
City's Online Service Request Form Makes Requesting Assistance Easy

The City's Online Service Request Form, available at www.wheaton.il.us/servicerequest, is a simple way to report issues including a streetlight outage, vandalism/graffiti, overgrown grass in your neighborhood, a pothole or other types of requests. You can also submit an overnight parking request or ask for a Vacation House Watch with the Police Department if you will be out of town. The City will send these service requests to the appropriate department to assist you. Please note: This form should not be used for emergency situations. Please call 9-1-1 in an emergency.

2020 Census: Do You Know How the Census is Used?

Survey Uncovers Common Misconceptions About Census

ABOUT THE CENSUS?

The U.S. Census is mandated by the Constitution and counts the population in the United States and five U.S. territories. As you may know, billions of dollars in federal funding go to regional hospitals, fire departments,

schools, roads, and other resources each year based on Census data.

But do you know how else Census data is used – and perhaps even more importantly – how it is not used?

While studying what motivates people to

respond to the Census, a 2020 survey conducted by the Census Bureau (the Census Barriers, Attitudes, and Motivators Study) uncovered numerous misconceptions about other uses of the U.S.

Census

According to the survey, most of the people surveyed believed that the Census is used to determine changes in the U.S. population, and a majority of respondents assumed that the Census is used to assist the police and FBI in keeping track of people who break the law.

The Census is used to determine changes in the U.S. population, but

it is not used to help the authorities in tracking people who break the law. It also is not used to determine property taxes, which half of the survey's respondents thought the Census was responsible for as well.

more facts and fiction about how Census data is used.

The City of Wheaton's current Census response rate is 81% as of July 30. About 1 in 5 residents still need to complete the 2020 Census to help our community secure important funding for schools, hospitals, infrastructure and more. Filling it out is easier than ever this year: visit www.2020census.gov and complete the Census online in about 5 minutes.

Public Hearing to Consider Short-Term Rentals

The Planning and Zoning Board will be conducting a public hearing at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 11 to consider an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to allow short-term rentals available through hosting platforms such as Airbnb.

Currently, the City

prohibits short-term rentals. The proposed amendment would allow short-term rentals of individual rooms where the homeowner, or "host," is present. The proposed amendment would not allow the short-term rental of an entire home.

The meeting will be held remotely and

anyone wishing to make a public statement will be encouraged to do so. Residents will be able to participate by calling (312) 626-6799 or by attending via Zoom with [instructions for how to attend virtually](#) being available on the City website. Written comments may also

be submitted to the Board prior to the public hearing. A copy of the proposed amendment is available for review in the office of the Director of Planning and Economic Development, 303 West Wesley Street, Wheaton, Illinois during normal business hours.



Take Steps to Prevent Mosquito-Transmitted Diseases

An increase in mosquito samples from Naperville testing positive for West Nile virus (WNV) has the DuPage County Health Department reminding residents to protect themselves from mosquito bites and the risk of contracting WNV. This is the first positive test of WNV in mosquitoes in DuPage County this year.

The key factors in determining the degree of West Nile virus activity

are temperatures and rainfall. In hot, dry weather, mosquitoes that carry West Nile virus (primarily *Culex* mosquitoes) breed in stagnant water, like street catch basins and ditches, and multiply rapidly.

What You Can Do:

- Protect yourself, protect your family and prevent mosquitoes from breeding around your home by following the “4 D’s of Defense”:
- Drain: Drain items

that collect standing water around your home, yard or business. Scrub and refill pet water dishes and bird baths regularly.

- Defend: Use an insect repellent containing DEET when outdoors and reapply according to directions.

- Dress: Wear long pants, long sleeves and closed-toe shoes when outside to cover the skin.
- Dawn to Dusk: Wear repellent outdoors during these prime times for mosquito activity.
