Holiday Light Recycling Now Open

Wheaton's holiday light recycling program is back now through Friday, Jan. 20. Bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. weekdays. This program is for light strings only. Please do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and do not put lights in a bag or box.

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New Location for Daily Fee Parking in Lot 9

Due to a decreased demand for parking in the City's Commuter Parking Lot 9 (located at Carlton & Liberty), daily fee parking spaces are moving from the west side of the lot to the north side, near Liberty Drive. 2023 Municipal Election Nomination Objections and Candidate Withdrawals

Notice is hereby given that the Office of the City Clerk, local election official in and for the City of Wheaton, at 303 W. Wesley St., Wheaton, Illinois, will accept objections to nomination petitions and candidate's withdrawing his or her name from the 2023 municipal election.

Objections to nomination petitions may be filed within five (5) business days following the last day



of filing - November 29, 2022, through December 5, 2022, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Any candidate who has filed a nomination petition may cause his/her name to be withdrawn up to December 21, 2022,

between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Objections and withdrawals are filed with the Wheaton City Clerk, Wheaton City Hall, 303 West Wesley Street, Second Floor, Wheaton, Illinois.

Beware of Scam Involving Impersonation of Police Officer

The Wheaton Police Department has received numerous reports from area residents and businesses that were called by an individual claiming to be associated with the Wheaton Police Department. In this scam, the suspect, who is using the name of a retired police officer, claims that the resident failed to appear in court as a witness, and he has warrants for their arrest. He instructs them to send money through Zelle or Venmo to an address in Washington D.C. to resolve the arrest

charges. The Wheaton Police Department does not contact individuals by phone to request payment for an arrest, nor would the Police Department instruct individuals to wire or send money. Residents can always contact the Wheaton Police Department at 630-260-2161 to confirm the legitimacy of a caller claiming to be from the Police Department.

Officer Kaufman Receives the Life-Saving Award



These are the kinds of stories we like to share: On October 15, Wheaton Police Officer Kaufman was the first responder arriving to a Wheaton residence

in response to a 9-1-1 call for a woman in full cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, Officer Kaufman identified that the woman was unconscious and had no pulse, and he immediately began administering chest compressions while instructing the victim's husband how to prepare an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for use. Each of Wheaton's Police Department squad cars are equipped with AED devices for situations like this. Officer Kaufman continued chest compressions until Wheaton Fire Department personnel arrived to continue care and deliver an AED shock

to the victim. They were able to establish a pulse and breathing, and the victim was transported to Central DuPage Hospital to receive advanced care. The resident has returned home and is expected to make a full recovery! In recognition of Officer Kaufman's actions that directly contributed to saving this individual's life, Officer Kaufman received the Life-Saving Award. And, making the presentation of this award even better, Officer Kaufman was joined by the woman whose life he helped save and her husband, who thanked Officer Kaufman for his extraordinary efforts.

DuPage County Launches 211

DuPage County launched 211 which is a free, confidential information and referral service that will provide a 24-hour central access point to local health and human services 365 days a year.

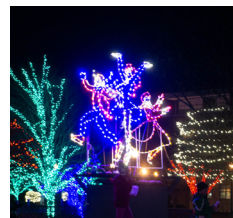
The 211 line enables DuPage County residents to use an easy three-digit number to access help by phone – or via the new 211 web address, 211dupage.gov. Over the years, DuPage County has compiled a database of roughly 640 service providers offering thousands of services for DuPage County residents.

Holiday Safety Tips from the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA)

With the holiday season in full swing, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) is offering tips to help people stay safe now and into the new year. From decorating the tree to traveling to grandma's house with a sleigh full of new toys, be sure to take simple steps to keep your family safe.

Holiday Shopping Safety

- If shopping online, only use secure sites and think before you click.
- Keep track of your bank and credit card statements.
- Try to use a credit card over a debit card.
- Websites with <https://> are generally safer than those with URLs beginning with <http://>

as the "s" indicates it is website using secure communication.

Winter Heating

- Chimneys and fireplaces should be regularly inspected and cleaned.
- Additionally, furnaces should be checked every year by professionals.

Holiday Travel

- If traveling by car, remember to pack an emergency supply kit.
- Before you drive, check road conditions and avoid traveling during winter storms.
- Let your in case of emergency (ICE) contact know your travel plans and location.

Snow Parking Reminders

Knowing where and when you can park when it snows helps crews clear streets as quickly as possible. Under City Code 70-344, after 2 inches of accumulated snow, parking is prohibited on any City street, and Downtown Wheaton parking is prohibited from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Vehicles obstructing plows may be towed by the Wheaton Police Department at the owner's expense. This allows Wheaton's Public Works Department to clear the roadways efficiently and safely.

Other reminders during snow:

- Do not blow, plow or, shovel snow into the street, as this hinders the efforts of City crews and creates a safety hazard for other drivers.
- Help keep fire hydrants visible by clearing snow and ice 3 feet away from the hydrant.
- The City encourages you to keep the sidewalks near your home clear of snow for the safety of children walking to school or bus stops and other pedestrians.
- The City's snowplows are designed to push snow to the side of the roadway. This is the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snow from the street and

open the street to traffic. There is no way to plow the street so that every driveway remains free of piled snow, and the clearing of driveway aprons is the responsibility of the resident.

- The Wheaton Public Works Snow Desk can be reached at 630-260-7669 during most snow events. The voicemail is monitored, and citizens may leave messages for staff regarding any plowing complaints, damage to mailboxes, sod, and any other non-emergency requests or concerns. These requests can also be reported online using the City's [service request form](#).
- Emergency situations, including impassable or icy roadways, which may cause traffic crashes or stuck vehicles should be immediately reported to 9-1-1.

Clearing the City of snow and ice can be a tremendous task for Wheaton's Public Works.

Please help keep Wheaton's streets safe by reporting dangerous roadway conditions to 9-1-1 and clearing sidewalks adjacent to your residence or business.

General Overnight Parking Reminders



Parking on all City streets is prohibited without prior approval between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. If you need to park your vehicle on a City street between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., you must submit a request online. No street parking is allowed after 2 inches of accumulated snow, and vehicles must be relocated off City streets.



MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Mayor's Message: Reflecting on 2022

At the end of the year, it's rewarding to take a look back at 2022 to see what we have accomplished and celebrate our community's successes. The City continues to maintain a level of activity in building out infrastructure, enhancing services and taking on difficult projects with respect to roads, flooding and sanitary sewers, which have historically not been aggressively addressed. Key accomplishments over the past year include the following:

Downtown Streetscape Project

This year marked substantial completion of the Downtown Streetscape Project, with the final leg of this project constructing a pavilion at Liberty and Main that will be used for the French Market and other events, and creating beautiful gathering areas on the south side of the railroad tracks. In total, this project invested more than \$35 million in important infrastructure work in our downtown, including replacing century-old

underground pipes, reconstructing streets, converting to LED streetlights, creating wider pedestrian-friendly sidewalks, and adding trees, seating and native plant species. Other amenities include bicycle parking throughout the downtown, water and fire features and abundant planters to beautify the heart of our city.

Safety Initiatives

The Wheaton Police Department rolled out the use of body-worn cameras for all sworn officers, a step to increase transparency. In addition, numerous community engagement events with the Police Department offered

opportunities for residents to meet the officers who serve their neighborhood and learn safety information pertinent to their part of the city. The City also hired two additional police officers.

Roosevelt Road Corridor Plan

This year the City adopted the Roosevelt Road Corridor Plan as part of the City's Comprehensive Plan. Guided by community input, this plan established a shared vision for future development along Roosevelt Road and will help foster new opportunities for commercial and residential development.

Flood Mitigation Work

Following an extensive process to identify the location and severity of issues throughout the community, the City kicked off the first capital improvement project to mitigate flood prone areas and introduced a shared cost program to reduce yard flooding. The City also increased funding levels for existing programs that help residents protect their

homes from sewer backups.

City's Finances Remain Strong

We were able to complete all of the above projects and much more without seeking new sources of revenue or reducing service levels. The City remains in elite company, as one of only 19 municipalities in Illinois and only 426 nationwide to earn an AAA S&P Global Rating, the highest possible rating.

The past year has included exciting progress throughout the community, and there hasn't been a better time to live in Wheaton. Your City will continue working each day to ensure we are providing an exceptional place to live with quality infrastructure and excellent services.

As we close 2022, I wish you a Merry Christmas, a wonderful holiday season and a happy new year. I hope everyone is able to enjoy family and friends and enjoy the various holiday events that occur throughout our community.
