Garbage & Recycling Rate Changes Begin Oct. 1



The City's garbage and recycling pickup service provider, LRS (formerly referred to as Lakeshore Recycling Systems), will update their service charges as part of a 3-year contract extension with the waste hauler. The new service rates begin Friday, Oct. 1, 2021. Please see the following updated service

fees per pickup beginning Oct. 1:

Garbage Service Fee Per Pickup:

- 35-gallon cart: \$3.05
- 65-gallon cart: \$4.30
- 95-gallon cart: \$5.10

Recycling Service Fee Per Pickup:

- 35-gallon cart: \$2.00
- 65-gallon cart: \$2.75
- 95-gallon cart: \$3.25

The sticker cost will remain unchanged at \$2.99 for yard waste/leaves/organics, bulk items, excess garbage that won't fit in your garbage cart, e-waste, and bulk items.

Halloween Pumpkin Collection

The City of Wheaton's Environmental

Improvement Commission will once again host a "Pumpkin Smash" drop-off for pumpkins right after Halloween. This collection will allow you to drop off pumpkins (please remove decorations first) to be composted, rather than going to the landfill. The event will take place on Saturday, Nov. 6 from 9 a.m. to noon in the commuter parking lot at Liberty and Carlton.

City Prohibits General Burning of Yard Waste, Garbage, or Other Materials

The City prohibits general open burning of yard waste, garbage, or other materials, including leaves. You are allowed to conduct recreational and food-related fires within commercial and approved containers such as grills and manufactured

portable fireplaces. Please note that you can only burn seasoned firewood in fireplaces or permit-approved fire pits. Residents must attain a special permit from the Fire Department for small ground bonfires.

Remember to Walk Your Wheels Downtown



The City asks bicyclists to please remember not to ride their bicycles on sidewalks in the downtown area. The City has placed signs throughout the downtown area to serve as a friendly reminder that biking is not allowed on downtown sidewalks, including on Liberty Drive.

While you can still ride on the streets, if you choose to go on the sidewalk, you must walk your wheels on the sidewalks. This rule is set by City Code, and violators can be fined.

Riding is allowed on the portion of the Illinois Prairie Path that runs through the downtown, just south of the railroad tracks, but there is currently a detour for the Illinois Prairie Path on Liberty Drive from West to Cross as part of the Downtown Streetscape construction work.

Bicyclists should either ride in the street on the detour route or walk their bikes on the sidewalks.

Please remember to follow this rule and help in continuing to keep our downtown a safe place for everyone.

Mosquito Abatement District Seeking Trustee Candidate

Leaf Collection Reminders

This fall, the City of Wheaton reminds you of the ways you can properly dispose of leaves. Place leaves in containers 35 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags. Containers or bags must weigh less than 50 pounds when filled. Each container or bag requires a Lakeshore Recycling Systems yard waste/ organics/ excess garbage sticker, which is



available at City Hall and at many local grocery and hardware stores.

When you're cleaning up leaves, please be

careful not to blow or rake them into the streets. Doing so can prevent storm sewers from functioning properly

and can lead to flooding. If your house is located near a storm sewer catch basin, please help keep it clear by sweeping away leaves and debris from the sewer grate. Also, please note that burning leaves is not allowed.

Lakeshore Recycling Systems collects yard waste, food scraps and organic materials on your garbage day through the second full week of December.

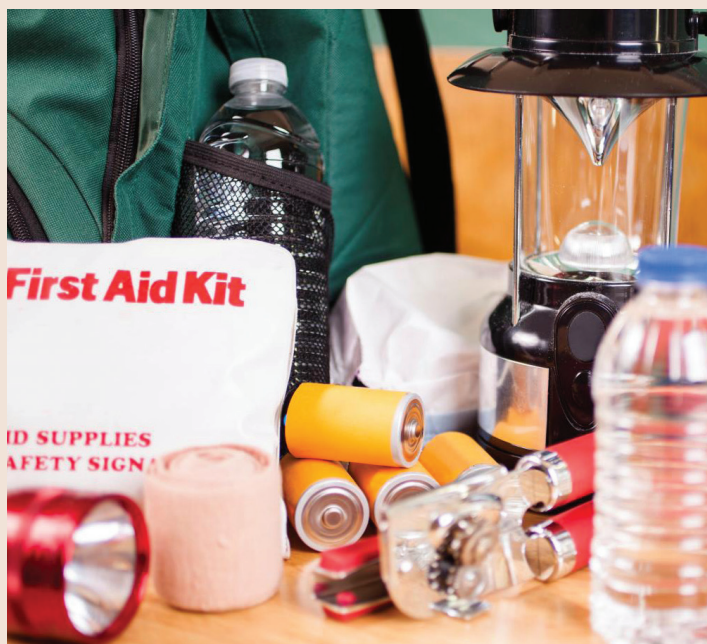
5 Steps to Disaster Preparedness

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency encourages you to prepare for potential emergencies at home, work, and in the community.

Having a plan that includes where to go and how to communicate during disasters, building an emergency supply kit and learning lifesaving skills could help you during a disaster.

Here are five steps to Disaster Preparedness:

- **Save Early for a Disaster:** Can you afford an emergency? According to the Federal Reserve, 40 percent of Americans do not have \$400 in savings. Operation Hope is a nonprofit that provides disaster preparedness



planning. They work with adults, youth and disaster survivors to equip them with the financial knowledge and tools to create a secure future.

- **Learn Lifesaving Skills:** Everyday citizens can be first responders. This is a great time to

learn lifesaving skills, such as CPR and first aid techniques, in order to provide immediate aid until help arrives.

- **Make a Plan for When a Disaster Strikes:** Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so know which

types of disasters could affect your area and how you will contact one another and reconnect if separated.

- **Teach Youth How to Prepare for Disasters:** Disaster planning, response, and recovery efforts should include the unique needs of children. Get kids involved in building their own emergency kit. Include your child's favorite stuffed animals, board games, books or music in their emergency kit to comfort them in a disaster.

- **Get Involved in Community Preparedness:** Check in with your neighbors to see how you can help each other before, during and after a storm.

Obtain Record of COVID-19 Vaccination



The Illinois Department of Public Health has created the Vax Verify portal to allow Illinois residents to access proof of their COVID-19 vaccination. As some events are requiring a printed or digital copy of vaccination records, this allows people to provide confirmation of vaccination. The process requires verification through Experian to confirm a person's identity and protect the security of vaccination records.
