Holiday Light Recycling Returns for 2022

Wheaton's holiday light recycling program is back Monday, Nov. 14 through Friday, Jan. 20. Bring strands of incandescent or LED lights in any condition to the Public Works Storage Facility at 820 W. Liberty Drive between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. weekdays. Look for signs directing you to the holiday light recycling area just inside the gate. This program is for light strings only. Please do not drop off lawn ornaments or other decorations, and do not put lights in a bag or box. Elgin Recycling, www.elginrecycling.com, will collect the lights, which will then be stripped and recycled for their copper and plastic parts. No materials will be shipped overseas. In addition to residents, the City also welcomes businesses, schools, and other

Bicycle Commission Expands Mission to Include Pedestrian Issues



The Wheaton Bicycle Advisory Commission recently received approval from the Wheaton City Council to include pedestrian issues in the mission of its commission. The official title of the commission is now the Wheaton Bicyclist and Pedestrian Commission.

The expanded commission will:

1. Provide advice and recommend strategies to the City Council to encourage and foster bicycling and pedestrian opportunities, and to consider access issues in the city.

2. Promote bicyclist and pedestrian education programs in the school systems and disseminate safety information to the public at large.

3. Review and make recommendations regarding implementation of the Wheaton Bicycle Plan.

4. Establish and maintain communications with those agencies, individuals, and organizations within Wheaton that advocate bicycling and walking and promote the sharing of those resources among them.

The commission aims to provide both walkers

and bicyclists safe access to our community. The commission encourages the community to enjoy Wheaton's great business districts, beautiful parks, and peaceful neighborhoods on foot or via bike, as these activities promote mental health and fitness.

Beyond the commission's annual events, look for walking tours of Wheaton to be added to the commission's group events in the future. Information about the commission and a list of their group events can be found [on the City's website](#).

Thanksgiving Garbage Collection & City Office Holiday Closures

There will be no garbage collection on Thursday, Nov. 24. Pickup will be delayed by one day for residents whose regular collection day is Thursday or Friday. Additionally, City offices will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 24 and Friday, Nov. 25 in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

Leaf Pickup Continues Through Dec. 16

This fall, the City of Wheaton reminds you of the ways you can properly dispose of leaves. Place leaves in containers 35 gallons in size or smaller, or in biodegradable bags. Containers or bags must weigh less than 50 pounds when filled. Each container or bag requires an LRS yard waste/organics/excess garbage sticker, available at City Hall and at many local grocery and hardware stores.

When you're cleaning up leaves, please be careful not to blow or rake them into the streets. Doing so can prevent storm sewers from functioning properly and can lead to flooding. If your house is located near a storm sewer catch basin, please help keep it clear



by sweeping away leaves and debris from the sewer grate. Also, please note that burning leaves is not allowed. LRS will collect leaves and yard waste on your garbage day through the second full week of December.

If you have brush and tree trimmings, please remember to follow the requirements for collection. Although brush/tree trimmings do not need to be placed in bags or containers, you must place

them in stacks that are no longer than 4 feet and no more than 18 inches in diameter. Each stack must have an LRS sticker attached and must weigh less than 50 pounds.

Stacks can be bundled with twine or spaced apart so that crews can easily collect the stacks. We appreciate your cooperation to ensure LRS collection crews are able to efficiently and safely remove yard waste from the parkway.

New Bike Ramp Installed at Pedestrian Underpass on Roosevelt Road

There's a new addition to the pedestrian underpass at Roosevelt Road and Wheaton Avenue! Wheaton's Public Works Department recently

installed a bike ramp to help bicyclists safely walk their bikes down (and up) the stairs using a thin ramp specifically made for bike tires. This new feature is the

result of resident feedback asking for a way to make it easier for bicyclists to use the underpass. A special shoutout to Public Works for completing this project.

Help the Wheaton Fire Department Keep the Wreath Red this Year



This holiday season, the Wheaton Fire Department will decorate Wheaton's three fire stations with wreaths that have a special significance. The wreaths are part of the Keep the Wreath Red fire safety campaign, a statewide program that reminds you to practice fire safety during the holiday season. The wreaths feature red lights, and for each Wheaton fire caused by holiday

decorations, the Fire Department will replace one red bulb with a white bulb. Help the Wheaton Fire Department Keep the Wreath Red by unplugging holiday lights before leaving home or sleeping, being careful with candles, using flame-retardant decorations, ensuring lights are in good condition and Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed, and keeping trees watered.

Bring Pumpkins to be Composted



The City of Wheaton's Environmental Improvement Commission will once again host a "Pumpkin Smash" drop-off for pumpkins right after Halloween. This collection will allow you to drop off pumpkins (please remove decorations first) to be composted, rather than going to the landfill. The event will take place on Saturday, Nov. 5 from 9 a.m. to noon in the commuter parking lot at Liberty and Carlton.

November is Winter Weather Preparedness Month in Illinois



Despite it still being fall, winter is right around the corner. November is Winter Weather Preparedness Month and the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA), Illinois Department of Labor (IDOL), Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM), Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) and the National Weather Service (NWS) are prompting all Illinoisans to prepare for extreme cold, ice, and snow.

All vehicles should have an emergency supply kit. When checking and restocking a vehicle's emergency supply kit, make sure it contains items such as:

- Blankets
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Non-perishable snack food
- Water

- Sand or cat litter
- Shovel
- Booster cables
- Phone charger

It's also important to keep in mind winter weather health hazards. Exposure to the cold for prolonged periods of time can pose major health risks such as hypothermia, which is extremely dangerous and can be deadly if not promptly treated. Frostbite is another byproduct of exposure to extremely cold conditions and can lead to severe tissue damage. Whether working indoors or outdoors, everyone is encouraged to follow these winter weather safety tips.

Remember, properly preparing for winter does not take much money or time. Before extreme conditions start, prepare now.
