With the coming of spring, the Wheaton Bicyclist and Pedestrian Commission is running a short 5-minute survey from now until May 15 seeking residents' opinions about biking and walking here in Wheaton. In addition, as more people are out biking, the Wheaton Bicyclist and Pedestrian Commission would like the community to know that there are now over 225 bike racks throughout Wheaton. A large concentration is in the downtown central business district, near the Wheaton Public Library, and near the Wheaton and College Avenue train stations. Also, there is a new bike shelter and repair

station on the Prairie Path Main Stem near the corner of Liberty and Main, which is part of the City's recently completed Downtown Streetscape Project.

The Bicyclist and Pedestrian Commission was created to encourage walking and biking in Wheaton. They also provide opportunities to teach kids bike etiquette and safety each year at different events. The commission's mission is to represent walkers, runners, and bikers in the planning of safer streets, paths and sidewalks. In addition, the commission organizes various group walks and bike rides throughout the area.

The commission meets monthly, with its next meeting happening May 17 at 7 p.m. Members of the public can always join the meeting in person at City Hall upstairs in the Gamon Room or via Zoom. The commission is looking for more members. Those who might be interested are encouraged to attend a future meeting.


Springtime Reminder to 'Walk Your Wheels' in Downtown Wheaton



With warmer weather comes more pedestrian and bicycle traffic, especially in downtown Wheaton. To help keep everyone safe, the City of Wheaton does not allow you to ride bicycles, skateboards, scooters, in-line skates or roller skates on the sidewalks within the heart of the downtown or through the Hale Street Tents.

While you can still ride on the streets, if you choose to go on the sidewalk, you must "walk your wheels" within the boundaries of the following streets: Wesley Street to the north; Cross Street to the east; Willow Street to the south; and West Street to the west. Wheaton Joining Other Communities in Urging State Lawmakers to Return Taxes to Communities



The City of Wheaton is joining forces with other cities, villages, and counties across the state to urge state lawmakers to Invest In Communities by returning a greater portion of your taxes back to our community.

What does that mean? When the State income tax was established more than 50 years ago, it was agreed that a portion of it should be returned to each community based on population. In the State budget, this funding is known as the Local Government Distributive Fund, or LGDF.

LGDF is an important revenue source for every local government in the state, not only because it is stable and reliable year after year, but because each community can use it wherever it is most

needed to stabilize and improve the community. In Wheaton, LGDF makes up nearly 7% of our annual operating budget, or approximately \$8 million of the City's \$120 million budget.

But here's the problem: in 2011, the State decreased the portion of income taxes that is returned to our community from LGDF. Rather than 10% of income taxes, Illinois lawmakers have allocated just over 6% to local governments in recent years.

Across the state, municipalities and counties have lost out on more than \$8 billion that could be used in lieu of property taxes or other revenues to replace lead service lines, train police officers, buy equipment for first responders, pay down public safety pension obligations,

improve or repair infrastructure projects, and more. In Wheaton, restoring the portion of income taxes returned to the City to 10% would provide an additional \$2.9 million for these projects.

With the State's financial condition the healthiest it has been in decades, Illinois municipalities are asking the General Assembly to prioritize funding for infrastructure, public safety, and community services in all Illinois communities by restoring LGDF.

In Wheaton, additional funding could

be used for capital projects to reduce flooding and improve Wheaton roads, without needing to raise our local taxes.

As Illinois lawmakers prepare this year's State Budget, the City of Wheaton is urging the General Assembly to Invest In Communities and restore the Local Government Distributive Fund to 10%. 
Celebrate National Public Works Week May 21-27

Spring Has Sprung: Know City Requirements for Lawn Care

The much-anticipated spring weather has arrived, and so has the lawn and gardening season. To assist in maintaining the health, beauty, and safety of the community, the City of Wheaton has

adopted ordinances that address tall grass and weeds.

As a reminder, grass and weeds exceeding 8 inches in height are a violation of City code. When left uncut and overgrown, grass and weeds can attract

unwanted pests such as mice and insects and provide cover for wild animals that cause nuisances within neighborhoods. Additionally, tall, dried out grass and weeds during the later summer months are a potential

fire hazard. If you notice such overgrowth in the area, you can report the situation using the [City's Online Service Request Form](#) or call the Building & Code Enforcement Department at 630-260-2050 Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Spring into Safety: Preparedness Before, During, and After a Tornado

According to the National Weather Service (NWS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), nearly 80% of Illinois' tornadoes occur during the months of April through June, often in the late afternoon and early evening. In a typical year, Illinois averages 50 tornadoes.

Understanding the difference between a tornado watch and tornado warning is a great first step to prepare for tornadoes in Illinois. A tornado watch, issued by the NOAA Storm Prediction Center, can cover parts of a state or several states. The community is encouraged to watch

and prepare for severe weather by looking for updates through the NOAA Weather Radio, following the National Weather Service online or via social media, local television weather reports, and weather apps. A tornado warning, issued by your local NOAA National Weather Service Forecast Office, means a tornado has been reported or indicated by radar and there is a serious threat to life and property. This indicates that you should act immediately and find safe shelter.

Taking safety precautions before, during, and after a tornado is critical to ensuring your safety.

The NOAA recommends taking the following safety measures:

Before a tornado

- Ensure every family member knows the tornado safety location in your home
- Keep an emergency kit in your home at all times
- Identify where to go if you are away from home (such as at work or school)
- Make a family communications plan

During a tornado

- Find a safe location in a substantial building, away from windows, and on the lowest level of

a sturdy building, preferably in a basement

- If there is no basement, get to the lowest floor in a small, interior room such as a closet, hallway, or bathroom without windows
- If you are in a vehicle, buckle up and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter and never stay under a bridge

After a tornado:

- Avoid damaged areas
- Beware of downed power lines, broken gas lines, and dangerous debris
- Follow instructions from local officials

Celebrating Wheaton's History: Preservation Week May 12-22



It's May, and that means it's time to recognize Wheaton's history as well as learn more about the City. The City of Wheaton's Historic Commission is offering several events and opportunities for the community to do so.

Residents will notice blue signs going up in front of the over 200 historic homes and buildings beginning May 12. Scan the QR code on the sign with your phone's camera to be directed to the new interactive [Wheaton Historic Register Map](#).

The map provides images of the sites plus information such as the date built, prominent citizens of the past who lived in the home, and the architectural style.

For those who want to learn more about the history of their Wheaton home, two sessions of Home History Research one-on-one will be offered at the Wheaton Public Library featuring Gretchen Murphy, Adult Services Librarian, Genealogy & Local History Specialist.
