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Mayor Suess Presents 2020 State of the City Address

Mayor Phil Suess presented his first State of the City Address on Jan. 16, reflecting on milestones of the past year in Wheaton and previewing what the community can expect as we begin a new decade.

A video highlighting these projects, achievements and more is now available on the City's website, City of Wheaton Channel 10,

and the City's Facebook and Twitter accounts.

Among the most visible of the City's achievements was the completion of year 2 of the 4-year Downtown Streetscape Project, an extensive capital project to improve downtown Wheaton. This past year completed portions of Wesley Street, Cross Street and Hale Street in the heart of the downtown,

creating wider sidewalks, planting new trees, replacing decades-old underground infrastructure, and reconfiguring parking and intersections to improve walkability in the downtown.

City to Seek Input through Community Survey

The City will soon be seeking your input as the City Council begins to develop its strategic priorities for the next four years. Management Partners, an outside consultant, will administer an online survey in the coming weeks for community input about the City's services and priorities for the future.

This survey, which will be available by mid-February, will allow you to share your opinions and ideas, and will help the City Council and the leadership team understand what is most important to the community.

All survey responses will be anonymous. Management Partners will prepare a summary after the survey closes. The survey will take about 15 minutes to complete.

that had no sidewalks and much more.

The State of the City also highlighted the members of the City Council who joined the Council in 2019: Erica Bray-Parker, Lynn Robbins and Chris Zaruba.

Coming in 2020, the City Council will be establishing a new Strategic Plan that will set priorities for the City while refining the

vision, values and goals for the next four years. The City will also be analyzing downtown parking with a comprehensive parking study. In addition, the City has approved more than \$18 million in capital projects for the 2020 budget.


Nominations are due by March 16.

2020 United States Census Launches in March

The U.S. Census Bureau is preparing to launch the 2020 census in mid-March, with a goal of counting every person in the United States. Once every 10 years, the census results help determine how billions of dollars in federal funding flow into states and communities each year.

The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the



U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. The Census counts the population in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of

the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). Each home will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by phone, or by mail.

When you respond to the census, your answers are kept anonymous. They are used only to produce statistics.

The U.S. Census Bureau is bound by law to protect your answers

and keep them strictly confidential. The law ensures that your private information is never published and that your answers cannot be used against you by any government agency or court.

Citizen's Police Academy Accepting Applications

The Wheaton Police Department is accepting applications now through Feb. 14 for a 10-week [Citizen's Police Academy](#), a chance for community members to learn the inner workings of police operations, practices and objectives. Classes will take place from 6:30 p.m.-9:30 p.m. Tuesdays, April 7 through June 9 at the Wheaton Police Department, 900

W Liberty Drive, and nearby locations.

The academy will consist of classroom instruction, interactive discussions and hands-on practical exercises focusing on various aspects of police work, including investigations, forensics, patrol response, traffic stops, specialty teams, critical incidents and more.

To be eligible,

individuals must be at least 21 years old and live or work in the City of Wheaton. All applicants will be subjected to a criminal background investigation.

The academy will be limited to 20 individuals. Classes are free and will be held at the Wheaton Police Department, 900 W. Liberty Drive, and nearby locations.

Applications are due

by Feb. 14. You can apply through the City's website at www.wheaton.il.us/cpa, or you can mail your application to the Wheaton Police Department, Attn: Patricia Potter, 900 W Liberty Drive, Wheaton, IL 60187.

The Wheaton Police Department will notify citizens if they have been accepted to the academy by March 17.

Clothing Recycling Added to Wheaton's Monthly Electronic Recycling Drop-offs

The City's monthly electronic recycling drop-off events have expanded with a new program to collect textiles. The monthly events take place from 9 a.m. to noon on the second Saturday of each month at the Public Works Storage Yard, 820 W Liberty Drive.

Residents can now donate unwanted clothing and shoes for reuse and recycling through the nonprofit RewearAble. Accepted items can be in any condition.

Reusable items will be resold, with proceeds benefiting RewearAble's mission to provide employment for people with developmental disabilities. Items that can't be reused will be recycled as industrial rags.

Public Hearing Feb. 25 to Consider Short-Term Rentals

The Planning and Zoning Board will be conducting a public hearing at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 25 in the Council Chambers of City Hall to consider an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to allow short-term rentals available through hosting platforms such as Airbnb.

Currently, the City prohibits short-term rentals. The proposed amendment would allow short-term rentals of individual rooms where the homeowner, or "host," is present. The proposed

amendment would not allow the short-term rental of an entire home.

At the public hearing, anyone wishing to make a public statement will be encouraged to do so. Written comments may be submitted to the Board prior to or at the public hearing.

A copy of the proposed amendment is available for review in the office of the Director of Planning and Economic Development, 303 West Wesley Street, Wheaton, Illinois during normal business hours.

IEMA Shares Earthquake Preparedness Information

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency shares the following tips to be prepared for an earthquake, no matter where you live.

Illinois is at risk from two major seismic zones, the Wabash Valley Seismic Zone and the New Madrid Seismic Zone (NMSZ). The Wabash Valley Zone is located between southeastern Illinois and southwestern Indiana. The NMSZ is located in the Central Mississippi Valley and includes portions of the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri, Mississippi, and Tennessee.

Whether you are in your home, a classroom or another building, it is important to know how to protect yourself during an earthquake.

If you are indoors, follow these steps:

Drop: Drop down to the floor.

Cover: Take cover

under a sturdy desk, table or other furniture. If that is not possible, seek cover against an interior wall and protect your head and neck with your arms. Avoid danger spots near windows, hanging objects, mirrors or tall furniture.

Hold: If you take cover under a sturdy piece of furniture, hold on to it and be prepared to move with it. HOLD the position until the ground stops shaking and it is safe to move.

If you are outside when the shaking starts, get into an open area away from trees, buildings, walls and power lines. If driving, stop safely as soon as possible. Do not stop under overpasses or bridges. Turn off the engine and turn on the radio. Stay inside your vehicle below window level until the shaking stops. Do not get out of your vehicle if downed power lines have fallen across it.
