CITY NOTES

City Offices Closed

Non-emergency City of Wheaton offices will be closed on Monday, Feb. 18, in observance of Presidents' Day. Offices will reopen on Feb. 19. Garbage/recycling pickup will not be affected by the holiday.

Keep Sidewalks Clear

The City encourages you to keep the sidewalks near your home clear of snow for the safety of children walking to school or bus stops and other pedestrians. Please consider assisting neighbors who may be unable to clear their sidewalks.

Businesses in the C-2 and C-4 Zoning Districts are required to remove snow and ice from the sidewalks along their buildings within 24 hours after snow/sleet/freezing rain ends. [Please see this section of the City Code](#) for full details and penalties for violation of this Code.

Mayor Gresk Presents Final State of the City Address

Mayor Michael Gresk presented his 12th and final State of the City Address on Jan. 17 at the Wheaton Chamber of Commerce's monthly luncheon. During his presentation, Mayor Gresk presented a [video recap](#) of the City's accomplishments of 2018 and shared some upcoming projects on the horizon for 2019.

One highlight for Wheaton was being named the safest city in Illinois, and public safety continues to be a priority for the City. In 2018, Wheaton enacted a new 25 mph neighborhood speed limit to ensure motorists are driving with care through our residential areas. Also in 2018, the City welcomed new Police Chief Bill Murphy, who took the reins from Chief Volpe, who retired after 35 years with the Wheaton Police Department.

Another public safety highlight for 2018 was the Wheaton Fire Department graduating another class of residents in its Citizens Fire Academy, giving them a hands-on experience to understand how the Fire Department operates.

Mayor Gresk also highlighted work the City has done to improve its infrastructure and above-ground amenities, including completing Phase 1 of the Downtown Streetscape Plan. In 2018, the City celebrated

the completion of Front Street improvements and its centerpiece, the new Martin Memorial Plaza. The community can enjoy new seating areas, an outdoor fireplace, water feature, overhead light strings and more in the plaza, in addition to improvements throughout the Front Street project area. This includes wider sidewalks, new planters, dark-sky friendly LED streetlights, benches and more.

Other improvements to the City's infrastructure in 2018 included paving 5 miles of roads, planting 517 trees, cleaning 143,000 feet of sanitary sewer lines, and more. The Engineering Department completed eight stormwater studies and is developing a cost-effective long-term flow reduction plan for the sanitary sewer system. The City also launched a new sidewalk program to add sidewalks in areas identified as a priority for children who walk to and from school, and for other pedestrian traffic. This year's program added sidewalks to Thomas, Park and Howard.

Besides new sidewalks and upgrades to infrastructure, new businesses and homes were welcome additions to Wheaton in 2018. New businesses included Joy & Favored, Moveable Feast, The Hen House of Wheaton, Dollar Tree and Planet Fitness. Coming soon will be Pete's Fresh Market, a new Dunkin' Donuts, Eat the Frog Fitness, Cousins Subs and Lemon Shark Poke. Wheaton gained 22 newly constructed homes in 2018, including the first homes in the Loretto Club community.

Mayor Gresk pointed to Wheaton's ranking by Money Magazine as the No. 1 Best Place to Live in Illinois as evidence of the fantastic community in which we live. As Mayor Gresk finishes his third term serving as Wheaton's mayor this spring, he took this last State of the City as an opportunity to thank the community for your support and all that you contribute to this outstanding city.

Voter Information for Upcoming Election

On April 2, Wheaton registered voters can vote for Wheaton Mayor and two at-large positions on the Wheaton City Council. While Wheaton is divided into four districts, all registered Wheaton voters can vote for the two at-large City Council positions. This election also includes the election of Park District and School District officials.

Key Dates

Note these dates as we approach election day:

- **Feb. 21:** Early voting opens at the DuPage County Election Authority
- **March 5:** Last day for regular voter registration
- **March 6:** Grace Period Registration & Voting begins
- **March 18:** Early voting begins at multiple locations throughout DuPage County
- **April 1:** Last day for early voting
- **April 2:** Election Day; last day of Grace Period registration & voting

Need to Register?

If you need to register

to vote or change your registration, you can do so at Wheaton City Hall, 303 W Wesley Street, through March 5. Bring two forms of identification – one of which must have the current name and address – to the Finance Department counter on the first floor of Wheaton City Hall, between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. All applicants must know their Social Security number and provide at least the last four digits. Naturalized citizens need to know their date and place of naturalization.

Absentee Voting

Registered DuPage County voters who expect to be absent from the county on Election Day can vote using an absentee ballot. Wheaton residents can pick up a mail-in application for an absentee ballot form beginning about 30 days before an election. Voters also can receive an absentee ballot application from the DuPage County Election Authority. For more information about absentee voting, [see DuPage County's website](#).

Take Steps to Discourage Coyotes from Your Property

Coyotes' presence in populated areas can be minimized by removing things that attract them to places they are not wanted. Coyotes can become a nuisance when they have easy access to food in residential areas, such as pet food or garbage.

Important reminders:

- NEVER feed a coyote.
- Take steps to ensure that you are not providing them with a source of food, either intentionally or unintentionally:
 - Feed pets indoors or promptly remove dishes when pets complete their

meal outside. Store bags of pet food indoors.

- Clear brush and dense weeds from around property to deprive rodents of shelter and reduce protective cover for coyotes.

- Use trash barrels equipped with tight clamping devices on the lids.

- DO NOT feed or provide water for coyotes or other wildlife. This abnormally attracts coyotes and promotes increased numbers of rodents, birds and other creatures that can provide major portions of the coyote's natural diet.



How to Prevent Frozen Pipes

A few valuable tips can save you the hassle of dealing with frozen pipes this winter.

- Make sure to insulate pipes in unheated areas or against outside walls and seal any leaks that may let cold air in.

- Keep your garage door closed if your water meter is in that area.

- Disconnect your garden hose and shut off the water supply to outside faucets.

- If the temperature gets extremely cold, open cabinet doors under sinks to allow heat to get to pipes and let a faucet drip at a trickle if possible.

Radon Gas Awareness

Radon gas is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that is the second-leading cause of lung cancer in the United States.

Radon is an invisible, odorless, tasteless radioactive gas that comes from the natural breakdown of uranium

and enters homes, schools and other buildings from the soil.
