Yard waste, food scraps, and organic materials are collected at the curb beginning April 1 through Dec. 13. Please keep in mind the following:

- You can use containers no larger than 35 gallons in size or biodegradable paper bags.
- Each container or

Recycling Extravaganza to Take Place on April 13



The City's Environmental Improvemental Commission invites the community to its annual Recycling Extravaganza with SCARCE on Saturday, April 13 from 8:30 a.m. to noon at the DuPage Fairgrounds, 2015 Manchester Road. You can bring many types of items for safe disposal or recycling at this drive-through event.

Items you can drop off include:

- **Batteries** (Collected by Interstate Battery):
 - Car and other large batteries.
 - No household batteries.
- **Bike-related items:** (Collected by Working Bikes)
 - Bikes, helmets, repair tools, and tire pumps.
- **Documents for shredding**
(Funded in part by DuPage

County):

- Acceptable items include medical records, sensitive documents, and tax records.
- No batteries (greeting cards, etc.), plastic file tabs, plastic page protectors, or vinyl checkbook covers. Limit of four bags per car.
- **Electronics and Other Items**
(Collected by eWorks)
 - Electronics (\$25-\$35 fee for monitors and televisions).
 - Scrap Metal (This includes items such as chicken wire, lawn furniture, metal hangers, and unusable pots and pans).
 - Textiles (Please bag blankets, clothing, coats, shoes, and towels).

- **Eyewear and Hearing Aids** (Collected by Wheaton Lions Club)
 - Eyeglasses, hearing aids, and sunglasses.
- **Household-related items** (Miscellaneous, Collected by SCARCE):
 - Books
 - Bread tags
 - Brita-brand filters and pitchers
 - Holiday lights
 - Inkjet cartridges (small, no toners)
 - Keys (for cars and homes)
 - Mercury barometers, thermometers, and thermostats
 - Musical instruments
 - Records
 - X-rays
 - No light bulbs or Compact Fluorescent Lamps (CFLs)
- **Medical Waste** (Collected by DuPage County Sheriff):
 - EpiPens, lancets, medications, sharps, and syringes.
- **Medical Equipment** (Collected by Melba's Place):
 - Crutches, walkers, and wheelchairs.
- **Paints** (Collected by Earth Paint):
 - Latex paint (\$1.49 per quart, \$3.99 per gallon, or \$14.99 per bucket).
 - Oil-based paint and stain (\$5.99 per quart, \$9.99 per gallon, or \$24.99 per bucket).
- **Propane tanks** (Collected by AmeriGas)
- **Soccer-related items** (Collected by Soccer Gear for Zambia):
 - Cleats, first aid kits, girls' leggings, jerseys and uniforms, nets, referee gear, shin guards, soccer balls, and socks.

Please note that Liberty Drive will be closed between Main Street and Cross Street (including Municipal Lot 3) every Saturday until approximately 3 p.m. during the French Market season.

Spring Has Sprung: Know City Requirements for Lawn Care



The much-anticipated spring weather has arrived, and so has the lawn and gardening season. To assist in maintaining the health, beauty, and safety of the community, the City of Wheaton has adopted ordinances that address tall grass and weeds. As a reminder, grass and weeds exceeding 8 inches in height are a violation of City code. When left uncut and overgrown, grass and weeds can attract unwanted pests such as mice and insects and provide cover for wild animals that cause nuisances within neighborhoods. Additionally, tall, dried out grass and weeds during the later summer months are a potential fire hazard.

City of Wheaton Parking Fee Changes Now in Effect



Several changes are now in effect for the City's leased and daily fee parking that will impact commuters, downtown employees, and garage permit holders.

The City has not adjusted parking rates in more than 15 years for most types of parking, and these changes are needed to fund the upkeep of City-maintained parking lots, public garages, and street parking.

In summary, the City has introduced premium daily fee parking zones for spaces closest to both train stations, an increase of \$0.50 per day for many daily fee parking spaces, and adjustments to leased parking permit fees. Below is a summary of the changes.



Changes for Commuters (Near Front Street Train Station):

- Front Street:
 - Daily fee spaces along Front Street are now a Premium Daily Fee Parking zone; the fee for these spaces has increased from \$1.50 to \$3. The eight 2-hour meters have been removed and are now Premium Daily Fee spaces.
- Commuter Parking Lot 9:
 - Daily fees in the northern part have increased from \$1.50 to \$2.
 - Quarterly permit fees have increased from \$60 to \$110.

• Carlton Avenue:

- Daily fees have increased from \$1.50 to \$2.

• Liberty Drive:

- Daily fees for the spaces west of Carlton Avenue have increased from \$1.50 to \$2.
- Parking spaces east of Carlton Avenue are now Premium Daily Fee parking spaces; their fees have increased from \$1.50 to \$3 per day. The twenty-seven 12-hour meters have been removed and are now replaced by Premium Daily Fee parking spaces; the thirteen 4-hour parking meters have remained the same.

Changes for Commuters (Near College Avenue Train Station):

• Commuter Parking Lot 10:

- This parking lot is now a Premium Daily Fee Parking zone; the fee for these spaces has increased from \$1.50 to \$3.

• Crescent Street:

- Daily fees have increased from \$1.50 to \$2.

• Lot 7 (SE corner of Williston & Crescent):

- This lot has changed from a quarterly leased lot to a daily fee lot. Spaces are now \$2 per day.

• Commuter Parking Lots 6 and 8:

- Quarterly permits for residents have increased from \$60 to \$110; for non-residents, \$75 to \$130.

Changes for Employee & Residential Permits:

• Wheaton Place Garage:

- Employee permits have increased from \$75 to \$120 per quarter.
- Residential permits have increased from \$150 to \$170 per quarter.

• Willow Avenue Garage:

- Employee permits have increased from \$75 to \$120 per quarter.
- Residential permits have increased from \$150 to \$170 per quarter.

• Employee Parking Lots #3 and #5:

- Quarterly permits have increased from \$60 to \$100.

April is Hazardous Materials Safety Month

Chemicals are used almost every day and are found in common items such as cleaning supplies, medicines, fuel, and more. Chemicals you use in your home can be dangerous to your health and the environment. Follow these safety tips from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) on how to properly handle household chemicals:

- Follow the instructions on the label for use and storage.
- Don't mix products. This can cause deadly gases or a fire.
- Store products in their original containers.
- Store anything that can catch on fire away from your home.
- Store hazardous materials out of the reach of children and pets.
