Wheaton City Manager Mike Dzugan announced that he is appointing Deputy Chief William (Bill) Murphy to the position of Chief of Police, following Chief Jim Volpe's retirement.

Currently serving as Deputy Chief of Police of Support, Murphy has been a member of the Wheaton Police Department since 1990. Over the last 28 years, he has served as Patrol Officer, Field Training Officer, Detective, Officer-in-

Charge, Sergeant, and Lieutenant.

"Deputy Chief Murphy's vast experience and commitment to the City of Wheaton will allow him to efficiently and effectively lead the department while continuing to keep our community one of the safest in the nation," said Dzugan.

Deputy Chief Murphy has a Bachelor of Science (Criminal Justice Management) from Aurora University and a Master's Degree

Non-emergency City of Wheaton offices will be closed on Wednesday, July 4. They will reopen on Thursday, July 5.


Help for Injured Wildlife

Temporary Stop Signs In Use during Downtown Construction

The traffic signals at Main & Front Street and Main & Liberty Street have been turned off and put on stop sign control as contractors work to install and tie in new signal infrastructure on Front Street as part of the Downtown Streetscape Project.

Southbound traffic on Main Street crossing the tracks will not stop at Liberty. The other three legs of this intersection will have warning signs indicating that the

southbound traffic does not stop.

Northbound vehicles on Main Street will have a stop sign right before the train tracks and then will have free-flow access across the intersection of Front Street. Both sides of the train tracks will have signs posted reminding drivers and pedestrians "Do Not Stop on Tracks."

The City will be monitoring the flow of traffic throughout this time to determine if any changes need to be implemented. Parade

Thousands attend one of Wheaton's most

notable events each year: the Wheaton Independence Day Parade. The parade will step off at 10 a.m.

This year's parade theme, American Heroes, pays tribute to all of our American Heroes, such as our military (active or veterans), police, firefighters, first responders and all the others who are heroes.

Due to construction in downtown Wheaton, the parade route will

be slightly different than usual. It will begin at Main Street and Hawthorne Boulevard, traveling south on Main Street. The parade will turn west (right) onto Wesley Street, concluding in front of City Hall.

This year's announcing and judging will take place on Main Street between Seminary and Wesley.

Fireworks Safety Reminders from Wheaton Fire Department

The Wheaton Fire Department reminds you that fireworks are best left to professionals. Fireworks annually cause devastating burns, injuries, fires, and even death, making them too dangerous to be used safely by consumers.

Most fireworks

are illegal in the state of Illinois, including fireworks bought in other states and brought into Illinois. This includes generally any fireworks that explode, shoot a flame, or go up in the air, such as bottle rockets.

Legal fireworks



include sparklers, smoke bombs and caps. However, these items also can be hazardous, with sparklers burning at a temperature of more than 1,200 degrees F. In the U.S., approximately 11,000 injuries – the majority of

which involve children younger than 15 – occur each year related to fireworks, in addition to nearly 20,000 fires sparked by fireworks. Please leave fireworks to the professionals to ensure a happy and safe Independence Day.

State Resurfacing Roosevelt Road

Project's completion date anticipated for late fall

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be resurfacing Roosevelt Road (Route 38) from just west of Pierce Avenue in Wheaton to Nicoll

Way in Glen Ellyn. This project involves replacing sidewalks at all intersections for ADA compliance, clearing of some trees along various locations, and resurfacing the

roadway. This work will be performed by state-contracted crews from R.W. Dunteman.

The project is anticipated to be completed in the late fall of 2018.

No Electronic Recycling Drop-off in August

Due to construction work happening at the Public Works Storage Yard, the City's monthly electronic drop-off will not occur in August. Depending upon the project's completion date, the September drop-off might be cancelled as well.

Take advantage of July event or use curbside option

Public Works Storage Yard, 820 W Liberty Drive, from 9 a.m. to noon. You can bring many types of electronics, fluorescent tube bulbs (no CFLs), cooking oil, scrap metal and more. Please note that there is a charge to recycle TVs and monitors.

Another option is to take advantage of the curbside electronic

recycling option available for Lakeshore Recycling Systems customers. To have your electronics collected at the curb on your garbage day, you must call Lakeshore Recycling Systems at 773-685-8811 at least one day before your garbage day.

Curbside collection requires the following

number of stickers:

- E-Waste single item: 1 sticker = \$2.81
- E-Waste bundle (within brown paper bag): 5 stickers = \$14.05
- E-Waste TV or computer monitor: 10 stickers = \$28.10

DuPage County Offers Latex Paint Recycling Program

DuPage County is hosting a Latex Paint Recycling Program through Aug. 4 at the Woodridge Greene Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility, 7900 S Route 53, Woodridge.


Drop off your usable, unwanted latex paint during designated summer collections free of charge. The County will accept latex-based paint that has not been frozen, is less than 10 years old and has not been mixed with other products. The paint

will be filtered and re-blended into a variety of colors, types and finishes. The recycled paint will then be offered free in 5-gallon containers. Dropoff is limited to residents. Paint from businesses, contractors or commercial entities will not be accepted.

You can drop off latex paint between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. Monday through Saturday through Aug. 4. Recycled paint will be distributed during the same hours. No warranty expressed or

implied accompanies the recycled paint. Resale of recycled paint is forbidden without expressed written
