City Offices Closed; No Garbage Pickup

Non-emergency City offices will be closed on Monday, Sept. 2 in recognition of Labor Day. LRS will not collect garbage, yard waste or recycling on Monday, Sept. 2. All pickups for the week of Sept. 2 will be one day later than usual.

Watering Restrictions End

Lawn watering restrictions will be ending Sept. 15. Until then, residents can water on odd- or even-numbered days corresponding with odd- or even-numbered addresses. Watering is prohibited between noon and 6 p.m.

Mark Your Calendars for the Festival of Cultures on Sept. 15



The 2024 Festival of Cultures, presented by the City of Wheaton Community Relations Commission, will take place on Sunday, Sept. 15 from 1-5 p.m. at Memorial Park, 225 Karlskoga Ave.

Now in its sixth year, the Festival of Cultures celebrates the vibrant cultures that make Wheaton a warm and welcoming community to live, work, and visit. This free, family-friendly event features live entertainment, a passport activity for kids, an interactive art project, cultural booths, and storytelling.

Upon arrival, families can pick up a festival passport to collect stamps

Wheaton Police Officer Chris Kelly and Wife Frankie Honored with Life-Saving Award



The Wheaton Police Department is honored to announce that Officer Chris Kelly and his wife, Frankie, received a Life-Saving Award on Aug. 12 from the Village of Fontana, Wis., for their heroic actions that saved the life of a 2-year-old drowning victim on July 7, 2024 at Fontana Beach.

While off-duty and enjoying a holiday weekend with their family at the beach in Fontana, Wis., Chris and Frankie noticed a commotion near the shoreline. A father was carrying his unresponsive daughter, a toddler,

from the water. Without hesitation, Chris and Frankie, a registered nurse, immediately took the toddler and began performing CPR and rescue breathing. Thanks to their quick and skilled intervention, the toddler began showing signs of life before medics arrived.

Chris and Frankie remained with the toddler and her family until Fontana medics took over life-saving efforts. The child was transported to a Milwaukee-area hospital, where she made a full recovery.

Wheaton Place Garage Floor Coating Work to Begin Sept. 9

City crews will begin floor coating work on the stairwells and lobbies of the Wheaton Place Garage, 232 W. Wesley St., beginning Sept. 9.

From Sept. 9-13, the west stair tower and the elevator lobbies on the second and fourth floors will be closed. During this closure, all patrons will be required to use the stairs on the east side of the garage, and individuals who require the use of the elevator should park on the first and third floors.

From Sept. 16-20, the east stair tower and the elevator lobbies on the first and third floors will be closed. Signage will be posted during this work. During this closure, all patrons will be required to use the stairs on the west side of the garage, and individuals who require the use of the elevator should park on the second and fourth floors.

Senior Emergency Preparedness Tips



September is National Preparedness Month and the Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Office of Homeland Security (IEMA-OHS) is highlighting the importance of seniors' readiness efforts across Illinois.

Focusing on [senior community preparedness](#), here are tips from IEMA:

- **Assess your needs:** Everyone has unique needs. There are several factors that can affect the steps you need to take to prepare yourself and those you care for. Whether you care for pets, children, or have a medical condition or disability, it is important to know what your

family will need to stay safe.

- **Make a plan:** Once you've assessed your needs, you can plan for what you'd do, where you'd go, and what to bring if a disaster strikes. Your emergency supply kit should include items that meet your individual needs.
- **Engage your support network:** Get to know your neighbors because they, along with your family and friends, can be a support network before, during and after a disaster by providing emotional and practical support.

Your emergency preparedness kit should at least include these preparedness items:

- Water
- Non-perishable food
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Battery-operated radio or weather radio with extra batteries
- Extra battery packs and cables to charge your cell phones
- Copies of important family documents stored in a waterproof bag or container
- Hand sanitizer/disinfecting wipes

Senior Assistance Program Accepting Applications

The City of Wheaton is now accepting applications for the Senior Assistance Program, an annual program administered through the City's Commission on Aging that provides monthly financial assistance to qualifying seniors. Applications will be accepted through Sept. 20.

Wheaton residents must meet the following four requirements to qualify and apply for the Wheaton Senior Assistance Program:

- **Age:** Must be at least **65** years or older.
- **Residency:** Must be a **current** incorporated Wheaton resident for at least the last consecutive 3 years.
 - Must reside in the residence for 9+ months of the year.
- **Income:** Annual household income **cannot** exceed **\$33,100**.

- **In-person/In-Home interview:** Agree to an in-person interview at the residence.

If you are receiving Section 8 or DuPage Housing Authority assistance, you are NOT eligible to apply for this program.

Petitions for Candidacy Available for 2025 Municipal Election



Petitions for candidacy for the 2025 Wheaton municipal election are now available in the Office of the City Clerk at Wheaton City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St., Wheaton, IL. One four-year position for each of the City's four Districts (North, South, East, and West) is up for election. Candidates shall:

- Be registered voters of the City of Wheaton and must reside within the specific district boundary within the corporate limits of the city at least one year next preceding the election; and
- File Nonpartisan Primary Petitions for Nomination in accordance with 10 ILCS 5/10-3 of the Election Code. The petitions must


be signed by registered City of Wheaton voters residing within the corporate limits of [each specific election district](#)* (North, South, East, and West) together with a Statement of Candidacy, Loyalty Oath (optional), and a receipt indicating the candidate has filed a Statement of Economic Interest with the DuPage County Clerk.

Petitions for nomination are to be filed with the Wheaton City Clerk, City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St., Second Floor, Wheaton, Illinois. The filing period is from Monday, Oct. 21, 2024, through Monday, Oct. 28, 2024, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., excluding weekend days and holidays.

A Consolidated Primary election will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 25, 2025 if more than four candidates file for each district position (North, South, East, and West). The Consolidated Election will be held on Tuesday, April 1, 2025. Successful candidates will take office at the latter of either the first regular or special meeting after receipt of the official election results or at the first regular or special meeting in the month following their election. City Water Rate Changes Proposed to Support Necessary Infrastructure Projects



The Wheaton City Council is considering changes to the City's water rates to address aging water infrastructure, significant increases in the amount the City pays to purchase water, and rising expenses to operate the City's water system.

At its Aug. 19 meeting, the Wheaton City Council received a first reading of a proposed ordinance to implement the recommendations of the [Wheaton Water Rate Study](#), which would include the first adjustments to the City's water rates in 9 years, and annual adjustments to the rate that directly reflect how much the City pays to purchase water from the DuPage Water Commission. These changes would begin with water customers' January 2025 utility bill.

Why These Changes Are Needed:

- **Increased cost for water:** Wheaton receives Lake Michigan water through the DuPage Water Commission (DWC), which purchases water from the City of Chicago. The City of Wheaton has not increased water rates since 2015 and up to this point has absorbed the substantial increases passed along by the City of Chicago (19.3%) and DWC (15.1%). Over time, these increases have significantly reduced the funding available for the City to address critical infrastructure work on Wheaton's aging water system.
- **Aging infrastructure:** Annual investments in the City's infrastructure are essential, as deferring water main replacements and other critical projects increase the risk of watermain breaks, boil orders and service disruptions. Additionally, the City is currently undertaking a \$6.5 million project to replace lead service lines throughout Wheaton, helping ensure a safe water supply for everyone in our community.
- **Rising operating costs:** With higher material prices due to inflation and rising energy costs, the City's costs to operate and maintain its water system continues to increase.

The proposed ordinance includes annual adjustments to water usage rates and fees over three years to support the water utility system through 2027.

Water Study Recommendations

The proposed ordinance includes annual adjustments to water usage rates and fees over three years to support the water utility system through 2027. The impact on a customer's monthly water bill will vary based on their water meter size and consumption levels, however the average water customer is expected to see a monthly increase of approximately \$6.82 in 2025. Starting in January 2025, customers' water bills will be displayed slightly differently to show the rate that the City of Wheaton is paying the DuPage Water Commission to purchase water. This is not a new charge; instead, the City's current usage rate will be split into two separate usage rates: DWC Usage Rate (amount the City pays for water), and a City Usage Rate (remaining costs to fund operation and infrastructure work).

The Wheaton City Council approved a 5-year agreement with LRS for garbage, recycling and yard waste service for residents that will begin Oct. 1. The new agreement will allow residents to continue paying based on the amount of garbage, recycling or yard waste they generate, and service will continue as it does today, with adjusted rates for each year of the contract.

In the spring, the City solicited Request for Proposals for collection services and evaluated all proposals based on program costs. LRS’s proposal provided the lowest cost to residents, and in June 2024 the City Council approved the new 5-year agreement with LRS for garbage, recycling and yard waste service.

Under the new agreement, the price per pickup for the first year will increase between \$0.39 and \$0.65 per pickup for garbage and between \$0.25 and \$0.41 per pickup for recycling service, based on cart sizes, with a 3.7% increase in subsequent

years of the contract. The cost of yard waste/ extra garbage stickers will be \$3.49, with a 3.7% increase per year. The average household cost for solid waste and recycling collection in Wheaton beginning in October is anticipated to be \$15.21 per month. See the chart above for costs based on your cart size.

You will continue to use your current garbage and recycling carts, which use RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) chips that LRS trucks scan each time they are emptied and charge you only when you set your carts at the curb. This “pay as you throw” model ensures collection costs are distributed fairly, in proportion to the amount of waste each user generates. This type of program also helps encourage residents to decrease waste and increase recycling, promoting environmental sustainability.
