CITY NOTES

City Offices Closed on Monday, May 27

Non-emergency City offices will be closed on Monday, May 27, in observance of Memorial Day. Garbage, recycling, and yard waste pickup will be delayed by one day for all routes the week of May 27.

Leash Law Reminder

For the safety of our community and the safety of pets, [the City of Wheaton requires dogs to be on a leash in public areas](#), which includes while walking on sidewalks and in parks. In addition, please note that while in Wheaton Park District parks, all dogs must be on a leash no longer than 6 feet and may not run loose in the parks. Thank you for your cooperation.

Numerous Capital Projects Happening This Year



With the warmer temperatures, the City is busier than ever with improvements throughout Wheaton. The City continues to tackle numerous capital projects necessary to maintain and improve our City's infrastructure, as these are important investments in our community.

- Cadillac & Wakeman Flood Improvements:** As part of the City's continued commitment to enhancing our community's infrastructure, the City began the Cadillac & Wakeman Flood Improvement Project in March of this year to help alleviate flooding. This project aims to decrease overland flooding into homes and other structures in an area identified as the Cadillac

& Wakeman Upland Depressional Area. For this particular area, the City will be making storm sewer improvements and increasing the capacity of the area's storm sewers.

- Road Construction and Maintenance Projects:** The City will take on 5.4 miles of road improvements through our annual Road Program, and the Public Works Department will improve another 3.8 miles. These streets are identified by performing a pavement condition rating analysis. This scoring system helps determine which roads are up for resurfacing, rehabilitation, or complete replacement.

Reconstruction work will occur near

Shady Lane and Wesley Street; concrete pavement resurfacing will occur near Kay Road, Maple Lane, Prospect Street, and Stoddard Avenue; and rehabilitation/resurfacing work will occur near Elm Street, Gables Boulevard, Prairie Avenue, Seminary Avenue, Warrenville Road, and Wesley Street. Additionally, rehabilitation/resurfacing work will occur near the Heritage Lake, Orchard Cove, and Briarcliffe Knolls subdivisions.

The City's Public Works Department and the City's contractor, R.W. Dunteman Company, will perform this year's road work. Residents directly affected will receive further information from the City and/or the contractor with additional instructions, such as where to park if driveway access is temporarily limited. 
Gary Avenue Improvements:

Work is underway for improvements to Gary Avenue from Jewell Road to Harrison Avenue. This project will include reconstructing the road, installing a traffic signal at Prairie Avenue, widening the roadway at the intersection

with Prairie to allow for left turn lanes, installing storm sewers, and more. You can read more about this project on [the City's website](#).

Sidewalk Improvements:

Through the Sidewalk Replacement Program, the City proactively inspects locations every year and replaces sidewalk sections as needed. The number of sidewalks replaced is based on available funding from the City's Annual Budget. The City will provide a map on the City's website of the areas where work will take place this year once this year's program is finalized.



Additionally, the City continues the New Sidewalk Program, a multi-year program to add sidewalks on at least one side of every street to increase safety for pedestrians and improve the walkability of our community. In 2024, there are 22 areas where the City will be adding sidewalks. View the full list of new sidewalk construction areas for this year by visiting [the City's website](#). Celebrating Wheaton's History

Wheaton is a vibrant community that stays connected to the past while moving towards an even brighter future. From top-ranked schools and a picturesque downtown to historic neighborhoods and a prosperous business community, Wheaton, since its incorporation in 1859, remains an excellent place to live, work, shop, and visit.

This time of year, communities across the nation celebrate their history by observing Preservation Month in May. Here in Wheaton, the City's Historic Commission is offering several events and

opportunities for you to learn more about our community's past.

Residents will notice blue signs going up in front of the over 160 historic homes and buildings beginning May 3. You can scan the QR code on the sign to be directed to the interactive [Wheaton Historic Register Map](#).



The map provides images of the sites plus information such as the date built, prominent citizens of the past who lived in the home, and the architectural style.

For those who want to learn more about the history of their Wheaton home, two sessions of Home History Research

one-on-ones will be offered at the Wheaton Public Library with the library's Genealogy & Local History Specialist. The sessions are scheduled for Thursday, May 9, 6-9 p.m. and Monday, May 13, 6-9 p.m. Reservations are recommended.

The lecture "Railroads of Wheaton" is scheduled on Thursday, May 16 at 7 p.m. at the Wheaton Public Library. Local historians Brian and Joyce Ostberg, who are the creators of the YouTube channel BeHistoric, will present a historical survey of railroads that shaped the foundations and footprint of Wheaton. Registration is strongly encouraged.

In addition to these opportunities, Wheaton's business community continues to thrive and honors our history with new businesses marking milestones and longtime businesses serving as cornerstones of our community. We're fortunate to have businesses who've

been a part of our community's story for more than 100 years, including: The Little Popcorn Store, since 1921 (111 1/4 Front St.); Carlson Glass and Mirror, Inc., since 1915 (312 W. Front St.); Stones Jewelry, since 1911 (107 W. Front St.); Holstein's Garage, since 1906 (309 W. Front St.); and Wheaton Nurseries, since 1895 (626 E. Roosevelt Road).

Springtime Reminder to 'Walk Your Wheels' in Downtown Wheaton

With warmer weather comes more pedestrian and bicycle traffic, especially in downtown Wheaton. To help keep everyone safe, the City of Wheaton does not allow you to ride bicycles, skateboards, scooters, in-line skates or roller skates on the sidewalks within the heart of the downtown or through the Hale Street

Tents. While you can still ride on the streets, if you choose to go on the sidewalk, you must "walk your wheels" within the boundaries of the following streets: Wesley Street to the north; Cross Street to the east; Willow Street to the south; and West Street to the west. Bicyclist & Pedestrian Commission Celebrates National Bike Month & Safety Reminders



Wheaton's Bicyclist & Pedestrian Commission encourages the community to enjoy more biking and walking in celebration of National Bike Month in May. Whether for fun, fitness or with family, this month is a great opportunity to enjoy biking and pedestrian-friendly activities.

To kick-off the month, several Wheaton-area schools will be joining the estimated 1,300 schools nationwide to celebrate National Bike & Roll to School Day on Wednesday, May 8. The event encourages students to bike, walk, or scooter to school and raises awareness for safer routes for bicycling and walking. Each participating school is

organizing its own event independently. Residents are encouraged to check with the local school administration for more details.

"National Bike & Roll to School Day is fun and a great way to get kids out on their bikes or scooters. Our hope is that this event can be a great kick-off for parents and kids biking to school not just on May 8, but through the rest of the school year," said Michelle Dunlap, co-chair of the Wheaton Bicyclist & Pedestrian Commission. "This event helps build connections between families, schools, and the Wheaton community. We encourage drivers to be good neighbors and slow down when driving in and around school zones."

Other nationwide events include National Ride a Bike Day on May 5; Bike to Work Week from May 13-19; and Bike to Work Day on May 17.

With the warmer weather and these exciting events, there will be more pedestrian and cycling activity. The Bicyclist & Pedestrian Commission would like to remind residents to be respectful of all cyclists, walkers, and drivers. Drivers are encouraged to stay alert for cyclists and pedestrians and leave plenty of space for passing. Cyclists are encouraged to obey the rules of the road.

National Bike Safety Month



While bicycle safety is important year-round, the National Bicycle Safety Month in May brings heightened awareness to the issue. From the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), here are ways you can help keep cyclists safe:

For Drivers:

- Obey the speed limit, reduce speed for road conditions, and drive defensively to avoid a crash with a cyclist.
- When driving, never drive distracted or impaired.
- In parking lots, at stop signs, when backing up, or when parking, search your surroundings for other vehicles,

including bicycles.

For Bicyclists:

- When biking, always wear a helmet.
- To make it easier for drivers to see you, have reflectors and lights on your bike, and wear reflective/bright clothing.
- Ride one per seat, with both hands on the handlebars, unless signaling a turn.
- Drive with the flow, in the same direction as traffic.
- Obey street signs, signals, and road markings.



Lawn Watering Restrictions Begin May 15

Lawn watering restrictions are effective May 15 through Sept. 15 in the City of Wheaton. These restrictions are in place to help minimize evaporation during the hottest time of the day.

- Buildings and homes with an odd-numbered street address may water lawns and gardens only on days of the month ending in odd numbers.
- Buildings and homes with an even-numbered street address may water lawns and gardens only on days of the month ending in even numbers.
- No watering is allowed between the hours of noon and 6 p.m.

Contact the Water Division at 630-260-2090 for more information or for a 10-day variance for planting grass seed/laying sod.
