Citizen Survey Results Are In

Wheaton rated above national average in 54 of 66 areas assessed

Thanks to hundreds of residents who participated in a community survey earlier this year, the City of Wheaton has received valuable feedback gauging public sentiment and identifying areas where the City can make improvements. At the June 23 City Council Planning Session, ETC Institute presented the results of the community survey it conducted for the City earlier this year.

ETC Institute compared the results of Wheaton's survey with results in 54 communities nationwide and a random sample of 4,000 residents across the nation. The City of Wheaton rated at or above the national average in 54 of 66 areas assessed.

Among the results that ETC Institute Vice President Chris Tatum highlighted was residents' overall satisfaction with City services, which scored 27 percentage points above the national average



Of the 683 randomly selected residents surveyed, 90% were satisfied with the quality of police, fire and ambulance services, and 96% rated Wheaton an "excellent" or "good" place to raise children.

(84% in Wheaton versus a 57% U.S. average).

"That's not just a statistically significant difference, that's a phenomenal difference," Tatum said. "The

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average community has only a little over half of their residents giving positive ratings; you're at over 80%."

Other results Tatum highlighted included:

- 94% of residents surveyed cited satisfaction with the overall feeling of safety in the city.
- 96% rated Wheaton as an "excellent" or "good" place to raise children.
- 90% of residents surveyed had positive ratings for the quality of life in Wheaton.

• Overall satisfaction scored well above the national average in areas such as: quality of the City's library (94% in Wheaton, versus 80% national average); quality of police, fire and ambulance services (90%, versus 80% average); customer service from City employees (75%, versus 55% national average); effectiveness of communication with the public (71%, versus 46% national average); and enforcement of City codes and ordinances (66%, versus 50% national average).

Because the survey collected addresses alongside survey responses, ETC Institute was also able to correlate satisfaction with different areas of the City and present the mapped data.

"When it comes to the overall perception of City services, there's not one area within the City limits that was even giving you mediocre ratings," Tatum said. "It doesn't matter where people live, people feel good about City services."

Tatum identified several areas where the City could focus its attention and efforts to educate residents, including maintenance of City streets and sidewalks and stormwater runoff/management. The survey also pointed to opportunities to communicate the strength of the City's finances and what the City is doing to prepare for the future.

Approximately 2,000 randomly chosen Wheaton households received the survey. With 683 households responding, this level of participation is enough to provide a statistically valid sample that can be extrapolated to be a good reflection of the feelings of all residents.

Take Steps to Fight the Bite!

*Protect yourself from West Nile Virus:
Know your PPI*

West Nile Virus (WNV) is a seasonal health threat that flares up in the summer and can continue into fall. Hot and dry conditions increase the threat, while cool and wet summers mean less WNV activity.

Mosquitoes become infected with WNV when they feed on infected birds, then spread WNV when they bite humans and animals. WNV can be serious and there is no specific treatment for people with WNV infection.

Most people experience mild symptoms and recover on their own. However, people of all ages can be infected with WNV, with those over the



age of 50 more likely to develop serious symptoms of WNV. They should take special care to avoid mosquito bites.

There are many types of mosquitoes, but "floodwater" or "nuisance" mosquitoes are the ones most likely to bite you. The type of mosquitoes that spreads WNV is Culex pipiens, which breeds in stagnant water during hot and dry

months. Since it is nearly impossible for the naked eye to identify floodwater and Culex mosquitoes, it is best to "Fight the Bite" of all mosquitoes.

Check Your PPI – Personal Protection Index

To help residents protect themselves against West Nile virus, the DuPage County Health Department has creat-

ed a Personal Protection Index (PPI) that will inform residents of the amount of WNV activity in the county, as well as the prevention steps that are recommended.

The PPI provides residents with a current snapshot of WNV activity, ranging from zero to four, with zero being no activity and four announcing multiple human cases of WNV in DuPage County. These ratings are based on the Health Department's testing of mosquitoes throughout DuPage County and the confirmation of human cases.

The PPI is available on the [City of Wheaton's website](#) and on the [DuPage County Health Department's website](#). It is updated each Wednesday at 3 p.m. or more frequently if needed, and it will be updated throughout the West Nile Virus season.

Police Increasing Seat Belt Enforcement through July 6

Auto crashes leading cause of death ages 5-24

The Wheaton Police Department will increase enforcement efforts of Illinois' safety seat belt laws as part of the statewide "Click It or Ticket" mobilization through July 6, 2014.

The City of Wheaton received a grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation, Division of Traffic Safety to fund this enforcement effort.

The goal of the effort is to boost the state's safety belt use rate and reduce fatalities and serious injuries. Safety belt use is important for all motor vehicle occupants. Motor vehicle crashes in the U.S. are the leading cause of

death for people ages 5 to 24.

Officers during this enforcement period will be operating several Occupant Protection Enforcement Zones. Uniformed police officers will be at several locations throughout the community as they look for unrestrained drivers and passengers. Violators will be directed to other police officers, who will issue citations for the violations.

The Wheaton Police Department wants all drivers to be aware of the additional risks of driving without a seatbelt, which can result in serious injury or death.

Garbage Sticker Price Change

New sticker prices go into effect on July 1

As set by the City's contract with Advanced Disposal Services, the price of garbage/yard waste and leaf stickers increases on July 1, 2014. Garbage and yard waste, which both use the same blue stickers, increase from \$3.48 per sticker to \$3.55. Green leaf stickers increase from \$2.86 per sticker to \$2.92.

Stickers are available at City Hall; grocery, hardware and convenience stores; and by calling Advanced Disposal Services at 630-587-8282. Advanced Disposal stickers purchased before July 1 are still valid after July 1.

larger than 33 gallons and must weigh no more than 50 pounds in weight.

You may place your garbage/recycling/yard waste at the curb between 7 p.m. the night before your collection day and 6 a.m. the day of collection. Please remove containers from the curb by 7 p.m. on your collection day.


Text to 9-1-1 Not Available in Our Area Yet

Recent news stories highlighted the availability of nationwide "Text to 9-1-1." These articles were based on the FCC deadline for the four largest mobile telephone providers to make text messaging to 9-1-1 accessible to every 9-1-1 center by May 15, 2014. The carriers met this deadline, and DuPage Public Safety Communications (DU-COMM) is working with the DuPage County Emergency Telephone System Board to deploy Text to 9-1-1 in DuPage County as part of a larger regional effort.

Residents need to know that a text message to 9-1-1 currently will receive a "bounce-back message," which advises them to call 9-1-1 because Text to 9-1-1 is not yet available in our area.

When Text to 9-1-1 becomes available, it should only be used when someone is unable to make a call to 9-1-1.

DU-COMM encourages anyone who lives or works in DuPage County to register for Smart911, which is provided at no cost to residents. It is an enhanced 9-1-1 database that stores information residents want to share with emergency responders in an emergency. This information is stored confidentially and can only be accessed by a dispatcher when that resident calls 9-1-1. Register at www.smart911.com.

Learn Options for Reporting Outages to ComEd

When the power is out, it is important that residents report the outage to ComEd.

With the storm season upon us, ComEd is offering several ways to report power outages and access important outage information.

First, customers may register their mobile phone number to their ComEd account at www.comed.com/Text. By then texting "Add Outage" to ComEd (26633), customers may subscribe to the Outage Alert program

and receive text messages regarding outages affecting their service, including status updates and estimated restoration times in the event of an outage. Customers may also text "Out" to ComEd (26633) to report an outage at any time. ComEd does not charge for this service, though a customer's mobile carrier plan may apply message and data rates.

Customers may also report an outage or check on the status of an outage by downloading ComEd's mobile app for smartphones or

accessing ComEd's Facebook page.

To view outages throughout the service territory, go to www.comed.com/Map for an outage map. Outages are indicated by triangle-shaped icons which, when selected, provide the number of customers affected, the response crew's status, probable cause of the outage, and estimated restoration time.
