filled. Each container or bag requires a green leaf sticker, which is available at City Hall, [303 W. Wesley St.](#), and at many local grocery and hardware stores. Advanced Disposal also takes credit card orders by phone by calling 630-587-8282.

Please note that leaf burning is not permitted. It is also illegal to rake or blow leaves onto the street, as this practice can clog storm sewers and cause flooding. If possible, please help remove leaves and sticks near the storm sewers that are near your house to help them function properly.

Leaves will be collected on the same day as your regular garbage and recycling pickup through Dec. 13, 2013.

An eco-friendly alternative to placing your leaves out for collection is to compost leaves into mulch for your yard or garden.

# Wheaton Reads: “Pride and Prejudice”

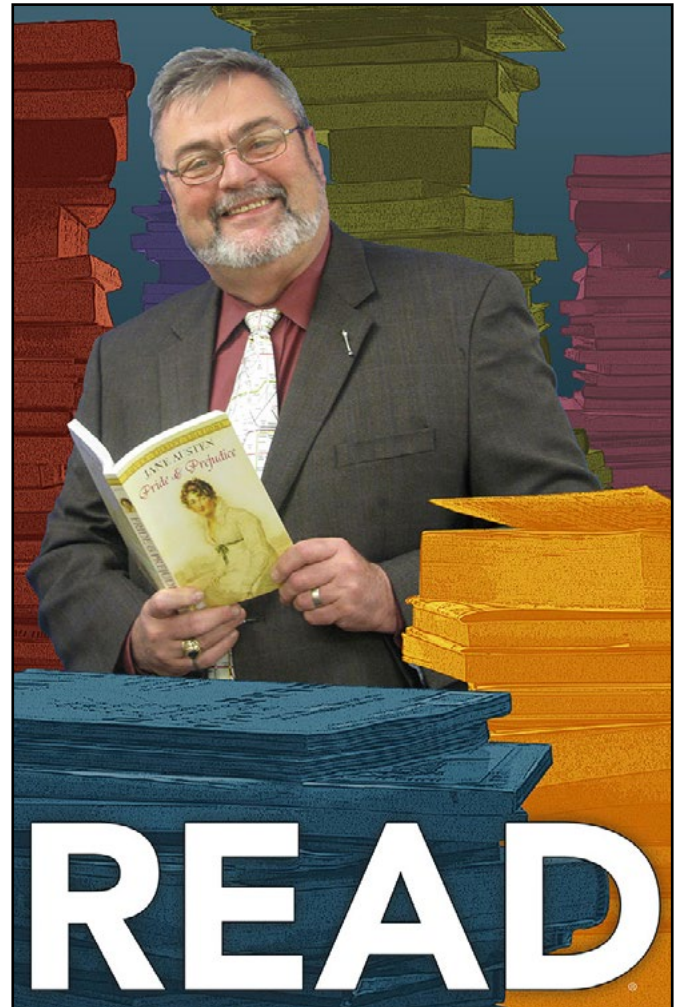
*Library encourages community to get involved in programs and discussions*

The Wheaton Public Library is launching a community-wide reading and book discussion program this October with Wheaton Reads: “Pride and Prejudice.” The month-long celebration of the Jane Austen classic kicks off on Sunday, Oct. 6, with a presentation by Kim Wilson entitled “In the Garden with Jane Austen.” The presentation highlights 18th- and 19th-century gardening and the role that gardens played in the lives and love of Austen and her characters.

Other presentations planned for the month include Tea Time with Chef Michael Maddox, an English Country Dance with music by Old Fezziwig’s Band,

a program on the art of silhouette, and a visit with the author of “Definitely Not Mr. Darcy,” Karen Doornebos. A film fest will feature showings of various versions of “Pride and Prejudice” including the Bollywood production “Bride and Prejudice.” Book discussions are planned throughout the month in various locations.

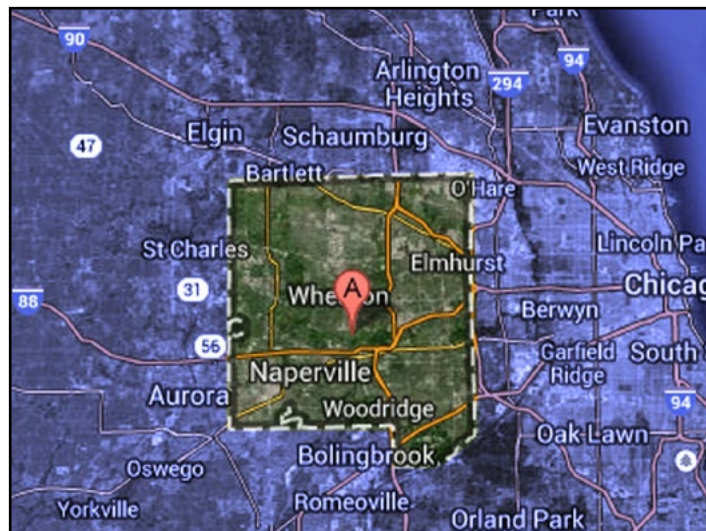


Mayor Michael Gresk reads “Pride and Prejudice.”

## Heroin in DuPage County: An Equal Opportunity Epidemic

“Not my kid.” That’s what Kim, one DuPage County mother, thought about heroin use. Her son was an accomplished athlete with a normal childhood and a strong circle of friends.

Yet Kim discovered what police departments throughout DuPage County have found: heroin truly is an equal opportunity epidemic. Its reach cuts across all age groups and socioeconomic groups, and its consequences are deadly. Kim and her son Nick, a recovering heroin addict, share their powerful story in a new video from the City of Wheaton Communications Department, “[Heroin in DuPage County: An Equal Opportunity Epidemic.](#)”

The show’s moderator, Kent Williams of the DuPage County Chiefs of Police Association, says Nick and Kim’s story reflects a grow-

ing epidemic in the area. In the month of July 2013 alone, there were 18 heroin deaths in DuPage County.

“It’s a living nightmare, and it’s here to stay,” Williams

## Electronic Recycling

Drop off your unwanted electronics for recycling during the City's monthly collection event. Electronics such as televisions, computers, printers and small household appliances such as toasters and hair dryers are accepted. Also, Wheaton residents can now bring fluorescent bulbs for safe disposal (no businesses, please). The types of bulbs accepted include T-12, T-8 and T-5 fluorescent bulbs (often found in light fixtures used in utility rooms and basements); aquarium tubes; under-counter



fluorescent tubes. Please do not tape fluorescent tubes together. CFLs and household batteries are not accepted at the monthly electronic recycling collection. [More information is on the City's website.](http://More.information.is.on.the.City's.website)

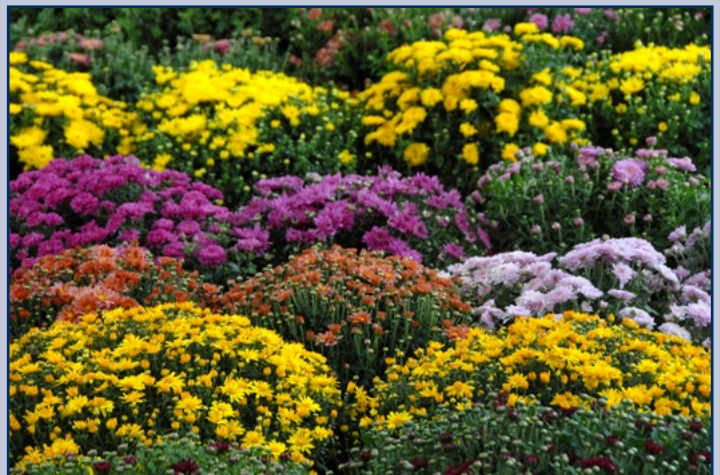

## French Market

## New Payment Method for Pace and CTA

**P**ace and CTA are transitioning to a new payment system called Ventra. It is a convenient system that allows customers to use a single fare card for regional transit throughout Chicago and the suburbs.

Ventra customers can pay for rides with the following contactless payment methods: Ventra Cards, Ventra Tickets for single-ride and 1-day passes, and personal bank-issued debit and credit cards equipped with a contactless chip. Customers will simply "tap" any of these contactless payment cards to quickly board trains and buses.

Pace and CTA will continue to offer special fares and money-saving passes, like the Commuter Club Card and the Campus Connection Pass, and will still accept cash on buses. Customers will also eventually be able to use compatible mobile phones to pay for train and bus rides.

Ventra Cards and fare products are sold at vending machines in rail stations and up to 2,500 Chicagoland retail locations. In 2014, all CTA and Pace fare media will be replaced with Ventra.

# Trick-or-Treat Safely



**H**alloween is a festive and fun time of the year for children of all ages. The Wheaton Police Department offers the following tips to promote safety and protect children.

- Remind children to trick-or-treat on one side of the street at a time. Refrain from crossing the street in the middle of the block or between parked cars. Cross the street only in the crosswalk or at the corner, using caution.

- Trick-or-treat while it is light outside. If you must be out after dark, wear white or light-colored clothing, put reflective tape on your costume and treat bag, and carry a flashlight so you can be seen. Never carry a lit torch or candle.

- Dress children in non-flammable costumes that fit properly – short enough to

prevent tripping. Avoid wearing facial masks, which obstruct vision. Use face paint and makeup instead.

- Trick-or-treat with friends and stay in a group; there is safety in numbers. Never trick-or-treat alone.

- Make sure young children are accompanied by an adult (parent) or responsible teen (older brother or sister) while trick-or-treating.

- Advise children not to enter any residence or vehicle for the promise of anything. Children should wait outside the door for their treats.

- Plan your trick-or-treat route ahead of time, staying in your own immediate neighborhood along well-lit streets. Do not wander far from home.

- Instruct children never to eat any treats until they return home and the treats

have been examined under sufficient light by an adult. Check the wrappers of commercial candy for signs of tampering. Wash and cut fruit before eating. Throw away anything unwrapped. Notify the police if there are any suspicious treats.

- Always walk on the sidewalk while trick-or-treating. If there is no sidewalk on the street, keep to the left, next to the curb, and walk single file facing (against) traffic.

- Children should be courteous and respectful of other people's property. Damaging or defacing property will not be tolerated.

- Parents should know with whom their children are trick-or-treating and which route they are taking.

- Homeowners should leave outside porch lights on.

When property remains unclaimed or the owner is unknown, it is sold at auction to the highest bidder pursuant to Section 2-506 of the Wheaton City Code.
