Residents Encouraged to Take the City of Wheaton's Cross Connection Control Survey



The City of Wheaton provides safe, clean water that exceeds all Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) standards. The Illinois EPA requires that all water systems conduct a biennial survey of the water system to determine where cross connections may exist.

A cross-connection is a connection between a drinking water pipe and a polluted source. A common example is if you were spraying weed killer on the lawn and the water pressure dropped. The chemical could be sucked back into the water pipes through the hose. Lawn irrigation systems and hot water boilers are examples of cross-connections that require backflow preventors.

Reminder on Campaign Signs

As we are in the spring election season, the City reminds residents and businesses of Wheaton's restrictions on where you can and can't place campaign signs. These requirements are part of the City's Zoning Ordinance to help ensure the safety of drivers and pedestrians by maintaining clear sight lines and discouraging distractions to drivers.

Requirements for campaign signs:

- **Size:** Campaign signs must be no more than 16 square feet in residential districts or 32 square feet in non-residential districts.
- **Location:** Signs must be on private property. They must not be in the parkway (generally the area between the sidewalk and the street) or on any other public property. Signs can't be attached to a tree or utility pole, regardless of whether it is on public or private property.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Upcoming Capital Improvement Projects in 2024

Warmer weather means the City will soon be busy with improvements across Wheaton. The City continues to manage numerous capital projects, investing in infrastructure to maintain a high quality of life for our residents. This year the City has budgeted \$30.3 million toward capital improvements. The following are highlights of just a few projects you will see happening this year.

As we do every year, the City will take on multiple miles of road improvements through our annual Road Improvement Program. These streets are identified by performing a pavement condition rating analysis. This scoring system helps determine which roads

are up for resurfacing, rehabilitation, or complete replacement in accordance with the City's policies. In 2024, the City will invest \$2.14 million to improve 5.6 miles of road. In addition, Gary Avenue between Harrison Avenue and Jewell Road will undergo reconstruction for a total of \$1.8 million. An additional \$1.3 million has been earmarked for other road-related projects.



The City's Water Division continues to move forward with the Lead Service Line (LSL) Replacement Program, a multi-year capital program to replace parts of the City's water distribution system that are made from lead with new copper services. Through the program, City crews

will be replacing 30 service lines on private property, 30 service lines on both private and City property, and 60 service lines on City property. This is a part of an ongoing 4-year program to remove all lead service lines from the City.



Crews will continue to improve the City's sanitary sewer system with projects to rehabilitate sanitary service lines. Notably, crews will replace the sanitary sewer lines on Kingston Street and College Avenue, which will be coordinated with the replacement of the water main along the same area. Other notable projects include High Density Polyethylene (HDPE) lining replacements, manhole rehabilitations, and flow metering. These projects serve to increase the efficiency of

the system and reduce rainwater infiltration.

We are taking steps forward as we continue to focus on flooding improvement projects to reduce overland flooding with construction slated to start near Wakeman Avenue and Cadillac Drive. The City also continues work on the New Sidewalk Program, a multi-year program to add sidewalks on at least one side of every street to increase safety for pedestrians and improve the walkability of our community. For 2024, the City Council increased funding to \$1.7 million to accelerate the program. Residents can view a list of the 2024 sidewalk areas by visiting the [City's website](#). The City will continue its ongoing program of replacing broken existing sidewalks as well.

These projects are part of a long list of capital improvements happening this year reflecting the ongoing investment in our community. The City Council and City staff will continue working toward our goal of maintaining Wheaton as a desirable residential community with quality infrastructure and services that meet the community's service level expectations.

March is Severe Weather Preparedness Month



Illinois averages 53 tornadoes per year and ranks fourth in the United States for the most tornadoes per square mile. To prepare for these types of incidents, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) is providing helpful information during March, which is Severe Weather Preparedness Month.

Severe weather preparedness includes gathering information and supplies to prepare for a loss of electricity or if you must, evacuate from your neighborhood. That's why IEMA offers a [Family Communications Plan](#) to help people map locations to meet and track important contact information. Now is a good time to plan ahead, especially with the severe weather here in Illinois.

IEMA recommends the following:

- Keep all important records and documents in a secure waterproof container
- Make an inventory of possessions using lists and photos/videos
- Insure your property and possessions
- Know how to shut off electricity, gas, and water
- Compile an emergency kit and "go bag" to help your family for at least three days during extended power outages or evacuations
- In case power is out, make sure flashlights with fresh batteries are ready
- Generators should only be run outside, never indoors or in enclosed spaces
