Change Smoke Detector Batteries

Daylight Saving Time ends at 2 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 7. When you change your clocks, the Wheaton Fire Department recommends you also change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. You should change the batteries about every six months to ensure the detectors will work correctly. Using Daylight Saving Time as a reminder of when you last changed batteries is an easy way to remember when it's time to replace them.

Cooking Oil Collection

The City and Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission will be hosting a drop-off event for the collection of cooking oil on Saturday, Nov. 27 from 9 a.m. through 11 a.m. at the Public Works Storage Yard, 820 W. Liberty Drive. This is a drive-through event, where volunteers will unload items you bring to this collection from your car.

Strained corn oil, olive oil, peanut oil and any type of vegetable oil contained within a safely sealed container will be collected and turned

into biofuel. Please note that this program cannot accept bacon or meat grease. The City reminds residents that pouring cooking oil down your sink's drain can cause blockages as well as sanitary sewer backups and pouring anything down the storm drain is illegal.

Leaf & Yard Debris Disposal

Residents can place leaves and yard debris in containers 35 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags. Containers or bags must weigh less than 50 pounds when filled. Each container or bag requires a yard waste/organics/excess garbage sticker, which is available at City Hall and at many local grocery and hardware stores. The City prohibits open burning of yard waste, garbage, or other materials including leaves.

Yard waste, food scraps and organic materials can be collected at the curb through the second full week of December (Dec. 18, 2021).

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



It is exciting to see more people choosing to call the City of Wheaton their home. Results from the 2020 U.S. Census show that the population of Wheaton has increased by 1,076 since 2010 bringing our City's total population to 53,970. This keeps our community the third largest in DuPage County behind only the City of Naperville and Aurora. In addition, Wheaton made WalletHub's list of Best Small Cities in America as one of the top 5 best small cities in Illinois and ranked 59th among 1,300 other small cities nationally.

One of the reasons we are able to attract new residents to Wheaton is our continued investment in our City, ensuring our community provides the amenities and

quality infrastructure citizens expect. Capital expenditures in 2021 will exceed \$20 million encompassing 73 specific projects. Some of the construction projects being completed this year include:

- Street reconstruction of Cole Avenue, Hawthorne Boulevard, Indiana Street, and Sunnyside Drive
- Pavement resurfacing in the Arboretum Mews, Butterfield Ridge, and Danada Farms subdivisions as part of the City's Road Program
- Pavement resurfacing of 2.9 miles and patching 1.5 miles of failing sections of asphalt roads by the City's Street Division
- Various water and sewer projects throughout the City.

As part of the Downtown Streetscape Project, crews planted new trees on Wheaton Avenue and Wesley Street, installed brick paver walkways and paved streets along Liberty Drive. Crews also installed retaining walls along the parking lots on Liberty Drive and poured new sidewalks throughout the area, along with making numerous updates to the City's sewer systems.

The conclusion of this 4-year project will

include the construction of a new multi-purpose canopy structure south of the tracks between Main and Cross, with solar panels incorporated, new gathering areas, bicycle parking, and additional amenities for all to enjoy. In total, this project will invest approximately \$35 million in important infrastructure work for our downtown.

As we approach the Thanksgiving holiday and reflect on things for which we are thankful, we are grateful for the ability to make the ongoing investments necessary to maintain Wheaton as a great place to live.

I'm also thankful

for our veterans and for their service. This month, various community groups will host numerous events in Wheaton in honor of our veterans. I encourage all residents to take time to experience some of the Veterans Day events that are listed on Page 4 and to express their own gratitude for those who have served in our military.

As the holidays approach, please join us at Wheaton's Christmas Parade on November 26, 2021 at 6 p.m. in Downtown Wheaton. I very much look forward to once again continuing this annual tradition.



Wheaton Bicycle Advisory Commission Recommends County Biking Resource

Eighty percent of residents in DuPage County are an 8-minute bike ride away from a bicycle trail in DuPage County. The [DuPage County Bikeways webpage](#) provides a wealth of information for bike riders! The website identifies bikeways and trails, provides links to maps, explains rules of the trails, and even has a trail app - just to name a few resources found there.

Here are resources on the website the Wheaton Bicycle Advisory Commission thinks you may find especially useful.

- View maps, estimated bicycling distances, and trails— both planned and existing from the [maps tab](#).

- [Trail closures](#) can be found on this webpage.

- Bird watching? Exercising? The website provides [suggested rides](#) and identifies trail heads with parking lots and those accessible to Metra and Pace services.

- Trails and bikeways that cross counties,



municipalities, and recreational areas require careful planning, engineering, and coordination in order to be completed. DuPage County is an active partner in making regional trail connections a reality. View [information about current projects](#).

- A trail mapping application enables users to actively navigate the county's trail system. You can find bathrooms, parking, rest stops, destinations, fire & police, and even bike shops along your planned route. November is Winter Preparedness Month

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) is recommending people start taking steps now to ensure they're prepared to stay safe and warm throughout the winter months.

Driving on snow or ice-covered roads can be extremely hazardous. Before starting a trip when the weather is bad, be sure to check road conditions on the Illinois Department of Transportation's Winter Road Conditions Map at [www.gettingaroundillinois.com](#).

Drivers should be sure to stock their vehicles with an emergency supply kit, in the event they are stranded on the roadside and need to wait for assistance. The emergency supply kit should include:

- Blankets/sleeping bags
- A flashlight with extra batteries

- A first aid kit
- Non-perishable food
- Water
- Sand or cat litter
- A shovel
- Booster cables
- A cell phone charger

Winter storms also can cause power outages that can last several hours or several days. It's important to have an emergency supply kit at home that includes a battery-powered National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather radio, water and non-perishable food, flashlights, extra batteries, a first aid kit and supplies for pets and family members with special medical needs. More tips for staying safe at home and on the road are available in a guide developed by IEMA and the National Weather Service, which is available on the Ready Illinois website at [www.Ready.Illinois.gov](#).
