New Adjudication Hearings Add Convenience for Residents

*Municipal Ordinance
Hearings Take Place
Monthly at City Hall*

The City is starting a new process to address some types of City Code violations that will create a more convenient process for citizens. Known as administrative adjudication, this is a process in which an impartial hearing officer oversees certain violations of municipal ordinances at a hearing at City Hall, rather than going through the DuPage County Court System.

The City will hold Administrative Adjudication Hearings at 6:30 p.m. on the second Wednesday of each month, a time chosen outside of typical business and school hours to provide a more convenient time for citizens to attend. The hearings will be in

the second floor Council Chambers at City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St.

The types of violations that will be addressed at these hearings include:

- Parking violations (excluding those in the Central Business District, commuter parking lots, daily fee parking areas, and metered parking areas).
- Alcoholic beverage violations
- Animal code violations
- Zoning code violations

- Building and fire code violations
- Stormwater violations
- Business violations
- Health and sanitation concerns

Administrative Adjudication hearings are less formal than proceedings held at the DuPage County Courthouse. Administrative Adjudication hearings do not follow the rigid and complex rules of evidence

Lawn Watering Restrictions Begin

Lawn watering restrictions start May 15. Annual lawn watering restrictions go into effect from May 15 to September 15. Residents with odd-numbered street addresses can water their lawns on odd-numbered days and those with even-numbered addresses are limited to even-numbered days. Sprinkling is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m. every day.

If you will be placing sod or planting grass seed, contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for a 10-day new sod/seed variance.

Hale Street Tents Return to Downtown

Outdoor Dining & Entertainment Provided Throughout the Summer

The City and the Downtown Wheaton Association are pleased to welcome the return of the outdoor dining tents on Hale Street beginning May 7. The City authorized the Downtown Wheaton Association to use the block of Hale Street between Front Street and Wesley Street for large outdoor dining tents that are shared by all of the surrounding restaurants.

First introduced during 2020 to allow restaurants to offer more space for serving residents during the initial stages of COVID-19, the City approved their return

for 2021 and 2022. Not only are local restaurants able to provide more space for dining, but it also provides an opportunity for open-air dining in a lively atmosphere.

The Downtown Wheaton Association oversees this community favorite between May and October, bringing in entertainment on weekend nights.

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used in court proceedings but still follow a basic structure to ensure fairness and due process of law. A hearing officer, who is independent and not a City employee, presides over the hearings. The hearing officer is an impartial, licensed attorney, who must meet strict state requirements to serve as a hearing officer.

Not all municipal violations require you to appear at an Administrative Adjudication Hearing. If you receive a ticket/citation/complaint, it will instruct you if it is a "must

appear offense." If you are required to appear, you must attend the specified hearing date on the ticket, citation, or complaint. If it is not an offense that requires you to appear at a hearing, you can choose to either pay the fine specified on the ticket/citation/complaint within 15 days, or you may choose to contest the ticket/citation/complaint by attending a specified Administrative Adjudication Hearing.

Spotlight on Wheaton's Volunteers

One of the most exciting parts of this season is seeing our community bustling with activity. What you might not know is that community volunteers are the backbone of many events and programs happening this spring and summer.

More than 100 residents comprise 17 boards and commissions, volunteering their time and talents in a variety of ways. After many events were unable to take place in the past two years, it's wonderful to see the return of programs and events that make our community stand out. The following is just a sampling of what has kept our boards and commissions busy lately.

The Environmental Improvement Commission just completed a whirlwind month of activities in April, including the Recycling Extravaganza, Native Plant Sale, Prairie Path Cleanup and Arbor Day. The results of their efforts are astounding. At the Recycling Extravaganza, 856 cars dropped off: 25,700 pounds of paper for shredding, 4,500 pounds of latex paint, 1,045 pounds of batteries, 12 bins of syringes/medications ... and much

more. At the Prairie Path Cleanup, 106 volunteers spent their Saturday morning picking up 60 bags of trash and 35 bags of recyclable materials.

The commission also organized talks on historic fires in Wheaton and the former railway line in Wheaton; and there's even a free parking week at Cantigny Park for Wheaton residents to visit and explore this historic park and museum.

And, the Band Commission is preparing for a summer full of beautiful music in Memorial Park with the return of the Wheaton Municipal Band's summer concerts. The first concert of the season will be June 9 at 7:30 p.m. It's the volunteers on the Band Commission who are behind the scenes working to make this Wheaton summertime tradition happen.

Great Fires of Wheaton

Be Prepared for Severe Weather

Storms develop quickly and can occur with little to no warning. Heavy winds and lightning caused by storms can cause extended power outages, uprooted trees, landslides, and downed or broken utility lines. Additionally, heavy rains can cause flash floods.

Familiarize yourself with the following terms to stay alert and prepared.

Tornado Watch - conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes.

Tornado Warning - a tornado has been reported by spotters, or National Weather Service (NWS) meteorologists have determined that one is about to form in the next several minutes. Go to a substantial shelter immediately.

Severe Thunderstorm Watch - conditions are favorable for the development of severe thunderstorms containing large hail and damaging wind.

Severe Thunderstorm Warning - large hail and/or damaging wind has been



reported by spotters, or is about to develop. Go to a substantial shelter immediately.

During the storm

- Avoid handling metal, electrical equipment, telephones, bathtubs, water faucets, and sinks, because electric current from lightning can travel through wires and pipes.
- If you are outside, take cover in a stable facility. Avoid taking shelter under trees.
- Tune in to local TV/radio channels for emergency advisories and instructions.
- Avoid walking through water that has seeped into your home; it may contain hazardous materials.
- If you are asked to

evacuate your home, follow instructions given to you by emergency personnel.

- Call the City's Public Works Department to report fallen trees or clogged catch basins.

- Call your local public works department or village hall to report flooded streets.

- Avoid downed power lines and broken gas lines. Report them to 9-1-1.

After the storm

- Assess your immediate environment.
- Report fallen trees, flooded streets, or damaged public utilities to the proper department.
- Stay tuned to local weather stations for updated information.

Spraying for Invasive Moths in June

In late June, the Illinois Department of Agriculture will be [spraying an aerial treatment in Wheaton to help stop the spread of gypsy moths, now known as spongy moths](#). These one of the most damaging forest and tree pests in the U.S., responsible for millions of acres of defoliation annually.

To prevent the spread of these moths, a product will be applied by planes that fly at a low altitude over part of our community. The product is a non-toxic mating disruption pheromone that does not harm humans or other living things; rather, the pheromone makes it difficult for male spongy moths to find female moths, thereby disrupting mating.

The City is sharing information so residents are not alarmed to see planes flying lower than usual in our area. We will provide additional information before this spraying takes place.
