Event Parking Available at City Hall Parking Lot During Evenings & Weekends

The City of Wheaton reminds residents and visitors that the City Hall parking lot is open for event parking at Memorial Park during the evening and weekends, and the library parking lot when the library is closed.

City Prohibits General Burning of Yard Waste, Garbage, or Other Materials

General open burning of yard waste, garbage, or other materials including leaves is prohibited. Recreational and food-related fires conducted within commercial and approved containers such as

grills and manufactured portable fireplaces are allowed with only seasoned firewood to be burned in fireplaces or permit approved fire pits. Residents must attain a special permit from the Fire Department for small ground bonfires. [View information about open burning](#) on the City's website.

Hydrant Flushing Begins in May

The City's Water Division will begin its 2021 Hydrant Flushing Program the week of May 3 and will continue for several weeks. The purpose of this program is to flush out particles that accumulate in water lines. During or immediately following the hydrant flushing, water discoloration may occur. It is best not to draw large amounts of water if you experience discoloration. Residents with questions may call the Water Division at 630-260-2090.

ComEd Tree Trimming Scheduled for Areas of Wheaton

ComEd will be tree trimming in the Wheaton area during the next few months. Affected residents have received or will be receiving postcards from ComEd to notify them prior to any scheduled preventative tree maintenance

activities. This work is necessary to remove tree branches and vines that interfere with power lines that can create safety hazards and cause power outages.

In some cases, tree removal may be required, and the remaining tree stumps are treated with an approved herbicide to prevent future regrowth. All work is performed by qualified arborists, and herbicide is applied by state-licensed applicators.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

It has been more than a year since this pandemic upended our lives. Thankfully, we have reached the point where there is a path for us to take toward protecting one another and returning to more normal times: through vaccinating our community.

As of April 12, all DuPage County residents age 16 and older are eligible to register for a Covid-19 vaccine, which is welcome news for many people who have not yet been eligible for the vaccine.

There are several ways you can get registered for the vaccine. First, you can register through the DuPage County Health Department either online at dupagehealth.org or by calling 630-682-7400. If you know someone who may need assistance registering because they do not have internet access or need language assistance, please encourage them to call the DuPage County Health Department,



which has call takers available to help with registration.

You can also contact your doctor and local pharmacies to register for a vaccine. The demand for vaccines still exceeds the supply in our area, so the DuPage County Health Department encourages you to take the first opportunity you have to be vaccinated.

I'd also encourage the Wheaton community to continue doing your part to limit the spread of Covid-19 by doing the simple but important things that will help protect us all: wash your hands, wear a mask when in public places like restaurants and stores, and watch your distance from those outside your household.

We are all in this together, and we can look forward to even brighter days ahead.

Downtown Streetscape Update



Crews for the Downtown Streetscape Project were busy during the month of April and were able to make significant progress. Highlights from this month's streetscape work include:

- Installment of new sidewalks on the west side of Wheaton Avenue from Front to Wesley
- Installment of pipe for detention basin in Lot 4 (between Main Street and Hale Street)
- Start of demolition in Lot 3 (between Main Street and Cross Street)
- Installment of various new storm structures on Liberty Drive
- Replacement of storm sewers and sidewalk squares on Hale Street between Front and Wesley Street

In addition to the

construction work that has been completed, the City was also awarded a state grant for the site improvements on Liberty Drive in the amount of \$175,000.

The City appreciates your patience as we work to complete this project, and we will do everything we can to keep traffic flowing and minimize inconvenience to residents and businesses. The City will continue to keep the community informed of construction updates, temporary lane closures, and/or detours through Facebook, Twitter, the City's website, email updates and City of Wheaton Channel 10.

Join the Police Department at your Neighborhood Roll Call

Starting in June, the Wheaton Police Department will be moving their roll calls out into the neighborhoods. Prior to the start of each tour of duty, Wheaton Police Officers report for a roll call that consists of an overview of the calls for service that occurred during the last 24 hours. Emerging crime trends within Wheaton and neighboring communities are discussed. Intelligence is disseminated to officers along with problem locations and extra watches. This is the time for officers to share what has been going on within their beats.

The public is



encouraged to attend the Neighborhood Roll Calls and meet with the officers who are assigned to their area of town. Officers will be on hand to discuss local issues and concerns about your neighborhood as well as providing tips to keep you and your family safe. Residents will be able to

initiate online requests for city services, register for SMART911, and make officers aware of issues directly related to their neighborhood. The Neighborhood Roll Calls will be occurring on Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. between June and August. Please watch the City of Wheaton's

Sidewalk Replacement Work Underway

To target sidewalk squares that need replacing, a contractor for the City of Wheaton has started sidewalk removal and replacement work in various locations throughout Wheaton. Globe Construction is the contractor for this year's sidewalk replacement work.

The City's focus for the program this year is the area from Roosevelt Road (Route 38) north to Illinois Street, and from President Street to the City's eastern limits. Other spots in need of immediate repair have also been identified for spot repairs. [See a map of the areas in this year's program.](#)

Residents whose properties have sidewalk squares that cross their driveway that are scheduled for replacement will receive a direct notice from the contractor with instructions on any action they need to take (such as a possible need to move vehicles prior to

work starting). The City's Streets Division uses specific criteria to decide which sidewalk squares need replacing, related to the severity of cracking, spacing, or settled/raised squares. For more information about these criteria, please [see the Sidewalk Maintenance Policy \(PDF\)](#).

Lawn Watering Restrictions Begin



Lawn watering restrictions start May 15. Annual lawn watering restrictions go into effect from May 15 to September 15. Residents with odd-numbered street addresses can water their lawns on odd-numbered days and those with even-numbered addresses are limited to even-numbered days. Sprinkling is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day. If you will be placing sod or planting grass seed, contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for a 10- day new sod/seed variance.

Help Prevent Mosquito-Transmitted Diseases

Each year, the Wheaton Mosquito Abatement District (a separate government entity from the City of Wheaton) monitors the area for mosquito transmitted diseases with the Illinois Department of Health, DuPage County Health Department, Forest Preserve District of DuPage County, and Clarke Environmental Mosquito Management, Inc. (Clarke).

Under the authority of the Illinois Mosquito Abatement District, field technicians perform mosquito control activities on public and private properties for the control of mosquitoes and protection of public health. This includes adult mosquito population surveillance, larval site monitoring, biological control, and strategic use of EPA labeled and registered pesticide products, if necessary.

West Nile Virus

West Nile virus is spread through the bite of infected mosquitoes. Symptoms are initially similar to the flu, with muscle weakness and disorientation. Though the majority of those infected will have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all, in some



individuals, WNV can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and in severe cases, paralysis, coma or death. The disease is most serious – even fatal – in those with compromised immune systems and the elderly.

Zika Virus

Zika virus (ZIKV) is a mosquito-borne disease that is transmitted primarily by the Aedes aegypti mosquito and sexual transmission. Aedes aegypti is a tropical mosquito that does not occur in northern Illinois. While ZIKV symptoms are generally mild in adults (fever, rash, joint pain and conjunctivitis), pregnant women who contract ZIKV can pass the virus to their unborn children, increasing the risks of serious birth defects like microcephaly.

Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE)

Eastern Equine

Encephalitis (EEE) is a mosquito-borne disease primarily vectored by Culiseta melanura, which lives in freshwater hardwood swamps, generally on the Atlantic coast and around the Great Lakes. The disease is one of the most dangerous mosquito-borne diseases; one in three patients diagnosed will die from EEE. Past historical hotspot states for outbreaks have been Massachusetts, Michigan, Indiana, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Rhode Island. While Illinois does not have a recent history of EEE cases, the proximity of the cases in both Indiana and Michigan and historic cases in Wisconsin call for continued vigilance.

Be Prepared for Severe Weather Throughout the Year

Preparing for floods, tornadoes and severe thunderstorms before they strike will help you stay safe throughout the year. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency provides these fast facts about tornadoes to help you be prepared for possible severe weather:

- Illinois ranks fourth in the United States for the most tornadoes per square mile.
- The majority of Illinois tornadoes have occurred between April 1 and June 30

and between the hours of 3 p.m. and 10 p.m. However, tornadoes have occurred every month of the year at all hours of the day.

- Nearly 20 percent of all tornadoes in Illinois occur after dark.
- On average, 53 tornadoes occur each year in Illinois.

Tips to Stay Safe

• It is critical that someone at home, work or wherever people gather monitors weather conditions, regardless of the time of day. Many deadly tornadoes occur

at night.

- Monitor watches and warnings in your areas using a weather alert radio, cell phone app, local TV, local radio or the Internet.

- Do not rely solely on outdoor warning sirens, especially if you are asleep. If it is safe to do so, contact family members and friends when you become aware of a tornado that may threaten them.


- Check the weather forecast before leaving for extended outdoor periods and postpone plans if severe weather is

imminent.

- Determine the best location in your home and workplace to seek shelter when threatened by a tornado. A basement or cellar will usually afford the best protection. If an underground shelter is not available, identify an interior room or hallway on the lowest level. The best areas are closets, small interior hallways and bathrooms without windows.
