Thanksgiving Garbage Collection & City Office Holiday Closures

There will be no garbage collection on Thursday, Nov. 23. Pickup will be delayed by one day for residents whose regular collection day is Thursday or Friday. Additionally, City offices will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 23 and Friday, Nov. 24 in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

City of Wheaton Leaf Collection Reminders



As the autumn leaves begin to fall, the City of Wheaton reminds you of the ways you can properly dispose of leaves.

- Place leaves in containers 35 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags
- Containers or bags must weigh less than 50 pounds when filled.
- Each container or bag requires an LRS yard waste/organics/ excess garbage sticker, available at City Hall and at many local grocery and hardware stores
- When you're cleaning up leaves, please be careful not to blow or rake them into the streets. Doing so can prevent storm sewers from functioning properly and can lead to flooding. If your house is located near a storm sewer catch basin, please help

keep it clear by sweeping away leaves and debris from the sewer grate.

- Burning leaves is not allowed.
- LRS collects yard waste, food scraps and organic materials on your garbage day through the second full week of December.

An environmentally friendly alternative to bagging leaves is to mulch them into your lawn and/or garden beds. Using a lawnmower with a mulching function can break down leaves into small pieces, allowing them to be either collected and spread into garden beds or finely shredded into lawns to break down.

How to Deter Coyotes and Protect Your Pets



Coyotes are highly adaptable animals that can thrive in almost any setting, including residential areas. They are generally afraid of people but can become accustomed to them if they find an easy food source like pet food or if they are intentionally fed. As a reminder, the City of Wheaton has adopted this [Coyote Policy](#) for how the City addresses situations regarding coyotes.

Recently, the City has received an increased number of coyote sighting reports. If you have pets, here are some precautions you can take:

- Watch small pets when they're outdoors. Fences do not guarantee your pet's safety, so

you should always attend to small pets outdoors.

- Do not leave pet food outside or feed wild animals. Doing so attracts coyotes and other creatures that provide major portions of a coyote's natural diet.
- Use a short leash when walking your pet, and never let a coyote get between you and your pet.

If you encounter a coyote, help reestablish fear of humans by acting aggressively, yelling, stomping, and clapping. Anyone can call 9-1-1 if they observe any wild animal behaving in a threatening manner. Police officers will respond.

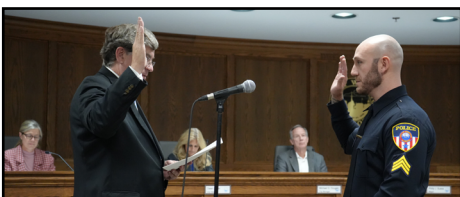
- **Light Up Wheaton:** It's the third year of this special initiative that invites the entire community to help Light Up Wheaton with their own seasonal light displays. Drive around the community

The Reintroduction of Native Americans into Illinois

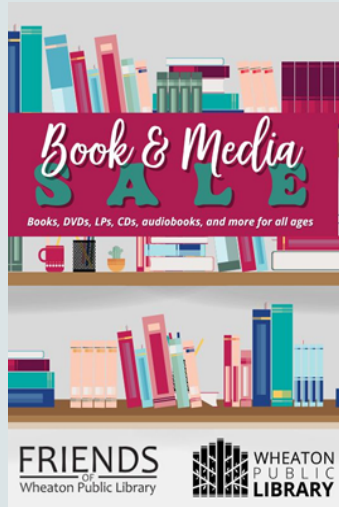

Holiday Light Recycling Returns to Wheaton in 2023



Wheaton's holiday light recycling program is back Monday, Nov. 13 through Friday, Jan. 19. Bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate. This program is for light strings only. Please do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and

do not put lights in a bag or box. Elgin Recycling, <https://www.elginrecycling.com/>, will collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas. In addition to residents, the City also welcomes businesses, schools, and other organizations wanting to dispose of holiday lights to participate in the program. There is no limit as to how many lights you can drop off for recycling.

Prepare for the Cold: Practice Winter Weather Safety



Illinois is prone to severe winter weather. On average, Illinois experiences five severe winter storms each year. From November 2020 through April 2021 there were eight snow or ice storms that impacted Illinois. There has not been a winter in Illinois without at least one winter storm in the past century, according to the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA). As the cold further settles in this season, residents are reminded to prepare for winter weather during IEMA's Winter Weather Safety Month.

Winterize your home

- Winterize your home to extend your fuel supply.
- Insulate walls and attics.
- Caulk and weatherize doors and windows.
- Install storm windows or cover windows with plastic.
- Prevent frozen water pipes by insulating those most susceptible to freezing: typically, those near outer walls, in crawl spaces or in attics.

Prepare your vehicle for winter weather

- Winterize your vehicle or have your vehicle serviced by a reputable dealer, garage, or mechanic.
- Check your wipers, tires, lights, and fluid levels regularly. Make sure the brakes and transmission are working properly. Lubricate door and trunk locks to prevent them from

freezing.

- Prepare a Winter Storm Survival Kit and carry it in your vehicle. A kit is important even for short trips. If you have an accident or vehicle breakdown, you may be waiting several hours for assistance to arrive.

Drive safely and be cautious on the road

- Buckle your seat belt!
- Keep your windows clear of snow and ice. Do not start driving until your windshield is defrosted.
- Drive slower and increase your following distance. Your speed should be adjusted for the conditions and match the flow of traffic.
- Roadway conditions may vary depending on the sun, shade, or roadway surface. Watch for slick spots especially under bridges, on overpasses and in shaded areas.
- If the pavement is snow or ice covered, start slowly and brake gently. Begin braking early when you come to an intersection.
- If you start to slide, ease off the gas pedal or brakes. Steer into the direction of the skid until you feel you have regained traction, and then straighten your vehicle.

Whether you're at work, commuting, or at home, being ready for these frigid storms can help protect you and your loved ones.
