Ways you can reduce distractions:

- Turn off your phone or switch it to silent before you drive. If you need to make a call, have a passenger call for you, or pull over to a safe place.

- Apply makeup or shave before getting in the car.

- Stay safer, text later. Don't text and drive, check email or surf the web while driving.

- Plan ahead by reviewing directions or programming your GPS system before you start driving.

- Secure your pets before driving.

- If a situation arises with a child passenger that needs addressing, pull over to a safe

location so you can address the situation, not while you are driving.

- Refrain from eating, drinking, smoking or another activity that takes your hands, mind or eyes off the road.

Help keep our roadways safe. Illinois Distracted Driving Awareness Week was a joint effort by the City of Wheaton, Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police, the State of Illinois and AAA.

New Council Sworn in May 1

Four City District representatives elected to serve

Four Wheaton City Council members representing Wheaton's four districts will be sworn into office for four-year terms at the May 1 City Council meeting. These residents were elected into office during the April 4, 2017 Consolidated General Election.

Representing the North District is incumbent Philip Suess. Incumbent John Rutledge will represent the South District. Newcomer Michael Barbier will represent the East District. Representing the West District is incumbent Todd Scalzo.



West Nile Virus and Zika Virus Update

Each year, the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District (a separate government entity from the City of Wheaton covering a 22-square-mile area) monitors the area for mosquito-transmitted diseases in cooperation with the Illinois Department of Health, DuPage County Health Department and Forest Preserve District of DuPage County.

Under the authority of the Illinois Mosquito Abatement District, field technicians from Clarke Mosquito perform mosquito control activities on public and private properties for the control of mosquitoes and protection of public health. This includes larval site monitoring, biological control and strategic use of EPA-labeled and registered pesticide products, if necessary.

West Nile Virus

West Nile virus is spread through the bite of infected mosquitoes. Symptoms are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some individuals, WNV can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or

death. The disease is most serious – even fatal – in those with compromised immune systems and the elderly.

Since 1999, West Nile virus (WNV) has rapidly spread across the United States causing over 45,892 human cases, including 1,988 fatalities. In 2016, DuPage County recorded 10 human WNV cases.

Zika Virus

Zika virus is primarily transmitted from person to person by the bite of an infected mosquito, *Aedes aegypti* (the yellow fever mosquito), a species native to tropical areas, including the deep south of the United States. *Aedes aegypti* is rare to absent in most of Illinois because it cannot survive freezing temperatures. *Aedes albopictus* (Asian tiger mosquito), a species found south of I-80, is believed to be a less efficient vector of Zika.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 20% of people infected with Zika virus will exhibit symptoms of fever, rash, and joint pain. The other 80% of the population will not exhibit any symptoms or ever know they have the disease. The highest risk population is pregnant women and women of child-bearing age. The

CDC has stated Zika virus can be transmitted to the fetus and also through breast milk. Therefore, pregnant women are recommended to avoid travel to areas of active Zika virus transmission. Sexual transmission of Zika is another confirmed path that this disease will be spread.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, local transmission of Zika virus in the state of Illinois is unlikely. As of February 2017, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 94 cases of Zika virus – all of which occurred by traveling to a region where the Zika virus is present in mosquitoes. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the only state with Zika acquired from local mosquitoes are Florida and Texas.
