Stormwater Utility Fee Lookup Map

The City is proposing to restructure the existing stormwater utility based on each property's impervious surface area (any area on the property that prevents stormwater from draining into the soil), rather than water consumption. Holiday Light Recycling Available



Wheaton's holiday light recycling program is available now through Friday, Jan. 19. Bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate.

This program is for light strings only. Please do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and do not put lights in a bag or box. Elgin Recycling, [www.elginrecycling.com](#), will collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas.

In addition to residents, the City also welcomes businesses, schools, and other organizations wanting to dispose of holiday lights to participate in the program. There is no limit as to how many lights you can drop off for recycling.

Creekside Drive Bridge Replacement Complete

Based upon its age, the Creekside Drive bridge over Spring Brook Creek was reaching the end of its useful life. To continue enhancing the community's infrastructure, the Wheaton City Council authorized the project earlier this year and the bridge is now complete. The project involved relocating utilities; removing the old structure; installing new bridge supports, beams and decking; and restoring disrupted landscaping.

The Prairie School of DuPage

At the Nov. 20, 2023 City Council meeting, four adults, a high school student, one business and a school received Wheaton's first-ever Sustainability Awards from the City's Environmental Improvement Commission. The commission encouraged the community to nominate outstanding individuals, businesses/organizations, and students whose actions influence others to adopt sustainable practices. The recipients of these awards demonstrate a commitment to improving our local environment in a wide variety of ways.

Jim & Cathy Truesdale's dedication to recycling is next-level. The Truesdales are extremely conscientious of reducing their carbon footprint, using minimal electricity for heating and cooling, installing solar panels, driving a used electric hybrid vehicle, and even recapturing laundry water to fill toilet tanks. Jim consistently volunteers at the City's monthly recycling events and was instrumental in starting the Northern Illinois Food Bank in the early 1980s, sustaining hungry people.

Bill Nieman & Rita Nathanson are models of sustainable living in many ways, including riding their bikes anywhere they can, driving fully electric cars and using an electric lawn mower. In their yard, they use a rain barrel, compost, grow many of their own vegetables and have native plants throughout their landscape. Both serve on the Wheaton Bicyclist & Pedestrian Commission and volunteer for the DuPage County Forest Preserve.

Yusuf Hussain, a Glenbard West High School student, has a passion for conservation and sustainability, demonstrated through hard work transforming several areas in Wheaton. For his Eagle Scout project at Carriers of Light School and in his own yard, he removed invasive buckthorn and planted native species. Yusuf also set up rain barrels and chose native fruit trees to promote farm-to-fork lifestyles. In addition, he has taken many environmental courses at Glenbard West and plans to study this field in college.

Andrew's Garden earned a Sustainability Award for their concerted effort to use sustainable floristry practices, plus educating the Wheaton community and the floral community. They use locally grown flowers during Midwest growing seasons; eliminated the use of toxic floral foam; do not use dyes, bleach, or paint on flowers in their arrangements; send floral waste to be composted; and choose compostable wraps and paper products. They attend the Sustainable Flowers Project and share this knowledge with others in the floral business.

The Prairie School of DuPage, a kindergarten through 8th grade school, practices sustainability with its students on a daily basis. The school holds a mission to heighten students' environmental awareness and promote stewardship through developing ecological values out of first-hand experience. Students participate in waste-free lunches, composting, and gardening.

Stay Safe During the Holiday Season and New Year



During the holiday season, when families gather, parties are scheduled and travel spikes, safety should always be a priority. Take a look below at these safety tips from the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) to ensure your family remains safe and injury-free now and into the new year:

Holiday Decorating

Candles and string lights are common holiday decorations and help usher in the

holiday season but it's important to be careful when using them. Never leave burning candles unattended, never burn a candle near anything flammable, and keep candles out of the reach of children and pets. Holiday lights and electrical decorations should bear the name of an independent testing lab, like Underwriters Laboratories (UL), to prove they were safety tested.

Winter Heating

Chimneys and fireplaces should be

regularly inspected and cleaned. Additionally, furnaces should be checked every year by professionals to ensure mechanical parts are working properly. Malfunctioning furnaces increase both fire and carbon monoxide risks. Remember, if it is determined that the furnace needs to be replaced, a permit must be obtained from the City of Wheaton's Building Department.

Holiday Travel

Whether traveling by car, train or plane,

always use smart travel tips. If traveling by car, make sure to always have an emergency supply kit in the vehicle. Before hitting the road, check weather conditions and avoid traveling during severe winter storms. If taking a flight for the holidays, consider packing a small emergency kit that may include a flashlight and spare USB power bank. Additionally, make sure to inform somebody of your travel plans.

Stay safe and warm this holiday season!

Keeping Warm During Winter; Heating Ordinance & Permit Reminder

The colder months have arrived. The City of Wheaton has established heating ordinance requirements to ensure that all residents remain warm and comfortable.

From Sept. 15 through June 1, any individuals that rent or lease within the City are required to provide a minimum indoor temperature of 68 degrees Fahrenheit for their tenants.

Cooking appliances

and portable unvented fuel-burning space heaters cannot be used to provide required heating.

However, there is a provision for extremely cold weather conditions. When the outdoor temperature is below the "winter outdoor design temperature" for the locality, which is -4 degrees Fahrenheit, maintaining the minimum indoor temperature of 68

degrees Fahrenheit is not required as long as the heating system is operating at its full design capacity.

Now is a good time for homeowners and landlords to have their heating systems checked by a qualified professional to confirm that the unit is working properly. If it is determined that the furnace needs to be replaced, a permit must be obtained from the

Building Department. Once installed, a final inspection must be performed by the Building Department to verify proper installation.

As the year comes to a close, it is rewarding to reflect on 2023 to see all the City of Wheaton and its residents have accomplished and celebrate the many successes within our community. The City continues to be financially strong, delivering services and investing in our infrastructure. Many events and activities contributed to the vibrancy and spirit of our City in 2023.

Throughout the year, the City celebrated notable events such as the dedication of the Downtown Pavilion, the 100th year anniversary

of the Wheaton Public Library, and the return of the French Market, Hale Street Tents, and Wheaton Municipal Band for its 94th season.

We welcomed guests from our Sister City, Karlskoga Sweden, the hometown of Alfred Nobel, and celebrated the 50th anniversary of our Sister City relationship. The City enjoyed the return of various summer activities and festivals, including the Wheaton Welcomes Warhol festivities, Nights of Lights in Adams Park, Field of Honor, and Dinos Downtown Wheaton exhibit. These happenings, and various other community activities, were made possible by our community partners in the Wheaton Park District, Downtown Wheaton Association, and Wheaton Chamber of Commerce. We also celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the Wheaton Lions Club, honoring their years of service to the community. Through the hard work of our Forestry Department, Adams Park was designated a Level 1 Arboretum by Arbnet. Wheaton benefited from strong economic

activity throughout the year with new businesses and restaurants opening, new construction, and renovations of existing property throughout the City. With the return of Ann Taylor and the opening of Meredith Jaye, the revitalization of Town Square is accelerating. The opening of the J. Crew Factory Outlet store and the anticipated February opening of Nordstrom Rack at Danada East add to the excitement of shopping and doing business in the City. The opening of Liberty Flats, a new apartment building in the downtown, will further contribute to the continued growth of our downtown.

The City continued to focus on community outreach to engage and interact with our residents. The Wheaton Police Department continued its Neighborhood Roll Call program during the summer. In conjunction with Community School District 200, the Wheaton Police reestablished its DARE program and hosted numerous lunches and other interactions with local schools. Through our Boards and

Commissions and the Wheaton Public Library, the City continued to provide ongoing activities and events to engage community members of all ages.

During the year, we welcomed Brad Clousing to the City Council replacing Suzanne Fitch, we welcomed Dawn Didier as the new City Attorney replacing Jim Knippen who retired, we welcomed Robert Brill as our new Fire Chief, and promoted Princeton J. Youker to Police Chief following the retirement of Bill Murphy.

I want to thank our City Manager and all city employees for their hard work and dedication to running the City of Wheaton and recognize the contributions of our various Boards and Commissions for their energy and initiative in contributing to the vibrancy of our community. New 'Connect Wheaton' Program Enlists Community to Help Solve Crimes



As the City continually seeks to promote and enhance public safety in our community, the Wheaton Police Department is enlisting the public's help with a new safety initiative, Connect Wheaton. This program consists of an online security camera registry at www.connectwheaton.org where residents and businesses can register the location of their security cameras with the Wheaton Police

Department to help expedite emergency response and crime investigations.

Being able to determine where there are security cameras – including video doorbells, home security systems and commercial surveillance cameras – significantly enhances the Wheaton Police Department's response efforts. With this information, Wheaton Police Department detectives can quickly determine if video evidence might be available at a particular location and whom to contact to request it.

Residents and businesses can register their cameras with the Wheaton Police Department through the self-service portal at www.connectwheaton.org. Your information will be kept confidential and only accessed in the event of a criminal investigation or emergency incident. Camera registration does not give live video access to the Wheaton Police Department, and officers can only access camera location information when an incident occurs.

Practice Holiday Decorating Safety: Help the Wheaton Fire Department Keep the Wreath Red this Year

This holiday season, the Wheaton Fire Department will decorate Wheaton's three fire stations with wreaths that have a special significance. The wreaths are part of the Keep the Wreath Red fire safety campaign, a statewide program that reminds you to practice fire safety during the holiday season. The wreaths feature red lights, and for each Wheaton fire caused by holiday decorations, the



Fire Department will replace one red bulb with a white bulb.

Help the Wheaton Fire Department Keep the Wreath Red by unplugging holiday lights before leaving home or sleeping, being careful with candles, using flame-retardant decorations, ensuring lights are in good condition and Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed, and keeping trees watered.

Cold Weather Home Maintenance Tips



As the temperatures continue to fall, and autumn turns into winter, it is important that your plumbing is ready for the winter season. It is essential to ensure that your faucets, pipes, and gutters are in good working condition. Here are some useful plumbing tips from the City's Water Division to help prepare your home for the cold weather:

Cover or Insulate Exposed Pipes

In addition to sealing any gaps between the walls and pipes that are going inside of your house, also make sure to insulate pipes in unheated areas, like crawl spaces and your garage. When left exposed to the cold, unheated lines are prone to freezing.

In-ground irrigation systems

To freeze-proof an in-ground irrigation system, follow the manufacturer's procedures for draining and protecting it from winter damage.

Clean Your Gutters

Precipitation falls more quickly in winter than at any other time in the year. Because of the rainfall

and strong winds, you want to ensure your gutters and downspouts are clear of twigs, leaves, and other debris. Clean gutters will ensure proper draining and prevent rainwater from landing near your home's foundation.

Insulate and Cover Outdoor Faucets

The direct contact between your faucet and the winter weather can risk piping exposure to extremely low temperatures. Freezing temperatures can lead to broken faucets and damaged pipes, causing floods and other plumbing issues. If your house is equipped with an interior shut-off valve directly connected to your exterior's faucets and plumbing, it is also a good idea to turn it off. Afterward, you can then open the outdoor faucet valve to ensure there is no remaining water inside the line that can freeze and cause trouble during the colder months. You can also insulate and cover outdoor-facing faucets to protect them from freezing temperatures.

Drain and Store Your Garden Hoses

It is important that you properly drain any remaining water and stow away your garden hose if you want to prolong its lifespan. Water left inside your garden hose can freeze and significantly expand, causing the hose to break. Disconnect your hoses, drain the remaining water, and find a safe, dry place to keep them stored until spring.

Check Your Sump Pump

A sump pump is one of the most important components of plumbing because it pumps rainwater away from your home to prevent water damage and flooding. Now is a great time to check for sump pump damage and make the necessary repairs.
