Garbage Holidays

There will be no garbage pickup on Thursday, Dec. 25, 2014 or Thursday, Jan. 1, 2015. Thursday and Friday garbage routes will be one day later during these two weeks.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Christmas trees will be collected as part of curbside recycling the first two full weeks in January (Jan. 5-16, 2015) without a sticker. Remove all decorations, including tinsel or garland, and place your tree at the curb on your regular garbage pickup day. Please do not place your tree in a bag.

Yard Waste Pickup Ends

Yard waste and leaf pickup in Wheaton will end the week of Dec. 8-12, 2014.

For leaf pickup, place leaves in containers 33 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags. Containers or bags must

Ordinance Targets Snow Removal Issues

Keep snow off the street; don't push snow to opposite parkways

As snowy weather arrives, the City of Wheaton has a few reminders that will help City crews to clear Wheaton streets and minimize safety hazards.

Plowing, blowing or shoveling snow into the roadway or across the street to the opposite parkway creates several problems. Snow that piles up in the street is a nuisance to other property owners, creates more narrow traffic lanes, and produces safety hazards for other drivers. It also causes plows to hit the curb, which can damage the curb.

For these reasons, the City recently enacted an ordinance



that makes pushing snow onto an opposite parkway a violation of City Code. Please help keep our streets safe by adhering to this ordinance. Violations yield a minimum fine of \$100 per day.

Crews Treat the Streets with Beets

If you have ever wondered what it is that the City's snow plows are spreading on the street in the winter, you may be surprised to learn the answer.

Instead of just using salt, Wheaton's Public Works crews use a "supermix" of 70 percent salt brine, 20 percent beet juice, and 10 percent calcium chloride to treat Wheaton streets. By mixing salt with beet juice, the City is able to reduce the amount of chlorides that end up in the water table and reduce the amount of salt used by 30 to 50 percent without compromising safety.

You can also help by keeping fire hydrants clear of snow and by removing obstructions – such as portable basketball hoops or decorative stone boulders – that are within 5 feet of the paved street.

Finally, please remember that after 2 inches of accumulated snowfall, parking is prohibited on any street for 24 hours or until streets have been cleared.

Recycle Your Old Holiday Lights

Copper and plastic parts recycled

If your holiday lights have lost their twinkle, keep them out of the trash through a special recycling program. Between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. weekdays, Nov. 24, 2014 through Feb. 6, 2015, you can drop off your lights and extension cords in the holiday light recycling containers just inside the entrance to the Public Works Storage Yard at 820 W. Liberty Drive.

This collection is in partnership with Elgin Recycling (www.elginrecycling.com). It will accept incandescent and LED lights and extension cords in any condition. The lights will be collected and then stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas.



In addition to residents, the City also welcomes businesses, schools and other organizations wanting to dispose of holiday lights to participate in the program. There is no limit as to how many lights you can drop off for recycling.

Please note that this collection will NOT accept other electronic devices.

Tips Can Help Prevent Frozen Pipes



Do you know how to prevent water pipes in your home from freezing or how to thaw them if they do freeze? With cold winter weather approaching, a few valuable tips can save you the hassle of dealing with frozen pipes. Make sure to insulate pipes in unheated areas or against outside walls and seal any leaks that may let cold air in. Keep your garage door closed if your water meter is located in that area. Disconnect your garden hose and shut off the water supply to outside faucets.

If the temperature gets extremely cold, open cabinet doors under sinks to allow heat to get to pipes and let a faucet drip at a trickle if possible. Questions may be directed to the City of Wheaton Water Division at 630-260-2090.

While the outdoor French Market season has ended, shoppers can enjoy many of the same items and vendors indoors.

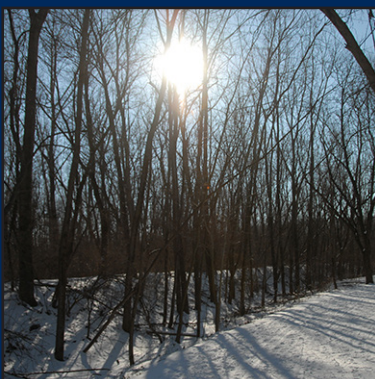
