Change Batteries in Smoke Alarms

Daylight Saving Time ends at 2 a.m. on Sunday, Nov. 6. When you change your clocks, the Wheaton Fire Department recommends you also change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. You should change the batteries about every six months to ensure the detectors will work correctly. Using Daylight Saving Time as a reminder of when you last changed batteries is an easy way to remember when it's time to replace them.

No Garbage Pickup

Lakeshore Recycling Systems will not collect garbage, recycling or yard waste on Thursday, Nov. 24 due to the Thanksgiving holiday. Pickups for Thursday, Nov. 24 and Friday, Nov. 25 will take place one day later than usual.

City Offices Closed

Don't throw your pumpkins in the trash after Halloween; take them to Wheaton's pumpkin compost collection.

From 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, Nov. 5, drive through the City's Commuter Parking Lot 9 and dump your pumpkins at the City's

annual pumpkin compost collection. Lot 9 is near the intersection of Carlton and Liberty Drive.

Please remove all decorations, plastic and candles.

Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission leads this project, which keeps thousands of pounds of pumpkins out of landfills and turns them into nutrient-rich soil. Last year's event collected 4.72 tons of pumpkins.

Leaf disposal procedures remain the same with new garbage/recycling program

Please do not blow or rake leaves into the street.

This can block storm sewers and lead to flooding issues. If possible, please help remove leaves and sticks near the storm sewers that are near your house to help them function properly.

Leaf disposal with Whea-

ton's new garbage/recycling/yard waste service provider remains the same, except that you can also include food scraps with your yard waste.

Burning leaves, tree trimmings, brush and related materials is not allowed in Wheaton and is a violation of City Code.

Last Chance to Switch Garbage Carts

Request different size by Nov. 30

Lakeshore Recycling Systems, Wheaton's new garbage/recycling/yard waste hauler, provided households with a new rolling garbage cart as part of the City's new

program. Residents had an opportunity to choose from a 35-, 65- or 95-gallon garbage cart before the new program began on Oct. 1.

If you did not select a size, Lakeshore provided you with a 35-gallon cart. You have until Nov. 30 to request a different size cart at no charge. To exchange your

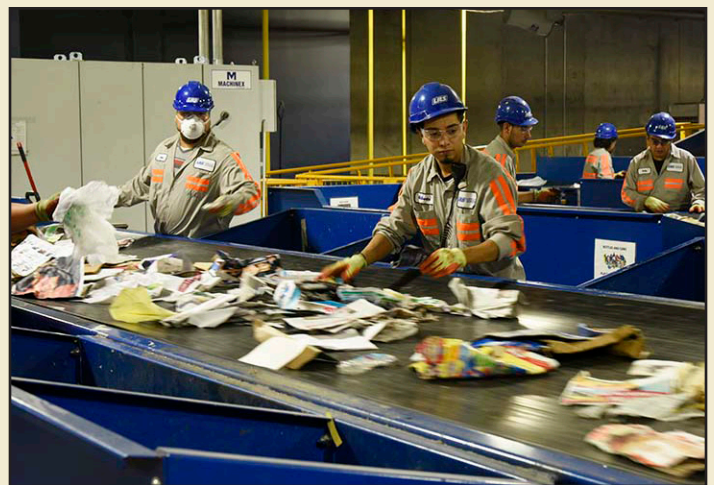
cart for a different size, call 773-685-8811 no later than Nov. 30. During this time, you can also request a smaller or larger recycling cart, which is offered in 35-, 65- and 95-gallon options. The standard recycling cart that most Wheaton households received with the previous program is a 65-gallon cart.

City Council Candidate Petitions Due

If you would like to run for one of the four district positions on the City Council (North, South, East and West), you must file a petition for candidacy with the Wheaton City Clerk between Monday, Nov. 21 and Monday, Nov. 28.

You can file your petition between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays during this time period, excluding holidays. City offices will be closed Nov. 24 and Nov. 25 for the Thanksgiving holiday.

To be eligible, you must:

- Be a registered voter of the City of Wheaton and must have lived within City limits for at least 1 year preceding the election; and
- File a Nonpartisan Primary Petition for Nomination signed by at least 25 registered City of Wheaton voters who live within the limits of your district, together with a Statement of Candidacy, Loyalty Oath (optional), and a receipt indicating the candidate has filed a Statement of Economic Interest with the DuPage County Clerk.

If more than four candidates file for each district position, there will be a Consolidated Primary election on Tuesday, Feb. 28, 2017. The Consolidated Election will be held on Tuesday, April 4, 2017.

Successful candidates will take office at either the first regular/special meeting after receipt of the official election results or at the first regular/special meeting in the month following their election.

The parade is staged on Wheaton Avenue by City Hall

and along Karlskoga Street. All parade participants must be in their assigned order by 5:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 25.

The parade steps off promptly at 6 p.m., starting at Wheaton Avenue and Wesley Street. It proceeds south on Wheaton Avenue, east on Front Street and ends at Cross Street and Front Street.

Recycle Your Old Holiday Lights

Kee your old holiday lights out of landfills by bringing them to Wheaton's holiday light recycling drop-off site.

Starting Nov. 21, you can bring strands of incandescent or LED lights and extension cords in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive any time between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate on the south side of Lib-

erty Drive. The Public Works Department will accept lights for recycling through Feb. 10, 2017.

This program is for light strings and extension cords only. Please do not drop off lawn ornaments, and do not put lights in a bag or box.

Elgin Recycling, www.elginrecycling.com, will collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas.

In addition to residents,



the City also welcomes businesses, schools and other organizations wanting to dispose of holiday lights to participate in the program.

Nicor Work Will Affect Some Areas

Some areas in Wheaton will be affected by Nicor Gas's multi-year project to modernize aging natural gas infrastructure. This could include sewer line inspections, marking existing utilities, and installing new gas line infrastructure in some Wheaton neighborhoods.

If you are part of the affected area, Nicor will notify you. Read on to see what you can expect if you live in an affected area.

Sewer inspections are part of Nicor Gas' safety practices. If your sewer service is not accessible from the street, NPL, a Nicor Gas contractor, will schedule an appointment to inspect the sewer line from inside your property. There will be no interruption to your natural gas or sewer service during the inspection. Vital

information from the inspection will be marked on lawns and sidewalks with spray paint.

Nicor Gas or its contractor NPL will contact you to schedule an appointment to locate your existing natural gas line and natural gas meter. They will identify where the new meter(s) will be placed outside of your property, if applicable, and locate your existing natural gas line. Any obstruction (drywall, furniture, enclosures) must be removed before the appointment so they can access your natural gas piping.

During this step, water, sewer, electric and cable utilities will also be located and identified with spray painted markings and colored flags. It is important that these markings always remain

visible for your safety. Private utility lines, such as sprinkler systems, are your responsibility to identify and mark at the time other utilities are marked.

Nicor Gas' contractor, NPL, will install a new natural gas main in your neighborhood and will also install a new natural gas line that connects your property to the natural gas main. Utilities may again be marked with spray paint and flags.

Nicor Gas, or its contractor NPL, will contact you to schedule an appointment to move your natural gas meter outside and reconfigure your inside piping. Your natural gas will remain off for approximately three hours. If there is more than one meter, the process may take longer. As a safety measure, they will remove or seal the retired

natural gas line at the point it enters your property.

Nicor Gas will restore landscaping and paving impacted by its construction to the condition in which it was found. Temporary restoration of some areas may be necessary until permanent restoration can be completed.

All Nicor Gas employees and contractors will have Nicor Gas or AGL Resources-issued ID cards and will present them if requested. If you have questions related to this project, contact Liz Goad at 630-669-9438 or LGoad@southernco.com.

Help Available through Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program

Benefits paid directly to utility company

Eligible residents can receive help to pay heating bills through DuPage County's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program this winter.

DuPage County Community Services will accept winter heating applications until May 31, 2017, or until

funds are depleted. Benefits are paid directly to the utilities on behalf of eligible households.

If your household's combined gross income for the 30 days beginning with the date of the application is at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level, you

may qualify for assistance. A single-person household can qualify for the program with a monthly gross income of up to \$1,485; a two-person household up to \$2,003; and a family of four can earn up to \$3,038.

The State of Illinois will be offering the Percentage of Income Payment Plan for the current program year through

Dec. 31, or until funds are exhausted.
