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New Adams Park Paths Make Park Accessible for All Users

Ramp up to fountain, wider concrete paths among features


New paths are complete, making Adams Park accessible to all, and the park has reopened for all to enjoy.

The master plan for Adams Park called for updates to the park to make pathways ADA-accessible, including eliminating the raised sidewalk in the northeast corner of the park, widening the main walkways to the fountain to 8 feet, and making them ADA compliant. Crews replaced brick paver paths with stamped concrete, making for a more accessible surface



for all, and the park now has a ramp leading up to the fountain. The project also widened the perimeter pathway that encircles the park to 6 feet, addressed drainage issues in the southeast corner of the park and provided landscaping updates.

This project is funded in part by a state grant from the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

Bring Pumpkins to the Pumpkin Smash Drop-off

Green your Hallowe'en by keeping your pumpkins out of landfills. The City's Environmental Improvement Commission is bringing back its Pumpkin Smash drop-off from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, Nov. 2, at the City's Commuter Lot 9, located at Liberty Drive and Carlton Avenue.

Organizers ask that you please remove stickers, candles and other decorative objects from pumpkins. Simply drive

up and drop off your pumpkins for composting into nutrient-rich soil.

Why Keep Pumpkins Out of the Landfill?

- Decomposing organics make landfills the third largest producers of methane
- Composting returns nutrients and water back to the soil
- Pumpkins are 90% water: good for our soil, bad for our landfills
- Most of the pumpkins



processed in the U.S. are grown in Illinois; keep the water and nutrients here.

This collection will be

run by Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission, the City of Wheaton and SCARCE.

Leaf & Yard Waste Pickup

Lakeshore Recycling Systems will continue to pick up leaves and yard waste through the week of Dec. 9. You must place a Lakeshore Recycling Systems sticker on each bag or yard waste/tree trimming stack. Stacks must no longer than 4 feet and no more than 18 inches in diameter. You do not need to bundle stacks with twine.

Change Smoke Detector Batteries

Daylight Saving Time ends at 2 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 3. When you change your clocks, the Wheaton Fire

Department recommends you also change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

You should change the batteries about every six months to ensure the detectors will work correctly. Using Daylight Saving Time as a reminder of when you last changed batteries is an easy way to remember when it's time to replace them.

Council Ordinance Bans Recreational Cannabis Businesses

New Illinois state law on recreational cannabis use becomes effective on Jan. 1

At the Oct. 7, 2019 City Council meeting, the Council approved an ordinance banning recreational cannabis business establishments in the City of Wheaton.

This ordinance is in response to an Illinois law that becomes effective Jan. 1, 2020, allowing for the legal sale and

use of recreational cannabis in Illinois. Municipalities were given the opportunity to determine whether cannabis businesses would be allowed in their municipality, and if so, in which areas such businesses could be established. By prohibiting businesses from being established

in the City limits, sales of recreational cannabis are not allowed in Wheaton. Wheaton previously passed an ordinance allowing for medical cannabis facilities to be located in certain zoning districts, but the City does not currently have any such facilities.

The City Council held a public hearing seeking

input on the matter on August 26, and the Council discussed the proposed ordinance at the Sept. 16 and Oct. 7 City Council meetings.

Some Meters Free during Downtown Streetscape Work



On October 21, the City Council approved temporarily eliminating metered parking for select meters located on College Avenue and in the South Central Business District during the duration of the downtown streetscape project. The meters are located on College Avenue, Main Street and

Willow Avenue.

The intent is to remove any barrier for prospective customers visiting Wheaton during the Downtown Streetscape Project improvements. The affected meters are marked with stickers.

Please note there is a 2-hour parking limit for these spaces.

Winter Weather Emergency Preparedness Tips

During the month of November, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency encourages you to prepare for winter weather emergencies. Extreme winter weather is responsible for the deaths of hundreds of people in the U.S. each year, primarily due to vehicle crashes, fires from improper use of heaters, overexertion, and exposure. Here are some tips to prepare for winter storms.

Familiarize yourself with the following terms to stay alert:

• **Wind Chill Advisory** - dangerous wind chills of 15 below to 24 below zero are expected.

• **Wind Chill Warning** - potentially life threatening wind chills of 25 below zero or colder are expected.

• **Frost Advisory** - damaging frost is expected during the growing season.

• **Freeze Warning** - below freezing temperatures are expected during the growing season.

• **Ice Storm Warning** -



dangerous accumulations of ice will occur and are expected to result in hazardous travel, extended power outages, and damage to trees.

• **Heavy Snow Warning** - snow accumulations of six inches or greater, which will result in hazardous travel conditions.

• **Winter Weather Advisory** - cold, ice, and/or snow (two to five inches) are expected.

• **Winter Storm Watch** - severe winter weather, such as heavy snow or ice, is possible within the next day or two.

• **Winter Storm Warning** - severe ice and/or snow (six inches or more) have begun or are about to begin.

• **Blizzard Warning** - heavy snow and strong winds will produce a blinding snow, near zero visibility, deep drifts, and life-threatening travel conditions.

Winter storm tips for home:

- Make sure your Emergency Kit is stocked and winter storm ready.

- Use sand to improve traction and apply products that melt ice on walkways.

- Keep emergency heating equipment and fuel so you can keep at least one room of your house warm enough to be livable.

- Keep fire extinguishers on hand.

- Winterize your home. Insulate walls, attics, doors, and windows.

- Do not overexert yourself outside for extended periods of time.

Winter storm tips for traveling:

- Make sure your car is in good operating condition before using it in extreme cold.

- Keep condensation (water) out of your gas tank by keeping the tank as full as possible.

- Maintain a storm kit in your car with such items as a cell phone and charger; blankets; clothing; jumper cables; a flashlight; batteries; high-calorie, non-perishable food; and matches/a lighter.

- Plan your trip carefully. If cold, snowy, or icy conditions exceed your ability or your car's ability, don't travel. If you must travel be cautious.

- Tell someone about your travel plans.

- Never leave the motor running in a vehicle parked in an enclosed or partially enclosed space, such as a garage.
