No Burning Leaves

Please remember that burning leaves is a violation of Wheaton City Code. Burning leaves can release pollutants and mold spores into the air through its smoke, in addition to being a nuisance to neighbors.

Instead, you can dispose of them with one yard waste/garbage sticker per container or biodegradable bag at the curb on your garbage day, or you can compost leaves. Yard waste/garbage stickers are available at City Hall and local grocery and hardware stores. See www.wheaton.il.us/yardwaste.

Spotlight on the New Features You Will Find on Front Street

Have you seen Front Street lately? In addition to work completed underground last fall (including replacing sewer pipes and installing new water mains), recently completed upgrades above-ground are providing new gathering spaces and features in downtown Wheaton. Crews are putting the finishing touches on the first of four phases in the Downtown Streetscape Project.

“We’re thrilled to wrap up the first phase of work and for our community to be able to enjoy the newly improved Front Street,” said Assistant City Manager John Duguay. “We appreciate our local businesses and business owners, who have been patient

through an extensive construction project. There's no easy way to dig down as much as 15 feet underground to take out 100-year-old pipes, and we are thankful to have fantastic business owners who worked with us throughout this process.”

These improvements range from the noticeable items –

like the new outdoor fireplace – to the features you may not have noticed, like new benches and streetlights. Here are some of the many elements that are part of this project:

The next phase is



well underway, as crews complete underground infrastructure improvements on Hale from Willow to Seminary, Wesley from Wheaton to Cross, and Cross from Front to Wesley.

Crews from John Neri Construction Company are replacing water main and sanitary sewers on these street segments. This underground work is expected to be complete the week of Nov. 5. Crews will resume Phase 2 in late spring 2019 with above-ground work including sidewalks, roadways, lighting, landscaping and signage.

Bring Pumpkins to Annual Pumpkin Smash

Green your Halloween by keeping your pumpkins out of landfills. The City's Environmental Improvement Commission is bringing back its Pumpkin Smash drop-off from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, Nov. 3, at the City's Commuter Lot 9, located at Liberty Drive and Carlton Avenue.

As one of the three first pumpkin compost sites in Illinois, Wheaton is proud to have helped divert more than 163 tons of pumpkins from landfills since the program's inception in 2014.

Organizers ask that you please remove stickers, candles and



other decorative objects from pumpkins. Then, simply drive up and drop off your pumpkins for composting. From there, thousands of pounds of pumpkins will be hauled off and composted into nutrient-rich soil.

Why Keep Pumpkins Out of the Landfill?

- Decomposing organics make landfills the third largest producers of methane
- Composting returns nutrients and water back to the soil; pumpkins are

nutrient-rich

- Pumpkins are 90% water: good for our soil, bad for our landfills

This collection will be run by Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission, the City of Wheaton and SCARCE.

During the sessions, which will take place in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 303 W Wesley Street, City staff and the City Council will discuss and review the

proposed City budget for the upcoming fiscal year. This upcoming budget will match the calendar year, as the City has transitioned from a May to April fiscal year to a calendar year budget starting with this budget.

The proposed budget will be available on the City's website before the budget workshop sessions.

Changes Coming to City's Electronic Recycling Drop-off Program

Starting in January, the types of items being accepted at the monthly electronic recycling drop-off will change due to state legislation involving electronics companies. The following items will not be accepted at the monthly events: small appliances such as toaster ovens, coffee pots or microwaves; household batteries; stereos/radios.

You will still be able to drop off computers, televisions (a fee applies to recycle TVs and monitors), printers, DVD players, video game consoles, cell phones, tablets, cable boxes, fax machines, servers, VCRs, phones, power supplies, wires/cables/adapters.

Holiday Light Recycling Available

Wheaton's holiday light recycling program is back. From Nov. 19 through Jan. 25, bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate.

This program is for light strings only. Please



do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and do not put lights in a bag or box.

Elgin Recycling, www.elginrecycling.com, will

collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas.

In addition to residents, the City also welcomes businesses, schools and other organizations wanting to dispose of holiday lights to participate in the program. There is no limit as to how many lights you can drop off for recycling.

Protect Pets & Discourage Coyotes from Your Area

Feeding wild animals such as coyotes and feral cats violates City Code, and violators can face fines. Please help make sure wild animals such as coyotes are not fed - either intentionally or unintentionally. Feeding wild animals abnormally attracts coyotes and promotes increased numbers of rodents, birds and other creatures that can provide major

portions of the coyote's natural diet.

How to Protect Pets:

- Keep small pets (cats, rabbits, small dogs) indoors. Don't allow them to run free at any time. They are easy prey.
- Use a short leash when walking your pet. Never let a coyote get between you and your pet.
- Dogs should be brought inside after dark

and never allowed to run loose. This is especially important during mating season, which is February through April.

- Do not leave domestic pet food outside. Wildlife will soon depend on it.
- Fences do not guarantee your pet's safety. Always attend to small pets outdoors.
