CITY NOTES

No Garbage Pickup Sept. 6

Due to the Labor Day holiday, all garbage/recycling/yard waste pickups will be delayed one day during the week of Sept. 6-10.

City Offices Closed

Non-emergency City of Wheaton offices will be closed on Monday, Sept. 6. They will reopen on Tuesday, Sept. 7.

Temporary Order Suspending Water Service Shutoffs Lifted

The City of Wheaton has lifted its temporary order suspending water service shutoffs for delinquent bills during COVID-19. All customers of City water service should note that shutoffs will resume in October 2021 for unpaid accounts.

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Garbage and Recycling Rate Changes Begin Oct. 1



The City's garbage and recycling pickup service provider, LRS (formerly referred to as Lakeshore Recycling Systems), will update their service charges as part of a 3-year contract extension with the waste hauler. **The new service**

rates will go into effect Friday, Oct. 1, 2021.

The City's contract extension with LRS will allow you to continue to pay only for how much you use the service. This is achieved using trucks that scan garbage and/or recycling carts when they are emptied.

This "pay-as-you-throw" system is among the first in the country to use RFID scanning technology – similar to the Illinois Tollway System's IPASS – and gives you more control over your service costs than a flat monthly fee.

Garbage

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The rate adjustments are necessary to offset costs resulting from low residential cart set-out rates in Wheaton and an overall market drop-off for recyclables. Wheaton households, on average, have a monthly set-out rate of less than 55%, meaning most households set out their garbage and recycling at the curb about every other week. The City compared the new rates with service rates in neighboring communities and found that these rates will still allow Wheaton households to pay competitive rates compared to neighboring communities.

Based on the City's satisfaction with LRS service to residents, the competitive price for service, and the community's desire to use a pay-as-you-throw model without requiring stickers for each pickup, the City Council opted to approve a contract extension with LRS.

Please see the following updated service fees per pickup beginning Friday, Oct. 1:

Garbage

- 95-gallon cart: \$5.10 (increase of \$0.45)
- 65-gallon cart: \$4.30 (increase of \$1.20)
- 35-gallon cart: \$3.05 (increase of \$1.50)

Recycling

- 95-gallon cart: \$3.25 (increase of \$2.05)
- 65-gallon cart: \$2.75 (increase of \$1.46)
- 35-gallon cart: \$2.00 (increase of \$0.71)

The sticker cost will remain unchanged at \$2.99 for yard waste/leaves/organics, bulk items, excess garbage that won't fit in your garbage cart, e-waste, and bulk items.

Cart Exchange Grace Period

Continuing service with LRS will allow Wheaton customers to control their expenses by only being charged when you put out your cart. You may also elect to control your costs by choosing a different cart size, if you find that a different cart size would better suit your household's needs. If you would like to exchange your garbage or recycling cart for a different size (35-, 65- or 95-gallon), LRS will allow you to do so at no additional charge now through Sunday, Oct. 31. Please contact LRS at 773-685-8811 to arrange a cart exchange. After Oct. 31, LRS will charge a delivery fee for exchanging carts.

Applications for Senior Housing Assistance Now Being Accepted

The City of Wheaton's Housing Commission sponsors a program to provide monthly financial assistance to senior Wheaton residents who qualify.

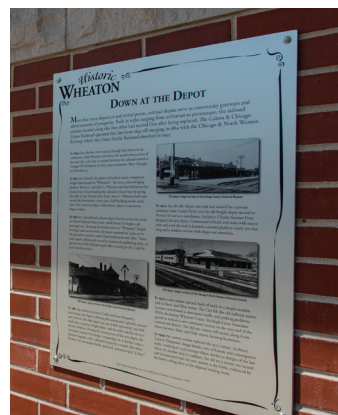
Senior Wheaton residents must meet the three (3) following requirements to apply for Wheaton Housing Assistance:

- Age: must be at least 65 years or older
- Residency: must be an incorporated Wheaton resident for at least the last consecutive 3 years
- Income: senior's annual household income cannot exceed \$27,800

If you meet all 3 of these qualifications, you can [download an application on the City's website](#), or contact Andrea Rosedale with the City of Wheaton at (630) 260-2019 for more information. If you are receiving Section 8 or DuPage Housing Authority assistance, you are NOT eligible to apply for this program.

Applications are accepted at any time, however, to start receiving assistance in January 2022, applications will need to be received by Sept. 24, 2021.

Back to School Safety Tips from Wheaton Police Department

A new school year has started, and the Wheaton Police Department would like to share some tips to make this another safe and successful school year.

Back-to-School Safety Tips

- Ensure students know their address and phone number.
- Be aware of your surroundings.
- Whenever possible, walk or bike with another person.
- Stay in well-lit areas.
- Limit the use of distracting devices.
- Avoid engaging with or answering questions from strangers.
- If something occurs that makes you feel unsafe, report it immediately to a trusted adult.

Parents and guardians are encouraged to role play possible situations with students and discuss personal safety and awareness tips.

Pedestrian Safety

- Cross using marked crosswalks designated with a crossing guard.
- Look before you cross and follow the direction of school crossing guards.
- Always walk on

designated sidewalks or paths, never along the side of the road.

Driver Safety

- Obey speed limits and school zones.
- Avoid distracted driving.
- Watch for students walking or on bikes.
- Do not pass a stopped school bus.
- Ensure everyone in a vehicle wears their seatbelt.

Adhere to the directions of crossing guards to ensure the safety of children and drivers.

Bicycle Safety

- Helmets are required for riders ages 14 and younger but are recommended for ALL riders.
- Keep right and ride with traffic.
- Please note that if you are riding your bike in the downtown, you must

walk (not ride) your bike on sidewalks.

- Secure your bike with a lock when not in use.
- Know and follow the rules of the road.

When to Stop for School Buses:

- On a two-lane road, vehicles traveling in both directions MUST stop when a school bus is loading/unloading.
- On a multi-lane road that is paved all the way across both directions of traffic (where there is no raised median, physical barrier, or unpaved space at least 5 feet across), vehicles traveling in both directions MUST stop. Exception: If the road has 4 or more lanes, the vehicles traveling in the opposite direction from the bus may proceed with caution.

On a divided highway (where there is an unpaved space at least 5 feet wide, a raised median or physical barrier), vehicles behind the bus MUST stop. Vehicles traveling in the opposite direction may proceed with caution.

Join City Commissions for Mid-Century Modern Historic Bike Tour of Wheaton

Bring your bike and join the Wheaton Bicycle Commission and the City of Wheaton Historic Commission on Saturday, Sept. 25 from 2 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. for a bicycle tour of iconic Mid-Century Modern architecture in Wheaton.

Led by local developers like Graeme Stewart and Fred Zarbock, Wheaton in the 1950's and 1960's responded to the demand for single family housing with a surge of new buildings designed by Mid-Century Modern architects such as Paul Schweikher, Winston Elting, Edward Dart,



Charles Goodman, Ralph Rapson, John Van der Meulen, Maxwin Heimann, and Harry Harmon among others.

Join this special tour and discover what set these buildings apart and how they shaped

Wheaton's future. This moderately-paced 7.5-mile docent-led bike tour will not only be fun and good exercise but it will provide a new way to experience this glimpse into Wheaton's role in Mid-Century Modern

design.

All riders must provide their own bicycle and wear a bike helmet during the tour. All riders must submit a signed waiver, which can be obtained at <https://forms.gle/vKTgTd3a1dgke9G96>.

Please bring the completed waiver to the ride. A parent or guardian must sign the waiver for riders under 18 years of age. Children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult rider. This tour will meet at the bike racks by west side of library at 2 p.m. The event is free and open to the public. Rain date is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 2, 2021.

Be Prepared for Flooding In September

Flooding can occur without warning and is especially dangerous for several reasons. It can wash away vehicles and mobile homes and cause extensive property damage. Seniors and individuals who need special assistance or cannot swim face a heightened risk of drowning. Finally, downed power lines can fall into pools of water and cause electrocution.

Familiarize yourself with the following terms to stay alert and prepared

- Flood/Flash Flood Watch - conditions are favorable for flooding in the next day or two. Flash floods occur very quickly, usually as a result of heavy rainfall in a short period of time.

- Flood Warning - flooding is expected to threaten life and property a few hours after the onset of heavy rain, ice jams, reservoir releases or snowmelt. Flood warnings may be in effect

for days or even weeks depending on weather and soil conditions, land topography, and river size.

- Flash Flood Warning - rapidly rising water which poses an immediate threat to life and property within a few hours due to small stream or urban flooding and dam or levee failures. Quickly move to higher ground or stay away from flooded areas - especially in vehicles.

- Flood Statement - ponding of water in urban areas or minor flooding of streams is occurring. Also used to convey supplemental information, updated observations, and impact information for Flood Warnings.

Before a flood

- Avoid building in a floodplain unless you elevate and reinforce your home.

- Elevate the furnace, water heater, and electric panel if susceptible to flooding.

- Install check valves in sewer traps to prevent

floodwater from backing up into your home.

- Construct barriers (levees, beams, sandbags, floodwalls) to stop floodwater from entering the building.

- Seal walls in basements with waterproofing compounds to avoid seepage.

- Keep an adequate supply of food, drinking water, and flashlights (with extra batteries) in case you are trapped inside your home.

During a flood

- Seek higher ground. Do not wait for instructions.

- Be aware of flash flood areas such as canals, streams, drainage channels, and underpasses.

- Be ready to evacuate with your Go Bag.

- If time allows, move essential items to upper floors.

- If instructed, turn off main valves and switches. Avoid electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water.

- If you must leave your home, do not walk through moving water. Six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet.

- Do not try to drive over a flooded road. If your vehicle stalls, abandon it immediately.

After a flood

- Avoid floodwaters. Do not let children play in the water.

- Be aware of areas where water has receded. Roadways may have weakened and could collapse.

- Avoid downed power lines and muddy water where power lines may have fallen.

- Return home only when authorities say it is safe to do so.

- Discard food that may have been contaminated.

- Check on sewage systems. If damaged, these can be a serious hazard.
