The City will be replacing the elevator at the Wheaton Place Parking Garage (232 W. Wesley Street) beginning Monday, Jan. 18, with construction

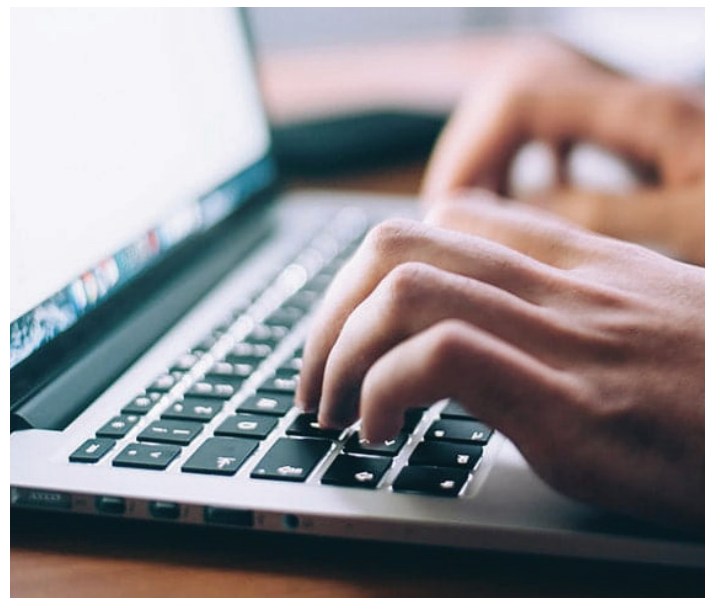

years for the past 20 years to guide priority-setting and resource

allocation. In January 2020, City leaders sought to recalibrate the current strategic plan and set initiatives to guide planning for the next five years. The strategic planning process

included interviews with the Mayor, members of City Council, and the City's leadership team; a community and employee survey; two community engagement sessions; review of local

and regional data; and a review of financial trends. The process resulted in the current draft Strategic Plan. Once the final plan is adopted, it will be posted on the City's website.

City Council Passes Annual Budget and Property Tax

At the Wheaton City Council's Dec. 21 meeting, the Council adopted the annual budget for the City of Wheaton and the annual property tax levy. The final budget for all funds projects for the City to generate revenues of \$107.6 million, with \$112.2 million in expenditures.

At the Dec. 21 meeting, the Council



also passed the annual property tax levy. The City Council voted to adopt a flat tax levy, which reflects

no increase from the previous year's tax levy. The financial impact of the levy for a property owner depends on the change in the assessed value of their property from 2019 to 2020.

City of Wheaton staff have been preparing this budget for several months, and the City Council held two budget workshop sessions, on

Nov. 9 and Nov. 14, to review the proposed budget. The proposed budget has been available for public review since early November, and the Council invited the public to attend the workshop sessions and a public hearing on Dec. 14. Holiday Light Recycling Available

Wheaton's holiday light recycling program runs through Jan. 22, 2021. Bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. weekdays and look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate.

This program is for light strings only. Please



do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and do not put lights in a bag or box. Elgin Recycling, www.elginrecycling.com, will

collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas.

Christmas Tree Recycling Offered

The City's garbage/recycling hauler's pick up for live Christmas trees for recycling at no charge, with no sticker needed, is the weeks of Dec. 28, 2020 and of Jan. 4, 2021 on your collection day.

Please note that because there is no pickup on Friday, Jan. 1, 2021, (due to the New Year's Day holiday), pickups for Jan. 1 will be one day later than usual.

Please place your tree at the curb, and make

sure trees are free of all decorations and are not in plastic bags. After the collection period, you will need to attach 1 garbage/organic sticker to a live tree in order to have it collected.

Reserve a New Tree through the Shared Cost Parkway Tree Planting Program



Start the new year off by reserving a new tree in your parkway! It may be a few months away from spring, but now is the time to begin planning for new growth in 2021. Applications are being accepted now through Monday, Mar. 15, 2021 for the City's Shared Cost Parkway Tree Planting Program.

The Shared Cost Parkway Tree Planting Program allows homeowners to have a tree planted in the parkway adjacent to their property at a shared cost. Residents can choose from a variety of native and non-native trees varying in height and size at a cost of \$95 per tree as part of the program. All new trees

will be approximately 1¾" to 2" in trunk diameter with heights varying based on the type of tree ordered. This program is not for the replacement of parkway ash trees; the City is handling those through a separate program.

Be Prepared for Winter Storms

Winter storms create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frostbite, carbon monoxide poisoning, and heart attacks from overexertion. Use these tips from FEMA to be prepared for extreme cold, freezing rain, ice and high winds.

If you are under a winter storm warning, find shelter right away. Also, follow these tips:

- Stay off roads.

- Stay indoors and dress warmly.
 - Prepare for power outages.
 - Use generators outside only.
 - Listen for emergency information and alerts.
 - Look for signs of hypothermia and frostbite.
 - Check on neighbors.

Illinois Spreads Safety Message about Radon

Radon is the second leading cause of

lung cancer in the United States and the leading cause among nonsmokers. It is found in homes throughout Illinois. Performing a radon test is the only way to know if radon levels in your home are high. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency encourages residents to learn about radon during Radon Awareness Month in January.

What is Radon?

- Radon is an invisible, odorless, tasteless radioactive gas.
- Radon comes from the natural breakdown of uranium and enters homes, schools and other buildings from the soil.
- Elevated indoor levels are found in every state in the US, and

in every county in Illinois.

Reducing Radon Levels in a Home

Mitigation is the act of repairing or altering a building or building design for the purpose of reducing the concentration of radon in the indoor atmosphere. A professional licensed by the Illinois Emergency Management Agency's Radon Program can mitigate your radon levels.

The most common type of mitigation systems is Active Soil Depressurization. These systems reduce radon by collecting radon prior to entry into the building and discharging it to a safe location.
