Deadline Approaching to Run for Wheaton City Council

Petition Filing Period is Nov. 19-26

Four spots on the Wheaton City Council will be up for election on April 9, 2013. If you are interested in running for one of these four district representative seats (one of each in the north, south, east and west districts), you must submit a petition for candidacy with the City Clerk at City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St., between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Nov. 19-26, excluding weekend days and holidays. Note: City Hall offices are officially closed on Thursday, Nov. 22, and Friday, Nov. 23. Petitions for candidacy are available from the City Clerk's office until the filing period begins.

Candidates must:
• Be registered voters of



the City of Wheaton

- Reside within the corporate limits of the city for at least one year before the election date
- Live within the district the resident wants to represent
- File Nonpartisan Primary Petitions for Nomination signed by at least 25 registered City of Wheaton voters residing within the corporate

limits of each specific district (North, South, East and West) together with a Statement of Candidacy, Loyalty Oath (optional), and a receipt indicating the candidate has filed a Statement of Economic Interest with the DuPage County Clerk.

A Consolidated Primary election will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 26, 2013 if more than four candidates file for each district position. The Consolidated Election will be held on Tuesday, April 9, 2013.

Will Your Mailbox Survive the Winter?

As winter weather approaches, the Public Works Department encourages you to take the time to check the condition of your mailbox. If your mailbox needs repairing or is leaning, fix it before winter weather arrives. While snow

plow drivers do their best to avoid hitting mailboxes, sometimes – especially when visibility is poor – a mailbox can be hit by accident.

Also, move portable basketball hoops, landscape timbers, decorative rocks or other decorative items away

from the street. Landscape timbers and decorative rocks should not be located within 5 feet of the street to ensure that a car or snow plow does not hit these items and cause damage or injury.

Holiday Light Recycling Program Offered Nov. 19 through Feb. 22

Copper and plastic parts will be recycled

The City of Wheaton will offer free holiday light recycling again this year in partnership with Elgin Recycling. This program offers an eco-friendly alternative to putting lights in landfills.

Starting Nov. 19, 2012, bring strands of incandescent or LED holiday lights and extension cords in any condition to the Public Works Storage Yard at 820 W. Liberty Drive any time between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate. The Public Works Department will accept



lights for recycling through Feb. 22, 2013. The lights will be collected by Elgin Recycling, then stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will

Maintenance Worker Position



Leaf Pickup Continues

Leaves will be collected on the same day as your regular garbage and recycling pickup through Dec. 14.

Place leaves in containers 33 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags. Containers or bags must weigh less than 50 pounds when filled. Each container or bag requires a green leaf sticker, which is available at City Hall,

Four Simple Ways to Help Deter Coyotes

Success of City's coyote policy depends upon participation of the community

The City of Wheaton needs your help in dealing with coyotes in the community. There are four ways that you help: 1) [reporting coyote activity through the City's website](#), 2) removing things that attract coyotes 3) "hazing" coyotes that you encounter to reestablish their natural fear of humans and 4) watching your pets.

1. Report It

The City adopted a policy guiding its response to the presence of coyotes that spells out specific actions that should be taken by the City if certain issues are occurring. These actions depend upon receiving accurate information about coyote activities from observations in the community. The City encourages you to [report coyote activity through this online report form](#) to help the City determine when actions need to be taken. However, please note that if a coyote is acting in a threatening manner toward a human, you should first call 9-1-1, and an officer will respond. If you do not have internet access but would like to report a coyote incident, you can call the Police Department at 630-260-2161.

2. Remove Food Sources

Besides reporting incidents, it is important for you to understand how to discourage coyotes from becoming comfortable in your neighborhood. Coyotes can become a nuisance when they have easy access to food in residential areas, such as pet food or garbage. To discourage their

presence:

- Feed pets indoors or promptly remove dishes after pets eat outside. Store pet food indoors.
- Clear brush and dense weeds from around property to deprive rodents of shelter and reduce protective cover for coyotes.
- Use trash barrels equipped with tight clamping devices on the lids.
- Do not feed or provide water for wildlife. This practice abnormally attracts coyotes and promotes increased numbers of rodents, birds, snakes and other creatures that can provide major portions of the coyote's natural diet.

The City reminds you that feeding coyotes is also a violation of City Code. In May 2010, the City passed an ordinance prohibiting the feeding of coyotes, feral cats and dogs, raccoons, skunks and opossum.

3. Scare Away Coyotes

Equally important is helping teach coyotes where they are not welcome. Coyotes can lose their natural fear of humans if they have easy access to food and become used to seeing humans. You can use the effective method of "hazing" – which means to scare off coyotes through actions that make them uncomfortable – to teach coyotes that your yard is an undesirable place for them to be and the coyote must leave. Some hazing techniques include making eye contact and yelling at the coyote(s), waving your arms to make yourself appear as large as possible, using a noisemaker/whistle, throw-



ing objects toward the coyote, stomping and clapping, running toward the coyote, spraying a hose at the coyote, and acting threatening.

Hazing **does not** include weapons and **does not** physically harm coyotes. Be persistent and keep hazing until the coyote leaves. Coyotes are intelligent animals that will soon learn to avoid these places where they feel uncomfortable. Wildlife experts do not recommend hazing if a coyote is injured, sick or has

become cornered; in these situations, coyotes may act unexpectedly.

4. Watch Your Pets

Finally, while pets do not comprise a large portion of a coyote's diet, it is important to watch your pets, **even in a fenced yard**. Coyotes are opportunistic and will go for easy prey, such as an unattended pet.



Series Wins Third National Award


Edition focuses on 1940s and 1950s

For the third time in four years, the Video Division of the City's Communications Department has won a national Government Programming Award for its "Wheaton Remembers" series. This time, it was a second-place finish in the Seniors Category for an edition focusing on growing up in the 1940s and 1950s. The competition is sponsored by the National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors.

In this video – one of seven produced by Municipal Producer Richard Sagen – four classmates reminisce about what Wheaton was like in the '40s and '50s. Their Wheaton was one in which the jitterbug was a popular dance, families practiced blackout drills to hide from World War II enemies, and teenagers frequented drive-in restaurants.

"The insights of these seniors help the community's history live on in an interesting, personal way, which reflects the Communications Department's mission in producing the series," Sagen said.

Help the Fire Department Keep the Wreath Red by unplugging holiday lights before leaving home or sleeping, being careful with candles and open flames, using flame-retardant decorations, ensuring lights are in good condition and Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed, and keeping real trees watered.
